Students hone research and cross-cultural communication skills as they expand their world vision and gain perspectives that will help them succeed in the international arena. At the same time, global perceptions enhance lessons and raise awareness as students use technology to tackle universal issues such as gender equity, health, environment, diversity, and human rights. As a result, students are empowered to create a better world for all.

#### TRAVEL

Some programs include educational travel to partner countries. These physical exchanges strengthen mutual understanding and give students and teachers the opportunity to solidify virtual relationships by meeting their partners face-to-face, visiting schools and sharing information about their countries with the partner community.

#### PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Teachers receive training on computer applications, web development and the use of the Internet to enhance lesson plans. Teachers also enhance skills needed to engage in collaborative activities, such as team-building and the development of online modules that incorporate national educational standards.
