MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

On April 15th, I had the opportunity to attend a public briefing for the citizens of Minot, North Dakota, to discuss the Board's report on the derailment of a Canadian Pacific freight train. The derailment, and subsequent release of anhydrous ammonia killed one person, had an immediate effect on 11,000 of Minot's citizens, and ultimately affected the entire population of 35,000. During our visit, it was obvious that the City of Minot is a very close and proud community. We had a chance to meet some of the citizens and first responders and heard them tell remarkable stories of what happened that night. Their heroic actions were an inspiration to all who were at the briefing.

This report comprises one of the most extensive rail investigations in the NTSB's history. The Office of Railroad, Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Investigations (RPH) spent 12,700 man-hours investigating this accident. Since the Minot accident occurred, the same office investigated 56 additional accidents and completed reports for 43 others. All this with only 13 rail accident investigators for the entire country. This report is an example of the quality work we do on a daily basis, and the

dedication to the mission we have at the NTSB.

Congratulations to Bob Chipkevich and the RPH staff for their thoroughness and accuracy in the development of this report.

NTSB Participates in Coast Guard Oil Spill Exercise

The NTSB participated in the 2004 Spill of National Significance (SONS) Executive Seminar in Washington, DC this week. Special Assistant to the Chairman Patrick McCarthy attended the seminar, which was held to familiarize policy makers and agency heads with the response to a catastrophic spill event. The three day exercise simulated two simultaneous oil releases off the coast of Southern California, and the subsequent impact on the coastline.

The U.S. Coast Guard hosted the event in conjunction with the State of California, the American Petroleum Institute and the Government of Mexico. The purpose of the exercise was to validate large-scale emergency preparedness across all levels of government and industry.

NTSB Investigators Receive Safety Awards
