Stayc Velarde (Dallas, TX)

Stayc has been volunteering her time since the early age of 6. She has devoted countless hours to many different charities, but the ones closest to her heart have been cancer charities. This was due, in part to a terminal diagnosis of lymphoma in 1996. Stayc overcame her diagnosis and continued to volunteer her time for other charities. This was until her five year survival date, September 11, 2001. The day that changed the world, made her very aware of what she needed to do. Since that time, she has encouraged countless individuals to join Team in Training, the number one fundraiser for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Stayc thought she would take her message of volunteerism on the road, and began entering pageants, at the age of 36. She is now the reigning Mrs. Universal Achievement and tours the United States speaking about the importance of volunteerism and cancer survival.



Yvette Darby (Cleburne, TX)

Although Yvette Darby retired from public education after 23 years in the classroom, her role as teacher did not end. Darby was recently presented with the President's Volunteer Service Award for the 144 hours she gave to Cleburne ISD's TEAM School, teaching Spanish and tutoring students working on their high school foreign language credit. The retired teacher, who taught both Spanish and French during her years at Cleburne High School and was also chairman of the Foreign Language Department, was one of seven individuals honored for the number of volunteer hours they gave to CISD students and teachers in the 2004-2005 school year.
