NOAA Ship THOMAS JEFFERSON Makes A New Friend

A black fin sliced the cold water dead ahead of the NOAA Ship THOMAS JEFFERSON during hydrographic survey operations east of Boston, near Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary. Before long, word circulated amongst the crew: a shark 15-20 feet in length was hanging out around

the northern end of Wildcat Knoll, just south of Tillies Bank. She was soon dubbed "Tillie" by the onboard fan club. One of JEFFERSON's NOAA Corps officers, ENS Matthew Jaskoski, holds Master's and Bachelor's degrees in Marine Biology from the University of Otago, New Zealand and the University of South Carolina, respectively. Jaskoski, who believes the shark was a great white, says, "Its sheer size is the main indicator. Its spade-shaped head with wide set eyes and narrower nose, ash grey uniform coloration with no striation,

and its dorsal and tail fin are very characteristic of a great white."

JEFFERSON's July and August survey of Wildcat Knoll was in response to a request from **National** Marine Sanctuaries. The area require marine protection in the future and the survey will help determine needs. Tillie's daily swims past the ship, as if of its presence, unaware upstaged the many whales



sighted and reported to NOAA Fisheries. But that's another story.
