Randolph is in the southeast part of **Chilton County Union Springs 07** 1433CST 0 **6K** 1K Thunderstorm Wind (G50) Trees were blown down in the Union Springs area along County Road 73 in the western part of the county. **Chilton County** 3 NW Jemison 07 1440CST 0 0 0 0 **Funnel Cloud** A funnel cloud was reported northwest of Jemison by an off-duty National Weather Service employee. Morgan County 07 **Decatur** 1515CST 5K 0 Thunderstorm Wind (G50) Trees were downed by the wind in Decatur. **Sumter County** Livingston 1525CST 3K 1K Hail (0.75) Dime size hail was reported in Livingston in the central part of the county. **Etowah County Hokes Bluff 07** 1740CST 0 3K 1K Hail (0.75) Dime size hail was reported by the Sheriff's Department. **Coosa County** 3.5 SW Stewartsville to .5 NE Stewartsville 650K 20K 07 200 2 Tornado (F1) A small tornado began about 3.5 miles southwest of Stewartville in north central Coosa County and moved northeastward through Stewartville downing trees and damaging houses, businesses, and mobile homes. The total tornado track was estimated to be about 4 miles in length, however, the tornado track began in a wooded area south of County Road 70 where no roads existed. The tornado path was about 200 yards wide at it's widest. The tornado track ended on the northeast side of Stewartville just after crossing US 231. Two people were reported injured but none of the injuries were reported as serious. At least 11 homes were damaged, several mobile homes were damaged including two that were destroyed, and at least one business on US 231 sustained heavy damage. **Talladega County** 5 SE Sylacauga to 5 SW Sylacauga 07 1833CST 2K Thunderstorm Wind (G50) Several trees were downed in the extreme southeast corner of Talladega County along County Road 511 southeast of Sylacauga. At least one tree partially blocked the highway. This damaged apparently was caused by the same thunderstorm that produced the tornado at Stewartville in neighboring Coosa County. **Colbert County** Allsboro 1K 5K Thunderstorm Wind (G52) A gust to 60 mph was reported in the western part of the county. Franklin County **Pleasant Site** 2KThunderstorm Wind (G50)

A roof was blown off a barn in Pleasant Site in the northwest part of the county.

-	A tornado first touched down near the intersections of County Roads 11 and 67. The tornado destroyed a mobile home and threw the two occupants into a nearby corn field. They suffered minor injuries, but did not require hospitalization. The tornado then skipped along the ground for about 2.6 miles before dissipating near the intersection of County Roads 68 and 54. Damage through this area was mostly to trees with the width of damage about 200 yards.

	Shortly after the tornado lifted back into the cloud, the thunderstorm that spawned the tornado collapsed and downburst winds of near 100 mph spread out along County Road 68. Three trailers and a frame house were damaged. Two of the trailers were unsalvageable and the other had roof damage. The frame house was blown from its blocks and ended up about twenty feet from its original location. Only minor injuries occurred. Two commercial chicken houses were also damaged. Numerous trees and power lines were blown down.
