FUTURE IN new Studio

U.S. Airways isn't Tempe's only place to find first class upgrades. The Tempe Center for the Arts (TCA), scheduled for completion in 2006, will bring state-of-the-art enhancements to the community arts experience.

"It will be wonderful to be in a purpose-built theater that has the latest innovations and the wonderful ambience that a theater should have," Actors' Renaissance Theatre Artistic Director James Barnard said. "This should help to raise the technical quality of our productions tenfold."

Soon, Tempe Little Theatre (TLT), Childsplay, A Ludwig Dance Theatre, Actors' Renaissance Theatre and others will move from their home in the Tempe Performing Arts Center in downtown Tempe to TCA's Studio, a flexible, 200-seat theater with two levels of surrounding space for technical staging or audience seating.

"From a technical standpoint, the new studio will have better acoustics, more comfortable chairs and improved parking options," TLT Technical Director Sharon Gonwa said.

Features, such as multiple stage configurations, advanced lighting, sound and stage-management controls and flexibility in the suspension of scenic elements will provide art groups with more options when creating their artistic presentations.

"One of my favorite things about working in a black box

theatre is the ability to tailor the entire room to the there ... there will be a performance, including where the

audience will sit," Childsplay Production Manager Anthony Runfola said. "The flooring in the (Studio) will be able to raise and lower with ease, creating several different staging possibilities."


Loading scenery will be easier, as well, and the catwalk system, lighting and sound equipment, control boards and adjustable stage and seating platforms all will improve the efficiency of installation.

As productions evolve, so will audiences, who arts groups want to cultivate as patrons, performers and volunteers.



Hands-on workshops



Robert Bortfeld

Ouite often, roads, like some people, have a direction and views. but not any vision. Robert "Bob" Bortfeld has both.

For more than 30 years, Bob fused his unique vision of engineering and art to create roads and manage the teams that built them. As Freeway Coordinator for the city of Phoenix he was directly responsible for managing and facilitating the approval and funding of more than 250 projects. Many of these projects received local and national awards. He also assisted in the development of the Phoenix Percent for Art Program.

Bob moved to Tempe in 1975 after earning a bachelor's degree in Civil **Engineering from the New Jersey** Institute of Technology. He has spent 15 years studying jewelry making and creating many unique stone designs of his own, and is currently an instructor of lapidary at the Mesa Art Center.

Bob's love and talent for art runs through his family. His wife, son and daughter all are involved in the

arts and have provided support for him throughout the years.

Bob retired from the city of Phoenix in 2003 and is now sharing his experience and lending valuable insights to Tempe as a member of the Municipal Arts Commission. He serves on the Facilities Committee and is helping to design the policies and guidelines to be used in the new Tempe Center for the Arts. As such, he has been very involved in the monthly user group meetings, which bring together the partner organizations for input and policy creation.

Tempe is fortunate to have Bob on its commission. His input is valuable as the city develops innovative solutions to the unique issues and challenges that arise when constructing a building that nurtures a community's vision for the arts.
