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Expanding U.S. Imports from UEMOA

Overall Imports

• UEMOA members are: Benin, Burkina Faso, Cote d'Ivoire, Guinea-Bissau, Mali, Niger, Senegal, and Togo.



- Each of the eight UEMOA members is a designated beneficiary country (BDC) of the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) program. Six of the eight members (Benin, Burkina Faso, Guinea-Bissau, Mali, Niger, and Togo) are eligible for additional preferences under GSP as Least Developed Beneficiary Developing Countries (LDBDCs). Five of the members are eligible for AGOA benefits (Benin, Guinea-Bissau, Mali, Niger, and Senegal). Each of these five countries is eligible for AGOA preferences with regard to apparel.
- In 2005, cocoa products accounted for one-half of total U.S. imports from UEMOA countries and petroleum products accounted for 44 percent.
- Cote d'Ivoire was the leading supplier of both cocoa and petroleum products and its imports accounted for 93 percent (\$1.14 billion) of total U.S. imports from UEMOA countries.

UEMOA Countries' Use of GSP and AGOA

• In U.S. trade data, all products eligible for GSP duty-free treatment, whether entering under AGOA or GSP, are noted as coming in under the GSP program. A product is listed as coming in under AGOA in U.S. trade data, if it is eligible for duty-free treatment only under the AGOA program. We are using the same classification of imports below.

GSP Use in 2005 by UEMOA countries

- Cocoa beans, butter, and paste, all of which have a Most Favored Nation (MFN) rate of duty of "Free," accounted for 97 percent (\$592 million) of U.S. imports of cocoa products.
- The remaining 3 percent of cocoa products cocao powder not containing sugar and defatted cocoa paste, are not MFN free but entered free of duty under GSP. They accounted for nearly three-quarters (\$17 million) of total GSP imports from UEMOA countries.

• Other leading imports under GSP included in-quota cane sugar, Kola nuts, plywood, percussion musical instruments, wooden statuettes, glycerol (a sugar alcohol), non-medical rubber gloves, and yams (see table 2 below).

AGOA Use in 2005 by UEMOA Countries

- Imports under AGOA declined to \$33,433. We believe this is largely due to Cote d'Ivoire losing eligibility for AGOA benefits effective January 1, 2005, so imports of its petroleum exports became dutiable and because Guinea Bissau, also a petroleum product supplier under AGOA stopped its petroleum product exports beginning in 2004. (see table 3).
- Footwear, luggage, and handbags (from Senegal, Mali, and Niger) accounted of 90 percent of AGOA imports in 2005. Coffee substitutes containing cottee (from Senegal) accounted for the remaining 10 percent.

Ideas to Increase Exports from UEMOA Countries

Claim eligible articles so that they receive duty-free treatment. We have analyzed current imports from each country (which we will provide). Examples of articles eligible for duty-free entry under GSP or AGOA in 2005, but for which no preference was claimed include:

- plastic bags, kitchenware, and sandals from Cote d'Ivoire (tariffs of 3%, 3.4%, and 3%, respectively);
- handbags, belts, and other leather goods from Cote d'Ivoire (tariffs of 10%, 2.7%, and 8%, respectively);
- plastic gaskets and wood doors from Mali (tariffs of 3.5% and 4.8%, respectively);
- base metal jewelry from Niger (tariff of 5.2%);
- handbags with outer surfaces of leather and of plastics from Senegal (tariffs of 10% and 20%, respectively);
- luggage of leather and worked articles of granite from Burkina Faso (tariffs of 8% and 3.7%, respectively);
- footwear with uppers chiefly of rubber or plastics and footwear with uppers chiefly of leather, from Togo (6% and 8.5%, respectively)

Export products with the greatest potential. Two recent analyses identified the following products as having the greatest potential for increased trade:

Benin: Cotton thread and fabric, and gold

Burkina Faso: Processed cotton, shea butter, and handicrafts

Cote d'Ivoire: Gold, nickel, and wood products

Guinea-Bissau: Processed cotton, cashews, fish, molluscs, and wood products

Mali: Shea butter, processed cotton, rice, mangoes, green beans, tomatoes, potatoes, meat. gold

<u>Niger:</u> Gum Arabic, sesame, cowpeas, onions, leather goods, meat, phosphates, ceramic wares, gold, cyclic alcohols and derivatives, chlorites, hypochlorites, and hypobromites

Senegal: Groundnut oil and cake, fish, phosphates

<u>Togo:</u> Processed cotton, gold, phosphates

The statistical tables below provide U.S. imports from UEMOA countries during 2002-2005 by preference programs and total (table 1), under GSP (table 2), under AGOA (except GSP) (table 3), and leading articles for which no preference was claimed (table 4). The bulk of trade in the latter group was accounted for by articles that were MFN Free (such as cocoa beans) or for which preferential treatment was not available, such as petroleum products from Cote d'Ivoire.
