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INTRODUCTION

In Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 1999, the California Department of Social Services conducted a statewide survey of the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) caseload. A portion of the CalWORKs caseload was comprised of cases that contained only aided children; that is, all other persons in the home, including adults, were not receiving aid. This publication provides characteristics data on that "Child-Only" caseload.

Please be aware that because some people in the home are not related to and/or are not contributing to the financial support of an aided child, it is not required that all characteristic data be collected on them during the survey process. Therefore, the amount of data on unaided adults will vary from table to table.

Please refer to the original FFY 1999 CalWORKs Characteristics Survey publication for information such as program background, a description of source data and the survey process, reliability factors, etc. The publication can be found on the department's web site at www.dss.cahwnet.gov/research.

For FFY 1999, October 1998 through September 1999, the CalWORKs monthly average caseload was 624,095. Based on the cases in this survey, 31.8%, or 198,517 cases, are child-only.

For comparison purposes, references are given to tables in the FFY 1999 CalWORKs Characteristics Survey, when appropriate.

SUMMARY DATA

This publication provides characteristic information on aided children and unaided persons in child-only cases. However, regulations do not stipulate the collection of data on persons who are not related to and/or are not contributing to the financial support of an aided child. Therefore, we do not have some characteristic information on these unaided persons.

The following is a selection of key points that describe our child-only caseload:

- The percentage of CalWORKs cases that are child-only has been increasing over the past few years from 19.2% in October 1995 to 31.8% for FFY 1999.
- This child-only caseload increase is largely due to sanctioned cases, which account for 12.3% of the cases in FFY 1999.
- About 43% of adults in the child-only caseload are unaided because they are ineligible non-citizens.
- Child-only cases tend to have a higher percentage of Hispanic children than non child-only cases, 67% compared to 41%. For all CalWORKs cases combined, the percent of Hispanic children is 49%.
- In child-only cases, the number of persons in the home is roughly the same as the number of persons in homes for other CalWORKs cases.
- The mother of 32.6% of the aided children in child-only cases was married at the time of the child's birth. This compares to 39.1% for non child-only cases and 37.1% for combined CalWORKs cases.
- On average, child-only cases received a cash grant of \$73 less than non child-only cases and \$53 less than combined CalWORKs cases.

In October 1999, the department began collecting child-only data on the CA 237 Caseload Movement Report. The annual monthly average number of child-only cases from that report is lower than the monthly average from surveys. Cases in which adults are sanctioned for non-cooperation of child support or welfare to work requirements, are counted as child-only cases in the surveys, but are kept in their original designation for the CA 237 report.
