



The Regional Archives at NARA's Rocky Mountain Region is:

- Part of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), the Federal agency that, by law, preserves and provides access to permanently valuable, noncurrent Federal records with historical, legal, or fiscal value.
- One of 14 NARA facilities where the public has access to Federal archival records.
- A depository and center for research in historical records from Federal agencies and courts in Colorado, Montana, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, and Wyoming.
- A center for genealogical research.
- A sponsor of programs that educate the public about archives, history, genealogy, and related subjects.
- A partner with colleges and universities, historical and genealogical societies, museums, and other archives.
- A host for student interns, school groups, and others who want to learn more about archives.
- A national resource in a local setting.

We have:

■ More than 48,000 cubic feet of historical records dating from 1847 to the 1990s, among them photographs, maps, and architectural drawings, created or received by nearly 80 Federal agencies, including Federal courts.

We serve:

Anyone who needs historical information created or received by the Federal Government—historians, genealogists, lawyers, scholars, Government officials, environmentalists, students, and others.

Our records are:

- Diverse in content, covering the Rocky Mountain States, including homesteading, mining, Indian agencies, railroads, construction of dams and other reclamation projects, nuclear energy research, national parks and forests, naturalizations, the home front during World War II, and the proceedings of territorial courts.
- Filled with names of notable places, events, and people, among them—Hoover Dam, Yellowstone National Park, Fort Laramie, Los Alamos, the Denver Mint, and the U.S. Air Force Academy; the Confederate "invasion" of New Mexico, the Homestead Acts, and the Colorado gold rush; Pueblo Indians, entertainer "Buffalo Bill" Cody, Chief Sitting Bull, and mountain man James Beckwourth.

■ Unique evidence of the influence of Federal policies and programs in the Rocky Mountain region.

If you plan to do research in original records:

- Call before visiting to assure that records are available —303-407-5740.
- Bring identification such as a driver's license, passport, or student ID so that we can issue you a researcher's card.
- Plan on leaving your personal belongings in a locker. Laptop computers are permitted.

Our microfilm holdings are:

- Of genealogical interest Federal population censuses for all States, 1790–1930; some pre-1900 military service and pension records, and bounty land warrant applications; selected passenger arrival records and indexes for vessels arriving at various U.S. ports; some naturalization papers and indexes for Colorado, Montana, and New Mexico; and some Indian censuses for Colorado, Montana, New Mexico, South Dakota, Utah, and Wyoming.
- Of general historical interest Territorial papers; the Mathew Brady Collection of Civil War photographs; German records captured at the end of World War II; records of U.S. diplomatic missions, the Revolutionary and Civil Wars, the Government's administration of Indian affairs, and the U.S. Supreme Court; records documenting the unexplained loss of Navy flight 19 in the Bermuda Triangle, 1945; and documentation of the Axis Powers' looting of assets, 1933–45.

If you plan to do microfilm or genealogy research:

- Expect to use our self-service microfilm research room with the aid of volunteers and staff.
- Because research is time-consuming, you may need to visit more than once.

We are located:


- At the Denver Federal Center, close to West Sixth Avenue and Kipling Street, in the Lakewood section of Denver.
- About 6 miles west of downtown Denver. Take Broadway south to Eighth; Eighth west to Kalamath; Kalamath south to West Sixth; West Sixth about 5 miles to Kipling; Kipling south to Gate 1 of the Denver Federal Center.
- Our microfilm research room is in Building 46.
- Our main facility is in Building 48.

If you need photocopies:

- For a fee, our staff will make or arrange for copies of records and provide certified copies for legal use.
- You can use self-service copiers for a fee to make paper copies from microfilm.
- Self-service copying of original records may be allowed, depending on the condition of the records.

We encourage you to volunteer:

- To assist genealogical researchers.
- To work on archival preservation and other historical records projects.



The National Archives and Records Administration

ensures, for citizens and Federal officials, ready access to essential evidence that documents the rights of American citizens, the actions of Federal officials, and the national experience. We establish policies and procedures for managing U.S. Government records and assist Federal agencies in documenting their activities, administering records management programs, scheduling records, and retiring noncurrent records. We appraise, accession, arrange, describe, preserve, and provide access to the essential documentation of the three branches of Government; manage the Presidential Libraries system; and publish the laws, regulations, and Presidential and other public documents. We also administer the Information Security Oversight Office, which manages Federal classification and declassification policies, and the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, which makes grants nationwide to help nonprofit organizations identify, preserve, and provide access to materials that document American history.












