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NOAA FISHERIES SERVICE WINS HALIBUT PRE-SORTING CASE

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Office of General Counsel for Enforcement and Litigation has announced final settlement in a case against the owner of the FV Rebecca Irene for pre-sorting of halibut in Alaska.

"Pre-sorting compromises the integrity and accuracy of fishery observer data and hampers the ability of NOAA Fisheries Service and the North Pacific Fishery Management Council to effectively manage Alaska's fisheries," said Assistant Special Agent-in-Charge Mike Adams, NOAA Fisheries Service Office for Law Enforcement – Alaska Division.

The case began in July 2002 with a Notice of Violation & Assessment and Notice of Permit Sanction against Rebecca Irene Fisheries LLC and Mark Decker, the captain of the vessel, and continued through the court system and into the appellate court system.

NOAA Office of the General Counsel and Rebecca Irene Fisheries LLC signed a settlement agreement in which the fishing company admitted to the violations and agreed to pay a civil penalty of \$240,000. They also agreed to a permit sanction under which the vessel and Rebecca Irene Fisheries LLC would not fish for 45 days starting July 1, 2006 and ending August 15, 2006.

Rebecca Irene Fisheries LLC will drop its appeal filed with the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Rebecca Irene's owners and operators were trawling for groundfish during the time of the violations. Halibut are incidentally caught in the trawl fishery. Such 'bycatch' is monitored as part of NOAA Fisheries Services' fishery observer system, and is controlled by law. NOAA Fisheries Service relies upon that observer data to assist it in determining and controlling the extent of halibut bycatch.

The vessel owner, Rebecca Irene Fisheries LLC, and vessel operator Mark Decker were found responsible for the crew's removal of halibut from the vessel's conveyor belt prior to the observer having an opportunity to include those halibut in the sampling. They also were found liable for failing to minimize the catch of halibut and for the crew's actions that impeded the observers' ability to perform their duties.

Special Agent Ernie Soper of OLE's Dutch Harbor field office led the investigation.
