

Alternate Care Facility (ACF) Planning & PHRC Volunteer **Involvement**

What is an Alternate Care Facility (ACF)? An ACF is a nonmedical facility that is converted to provide limited healthcare services on a temporary basis. An ACF is not an extension of a general acute care hospital, rather is a converted facility that operates under the authorities defined in local health and medical response plans. During emergency events, ACF's have served a variety of functions such as triage stations, urgent care centers, or in-patient facilities when local healthcare infrastructure is damaged.

On March 25, 2008 PHSKC will test components of its Alternate Care Facility planning by conducting a training exercise and PHRC volunteers will be recruited to participate in the exercise. The objectives of the exercise are to:

- Test delivery of limited supplies to the ACF
- Determine staffing model for Logistics Team set up and breakdown of limited supplies at the ACF
- Evaluate efficacy of floor plan for an ACF by setting up limited supplies
- Evaluate efficacy of floor plan for Intake and Triage by setting up limited supplies

PHRC Required Training & the National Incident Management System (NIMS)

The National Incident Managemen System (NIMS) is a federal mandate linked to federal funding. All response agencies, including Public Health Seattle & King County, must be NIMS compliant to be eligible to continue receiving federal grant funding for preparedness. This includes the PHRC program. One piece of NIMS compliance is required training of staff and volunteers. PHRC volunteers are included in NIMS compliance and are required to fulfill two specific NIMS online trainings by December 2008

- Test patient flow of ACF (identify delivery entrances for patients and supplies)
- Test communication devices within ACF between PHSKC Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and response partners (facility phone lines, cell phones, 800 MHz radios, laptops, Amateur radios)

In addition to evaluating the floor plan of the ACF for testing set up and breakdown, PHSKC is also planning to test communication systems to and from the facility out to response agencies' Emergency Operations Centers at Public Health, the City of Seattle EOC, and the King County Regional Communication and Emergency Coordination Center. The exercise will allow PHSKC to strengthen planning efforts around ACF set up and be better prepared for their full-scale exercise in November 2008, in which they will test the ACF Plan in more depth.

PHRC & PHSKC Protect Hundreds Against the Flu!

On the tail of National Immunization Week (Nov 26 – Dec 2), PHSKC and the PHRC successfully set up, operated and tore down two medication centers in which over 1,100 adults and children were vaccinated against the seasonal flu. Over 200 staff and volunteers participated in the two centers located at Delridge Community Center and Renton Community Center on December 9.

Activating two <u>full-scale</u> Medication Centers simultaneously was a first for Public Health, stretching resources and capabilities to new levels. As we reflect on the day, improving, growing and most importantly maintaining the capability requires us to listen carefully to the lessons learned and willingness to design or redesign medication center plans and actions accordingly.

Meanwhile, we are proud of each and every volunteer who rolled up their sleeves and did the hard work of the day. Vaccinators, health educators, flow monitors, signage, logistics... no matter the role served the success of the medication centers could not have happened without volunteer presence, compassion and hard work.

"Wow! It's reassuring to know the city is preparing for an emergency like this and all these people are here to help us", a young woman holding a small child said while standing in line, reminding us of the reason why we do this and the dedication of our volunteers.

Washington State Retired Volunteer Medical Worker License

Rules for implementing the new Washington State Retired Volunteer Medical Worker License were filed and became effective on 12/01/07.

Now, by accessing the following link to the Washington State Department of Health's web site https://fortress.wa.gov/doh/hpqa1/hps5/RetiredMedicalWorker/default.htm retired health care providers may obtain a retired active credential if such a credential is authorized by the appropriate disciplining authority. Retired active status allows the license holder to practice for no more than 90 days per year or in emergency situations. License holders must maintain any

Washington State Department of Health is authorized to issue a retired volunteer medical worker license to any person that:

continuing education obligations that may be required of the

profession, and they receive a reduced licensing fee.

- held an active health care provider license within 10 years prior to his/her initial application for the retired volunteer medical worker license;
- does not have any restrictions to practice due to violations of the Uniform Disciplinary Act; and
- registers with a local emergency services or management organization affiliated with the Emergency Management Division of the Military Department (PHRC program is an affiliate)

An individual who holds a volunteer medical worker license and is registered as an emergency worker (as in the PHRC) is considered a "covered volunteer". Covered volunteers are immune from liability for the acts or omissions of a covered volunteer while providing assistance or transportation during a disaster or participating in an approved training or exercise in preparation for an emergency or disaster. Immunity applies when the covered volunteer was acting without compensation, within the scope of his/her assigned duties, and under the direction of the local organization with which he/she had been registered. The immunity does not apply to acts of gross negligence or willful misconduct.
