

Since 1994, students have come to Cascade Streamwatch at Wildwood Recreation Site, near Welches, Oregon for hands-on, outdoor, science-based education focused on ecological concepts and interactions. Students develop and test their own hypotheses – and get help from scientists and professionals as they learn how.
