Distribution of Smith-Lever Act Funds for Fiscal Year 2005

Attached is a tabulation (Attachment A) reflecting your institution's share of the fiscal year (FY) 2005 formula allocation and the required offset for extension activities. The Smith-Lever funds were calculated using the 2000 census data. The CSREES-OD-1088-F, Distribution of Smith-Lever Act Funds, for FY 2005 is also attached. Extension programs funded under section 3(d) of the Smith-Lever Act and allocated through a formula method include the Pest Management and Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP).

Section 203 of the Agricultural Research, Extension, and Education Reform Act of 1998 (AREERA) (Pub. L. No. 105-185) amends section 3 of the Smith-Lever Act (7 U.S.C. 343) by requiring all funds authorized under sections 3(b) and (c) to be fully matched out of non-Federal funds. This applies to all formula funds authorized under section 3(b) and (c) of the Smith-Lever Act, including the retirement and special needs formula programs. It should be noted that the funds used to match the special needs and retirement formula funds may be used for any extension activity approved as part of the plan of work. In addition, the matching requirement for 1862 Land-Grant Institutions in the Insular Areas is 50 percent of the Federal formula funds per section 7213 of the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (FSRIA) (Pub. L. No. 107-171). State Extension Directors in Insulars Areas should refer to my memo to them dated March 10, 2003, concerning matching requirements for formula funds. The matching funds should be included on the budget form in the same manner as the other formula matching funds have been in previous fiscal years.

Copies of the Smith-Lever budget form and the budget instructions, as well as the Certification of Offset forms (FMB-2103A, FMB-2103B, and FMB-2103C), Certification Regarding Lobbying for FY 2005 and the Primary Contact Person Form are attached. INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARING SMITH-LEVER BUDGETS

General: The Smith-Lever budget contains 3 pages. It is used to budget the formula funded programs and **should not** include amounts for individual project proposal funding. Preparation of the budget is as follows:

1. The first page is a summary of all funds (except project proposal funds) available to the State to carry out Extension programs. The fund sources are shown on the left side of the statement. A column is provided to include the estimated amount of carryover funds, which together with the current allocation gives the total amount to be budgeted. The amount included in the current allocation column for Smith-Lever funds as well as the amount included in the offset column must agree with your Attachment A. The offset must agree with your FMB-2103, Certification of Offset, submitted for the current fiscal year. This offset amount should be no more than the amount listed on Attachment A. The amount of other program funds included in the current allocation column should be the total amount available for obligation during the 12-month period covered by the budget. The line included for the other Federal funds is used to show funds received directly by you from other Federal agencies to finance programs that could be supported with Smith-Lever funds if sufficient Smith-Lever funds were available. This item should include funds for Cooperative Extension work received directly from such Federal sources as TVA, BIA, HHS, HUD, APHIS, ARS, etc. Do not include any funds from other Federal agencies that are authorized and made available to you under the Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service Payment Management System process.

The non-tax funds are funds received from private or non-profit sources such as Grain Associations, Farm Associations, donations, proceeds from the sale of publications, or user fees collected for services such as soil testing.

The statement includes provisions to report the amount of offset by source of funds; also, the first page contains space for appropriate budget approvals.

2. The second page of the budget contains two separate statements. The first statement shows in detail the sources of non-tax and other Federal funds and must agree with the amounts for these items appearing in the total column on page 1 of the budget.

The second statement on this page is to be completed by those States who meet offset requirements on the basis of "funds available" rather than on planned obligations. If a State uses "funds available", any unobligated or unexpended amount at the end of the year must carry over and be available for expenditure in the subsequent fiscal year. Once funds are used as offset, any carryover amounts cannot be used to offset funds in a subsequent fiscal year. If a State uses "funds available" to meet the offset requirement, it is necessary to show the funds (by

source), the total amount available, and the amount offered as offset. In most cases, two fiscal years will be involved since most States will be on a fiscal year different from the Federal fiscal year. Therefore, amounts offered as offset must be shown and the fiscal year identified. This is necessary so that the same funds are not offered again in the subsequent fiscal year.

3. The third page of the budget shows, by funding source, the budgeted amounts by object classification. The total amount budgeted must agree with the amounts included in the total column on page 1. Provision is also included to report staff equivalents (SYE) by professional, paraprofessional and/or technical, and clerical and secretarial staff.

The Section 3(c) Expanded 4-H Program is budgeted into two parts—an Urban component and a Rural Development component. In line with congressional directives in authorizing this program, two-thirds of the allocation is to be used for the Urban component and one-third for the Rural Development component. If carryover funds are included, they should be budgeted with the component from which they were carried over.

The Expanded Food and Nutrition Program (EFNEP) is separated into the Adult and 4-H component with a further breakdown between professional and paraprofessional. This is done because of the congressional intent in appropriating these funds and to help you meet the requirements of the EFNEP guidelines and revised program policy. A minimum of sixty (60) percent of the total annual budget is to be used for paraprofessional personnel and their support costs. In addition, each State is expected to continue their commitment to both adult and youth audiences, with each individual State designating the resource allocation for each. If carryover funds are budgeted, they should be budgeted to the particular component from which they were carried over.

The third page of the budget statement also provides for allocating, by object classification, the total amount budgeted from Other Program sources.

Section 319 of Public Law 101-121 (31 U.S.C.), signed into law on October 23, 1989, imposes new prohibitions and requirements for disclosure and certification related to lobbying on recipients of Federal contracts, grants, cooperative agreements and loans. Certain provisions of the law also apply to Federal commitments for loan guarantees and insurance; however, it provides exemptions for Indian tribes and tribal organizations.

Effective December 23, 1989, current and prospective recipients (and their subtier contractors and/or subgrantees) will be prohibited from using Federal funds, other than profits from a Federal contract, for lobbying Congress or any Federal agency in connection with the award of a particular contract, grant, cooperative agreement or loan. In addition, for each award action in excess of \$100,000 (or \$150,000 for loans) on or after December 23, 1989, the law requires recipients and their subtier contractors and/or subgrantees to: (1) certify that they have neighter used nor will use any appropriated funds for payment to lobbyists, (2) disclose the name, address, payment details, and purpose of any agreements with lobbyists whom recipients or the subtier contractors or subgrantees will pay with profits or nonappropriated funds on or after December 23, 1989; and (3) file quarterly updates about the use of lobbyists if material

changes occur in their use. The law establishes civil penalties for noncompliance.

If you are a current recipient of funding or have an application, proposal, or bid pending as of December 23, 1989, the law will have the following immediate consequences for you:

- You are prohibited from using appropriated funds (other than profits from Federal contracts) on or after December 23, 1989, for lobbying Congress or any Federal agency in connection with a particular contract, grant, cooperative agreement, or loan;
- You are required to execute the attached certification at the time of submission of an application or before any action in excess of \$100,000 is awarded; and
- You will be required to complete the lobbying disclosure form if the disclosure requirements apply to you.

Regulations implementing Section 319 of Public Law 101-121 have been published as an Interim Final Rule by the Office of Management and Budget as Part III of the February 26, 1990, **Federal Register** (pages 6736-6746).
