

















The Regional Archives at NARA's Northeast Region (New York City) is:

- Part of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), the Federal agency that, by law, preserves and provides access to permanently valuable, noncurrent Federal records with historical, legal, or fiscal value.
- One of 15 NARA facilities where the public has access to Federal archival records.
- A depository and center for research in historical records from Federal agencies and courts in New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
- A center for genealogical research.
- A sponsor of programs that educate the public about archives, history, genealogy, and related subjects.
- A partner with colleges and universities, historical and genealogical societies, libraries, museums, and other archives.
- A host for student interns, school groups, and others who want to learn more about archives.
- A national resource in a local setting.

We have:

Over 83,000 cubic feet of historical records dating from 1685 to the 1990s, among them photographs, maps, and architectural drawings, created or received by nearly 80 Federal agencies, including Federal courts.

We serve:

Anyone who needs historical information created or received by the Federal Government—historians, genealogists, lawyers, scholars, government officials, environmentalists, and others.

Our records are:

- Diverse in content, covering 17th and 18th century admiralty cases, the evolution of Federal courts, the Alien and Sedition Acts, sectional conflict, the Civil War and Reconstruction, Constitutional rights, immigration through Castle Garden and Ellis Island, naturalization, Chinese exclusion, economic development, business, labor, anti-trust prosecutions, inventions, organized crime, the arts, censorship, World War I, the New Deal, World War II, and the Cold War.
- Filled with historic names and places, including: Alexander Hamilton, Aaron Burr, Samuel Colt, Susan B. Anthony, Charles Goodyear, Alexander Graham Bell, Orville and Wilbur Wright, Thomas Edison, the *Titanic*,

- the *Lusitania*, Emma Goldman, Marcus Garvey, Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., Martin Luther King, Jr., "Dutch" Schultz, the Rosenbergs, Alger Hiss, and Jimmy Hoffa.
- Unique evidence of the impact of Federal policies and programs in New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

If you plan to do research in original records:

- Call before visiting to assure that records are available 866-840-1752 (toll free).
- Bring identification such as a driver's license, passport, or student ID so that we can issue you a researcher's card.
- Plan on leaving your personal belongings in a locker. Laptop computers are permitted.

Our microfilm holdings are:

- Of genealogical and local interest Federal population censuses for all States, 1790–1930; city directories for New York City, 1869–1934, and city directories for other U.S. cities, ca. 1930; telephone directories for Brooklyn and Queens, 1928–29; passenger arrival records for New York, Boston, and Philadelphia; records of Canadian border crossings; naturalization indexes for New York City and the Western District of New York; Revolutionary War service and pension records; World War I draft registration cards for New York, New Jersey, and Puerto Rico; and World War II concentration camp records.
- Of general historical interest Territorial papers; the Mathew Brady Collection of Civil War photographs; German records captured at the end of World War II; records of U.S. diplomatic missions; the Revolutionary and Civil Wars; the Government's administration of Indian affairs; the U.S. Supreme Court; the New Jersey District Court; and documentation of the Axis Powers' looting of assets, 1933–45.

If you plan to do microfilm or genealogy research:

- We offer free access to some fee-based genealogical web sites at public access computers.
- Expect to use our self-service microfilm research room with the aid of volunteers and staff.
- You may need to visit more than once, since research is time-consuming.

We are located:



The National Archives and Records Administration

We appraise, accession, arrange, describe, preserve, and provide access to the essential documentation of the three branches of Government; manage the Presidential Libraries system; and publish the laws, regulations, and Presidential and other public documents. We also administer the Information Security Oversight Office, which manages Federal classification and declassification policies, and the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, which makes grants nationwide to help nonprofit organizations identify, preserve, and provide access to materials that document American history.
