D.C. Voting Rights Bill

- ✤ Majority passage in House and Senate plus the President's signature
- Could be challenged in court
- ✤ Could possibly be repealed

D.C. Voting Rights Constitutional Amendment

- ♦ Two-thirds of House and Senate and threefourths of state legislatures
- Permanent addition to the Constitution
- ◆ 1978 Voting Rights Amendment ratified by only 16 states, not the necessary 38 states

Recent D.C. Voting Rights Highlights

1993—Two day debate and vote in the House on Norton's D.C. Statehood bill **1993**—Norton wins the vote on House floor in Committee of the Whole on most House business **1995**—Delegate vote is rescinded by new Republican majority in the House **1995**—Norton introduces D.C. congressional voting rights bill instead of statehood bill after D.C. gives up major state costs **2000**—U.S. Supreme Court rejects two D.C. voting rights cases

2001—Norton and Senator Joe Lieberman introduce the No Taxation Without Representation Act for D.C. voting rights

2002

- ★ National D.C. Voting Rights Coalition formed. Leads D.C. residents to meetings with every Senate office
- ★ Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle meets with D.C. leaders. Sponsors bill
- ★ Norton gets first Senate and House voting rights hearings in a generation
- ★ Senate Governmental Affairs Committee passes bill. Sends voting rights to the Senate floor
