Natasha Phillips (Forreston, IL)

Certified by: Boys & Girls Club of Freeport

Natasha Phillips began serving her community at the tender age of six. Today, as a 17 year old, she has volunteered more than 4,000 hours of community service. With a very busy school schedule she still finds time to volunteer much of her time to mentoring, through the Boys and Girls Club in Freeport, and has helped create a Forrestville Summer Youth Program to promote activities for the youth in her own community. Natasha is also a member of the Honor Roll Society, Who's Who Among American High School Students, Volunteer Jr. Staff at the Boys & Girls Club of Freeport, the president of her local 4-H club, a reporter of the Federation Club, Junior Staff at the 4-H State Advisory Board, 2005 Miss Ogle County Fair Queen, Youth Advisory Board for the Youth Crime Watch of America. Natasha also adopted several grandmothers in the surrounding community.

Cameron Yager (Lake Forest, IL)

Cameron Yager of Lake Forest turned her love for animals and concern for their welfare toward a goal to make a difference in the plight of abandoned and stray cats and dogs. She logged over 250 hours through the donation of her time at the Heartland Animal Shelter, cleaning cages, washing dogs, collecting carloads of supplies and the donation of a computer for the office, and spending a Christmas morning at the shelter to feed and care for the animals. Cameron fostered three feral kittens unaccustomed to human interaction, for four weeks. Not only did she acclimate them to human contact and medicate them through illness, she ultimately returned three delightful, loving kittens that were all adopted. Although fulfilling all the requirements for her Girl Scout Gold Award, Cameron continues to donate countless hours at Heartland and has taken her experiences and knowledge on the road by educating younger scouts.
