

PHRC Volunteers Needed for Call Center/Emergency Information Operators

I would like to take this opportunity to interest PHRC call center operators, support staff, and administrative services volunteers in a unique training session coming up at Public Health in mid October. We are preparing teams to operate an emergency call center called the PICC (Public Information Call Center). Whether your skills are medical or non-medical, we think you'd be an asset to this important community service.

Why do we need a PICC? Imagine a day when 20,000—or more—calls flood our system. That really happened to a public health department in California during a particularly severe outbreak of West Nile virus. Our experienced staff is set up to handle only a fraction of that volume.

This is where the PICC and PHRC volunteers come in. The PICC was created with large-scale events and disasters in mind like West Nile virus, pandemic flu or bioterrorism events. Having an emergency call center increases our capacity to meet the public's need for immediate non-diagnostic information.

Although more than 50 employees from across Public Health have been trained to staff the PICC, there is still a great need for PHRC volunteer support. We are recruiting PHRC call center operators, support staff, and administrative services volunteers to participate in the PICC training.

PHRC Required Training & the National Incident Management System (NIMS)

The National Incident Management System (NIMS) is a federal mandate, linked to federal funding. All response agencies, including Public Health Seattle & King County, must be NIMS compliant to be eligible to continue receiving federal grant funding for preparedness. This includes the PHRC program. One piece of NIMS compliance is required training of staff and volunteers. PHRC volunteers are included in NIMS compliance and are required to fulfill two specific NIMS online trainings by December 2008.

Update on PHRC ID Badges and PHRC T-shirts and Vests!

West Nile Virus Testing Season is Underway!

With the mosquito season underway and West Nile Virus (WNV) once again a concern, King County residents are asked to contact Public Health with reports of dead birds. Crows in particular die quickly from WNV clusters of dead crows may indicate that WNV present in the community. 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PHRC Volunteers Needed for Call Center/Emergency Information Operators

Examples of PHRC PICC volunteer duties include:

- Learn call center operations and approved responses to callers.
- Answer calls from people seeking information who may be stressed or confused.
- Provide approved health and safety information and refer to community resources as needed.
- Record and track calls, including critical information.
- Follow emergency Incident Command Structure.
- Follow PICC procedures and protocols.

Qualifications include:

- Ability to handle calls and effectively respond to callers using specified messages and protocols.
- Experience using communication technology (multiline phone, headsets, computer and Internet) desired
- Customer service experience desired (receptionist, call center, sales, etc.)

For the Health and Safety of PHRC Volunteers!

Within the first month of becoming a PHRC volunteer, volunteers are asked to complete the required Immunization Record and provide documentation. If the volunteer lacks documentation or immunization or history is unknown, a titer or immunization will be provided at no cost to the volunteer at any one of our Public Health clinics (in a prearranged clinic appointment). If volunteers wish to not be immunized they have the option of signing a declination which is on the back of the Immunization Record.

Public Health requires volunteers to have the following immunizations and documentation for:

- Measles/rubeola
- Rubella
- Varicella (chickenpox)
- Mumps
- Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis)
- Hepatitis B
- TB skin test
- Annual flu shot

The health and safety of PHRC volunteers is number one priority! If you have not yet completed a PHRC Immunization Record and/or declination please contact Mandi George at mandi.george@kingcounty.gov as soon as possible.

PHRC Expansion and Recruitment Campaign Update

Alternate Care Facility Planning & Full Scale Exercise Update

Mark your calendars now! On November 18, 2008 Public Health will conduct a full scale activation exercise to test its ability to staff, set up, operate and tear down a 200 bed alternate care facility (ACF). Recruitment for all medical and non-medical PHRC volunteers to staff the exercise starts now!

An alternate care facility is a non-medical building (in this case, Seattle Center's Exhibition Hall) of convenience which is repurposed for delivery of healthcare services during a disaster. The goals of Public Health's ACF is to provide non-complex, essential medical services which cannot be provided in a sufficient and timely manner by the usual healthcare system and to provide non-complex medical care to patients with appropriate medical needs, so acute care facilities can concentrate on provision of medical care to more seriously ill patients.

The scope of medical care in the alternate care facility Public Health has been planning for includes:

- Support for management of chronic medical conditions for medically high risk patients who require sheltering and are unable to be sheltered within traditional shelters due to medical needs.
- Non-life threatening urgent care.
- Provision of non-complex acute/chronic medical care needs for people transitioning from inpatient sector, 4) end of life care.
- Post-event exposure screening.
- Countermeasure distribution.
- Prescription refill writing services.
