### Lead Poisoning and Children: The Need to Stay Aware

Lead is a useful and common metal that has been used by humans for thousands of years. Even so, it is a very dangerous poison, particularly for children, when it is accidentally inhaled or ingested. Unfortunately, lead poisoning is all too common. Nationally, about 310,000 children have elevated blood lead levels.

Lead has no known purpose in our body. It contributes to learning disabilities resulting in decreased intelligence, to behavior issues, to decreased physical growth and more. Extremely high levels of lead cause death and tragically several U.S. children have died in the last couple of years.

Lead is found frequently in our environment. For example, lead is commonly found in houses built before 1978. While leaded paint chips and dust probably contribute most to the lead children have in their bodies, there are many other ways that children can be exposed to lead. Imported candies, drinking water, soil, and imported pottery are just a few sources of lead. In fact, one of the children who died in the U.S. was a young boy who swallowed a piece of jewelry containing lead.

Over the past two decades regulations have been established to reduce or eliminate lead in products like gasoline and paint. In other words, while lead used to be a common ingredient in gasoline and paint they are now generally manufactured without lead. This has greatly reduced the number of lead-poisoned children. Despite these new rules, lead is still a **real** problem that continues to poison thousands of children.

# Real Fresh Air Doesn't Come in a Can The facts about air fresheners

We all love fresh air. And if you define fresh air as unpolluted outdoor air, the ideal indoor "air freshener" is an open window. But that's not always practical for child care providers. To cover up the not-so-pretty smells you may experience occasionally, you might turn to the kind of air freshener you buy at a store.

You're not alone. About \$9 billion worth of air fresheners and related fragrance products for homes are sold every year. The companies that sell air fresheners constantly introduce creative new products with names like Country Berries, Hawaiian Breeze and Suddenly Spring. Or, if you really want to get down to business, you could try the one called Super Odor Killer.

But some of these products may compromise the health of the children and staff at your child care. An extensive 1999 study by researchers at the University of Bristol in England reported that, in private homes where air fresheners were used most days, babies less than six months old had 30 percent more ear infections than those where air fresheners were used less than once a week. This study also noted that mothers suffered from 25 percent more headaches and 19 percent more depression in homes where aerosols and air fresheners were used frequently.

Last May, University of California at Berkeley researchers reported that three of the four air fresheners they sampled contained substantial quantities of terpenes, chemicals that may react with ozone (also commonly found in indoor air) to produce a number of toxic compounds. Many experts also believe air fresheners can worsen asthma symptoms.

Small children face additional risks from simply having these types of products around them. They can get spray or oils in their eyes, for example. Local poison control centers in the U.S. reported a total of 16,242 incidents of toxic exposures from air fresheners in 2004, says the American Association of Poison Control Centers. More than 80 percent of those exposures involved children under six years old.

The State of Montana's Department of Public Health and Human Services specifically recommends avoiding the use of air fresheners and scented candles at child care centers.

Some air fresheners pose more of a risk than others. But the total chemical composition of most of these products remains a closely-guarded secret. The federal government's Household Products Database (see Resources box) does provide useful information, by product name, about some air fresheners. For instance, you will learn that aerosol air fresheners often contain the flammable propellants butane and propane. But many air fresheners do not list any specific ingredients, neither in the database nor on product labels and packaging.

One line of home "air sanitizer" products claims to be better than air fresheners, since it kills odor-causing bacteria in the air rather than just covering up odors. But an aerosol version of this product consists of 25 to 35 percent "liquefied, sweetened petroleum gases," and is highly flammable, according to the Household Products Database.



In addition to the questionable chemicals in some air fresheners, the newest products often have an additional cost, both environmentally and financially: You need batteries or electricity to run them. Several products have fans, and Procter & Gamble offers an air freshener unit for around \$30 that plays "scent discs," using a concept similar to a CD player.

Even with less expensive air fresheners, the cost of buying sweet smells can quickly add up. Aerosol sprays commonly sell for \$1.79 to \$4, while plug-ins and fan-operated units may cost \$5 to \$15, plus the additional cost of the fragrance refills.

Rather than masking odors as most air fresheners do, try to remove odors at the source.

Experts from the Local Hazardous Waste Management Program in King County recommend using baking soda to absorb smells on carpets or in garbage cans. You can also reduce odors simply by taking the trash out more often. If mold is the issue, work on getting rid of it, because health issues associated with mold can go far beyond the unpleasant smell. Open a screened window for at least part of the day, if that option is open to you. If you are in a building with a <a href="heating.yentilating">heating.yentilating</a>, and <a href="mailto:air conditioning">air conditioning</a> (HVAC) system, make sure vents are not blocked, air flow is adequate, and filters are changed regularly.

Don't believe all the advertising about air fresheners. The children and staff at your child care will be safer, and healthier, without them.

# Disaster and Emergency Preparedness for Child Care Providers: Excellence Award Series

This class is designed for <u>child care center directors</u> and other in-charge <u>center staff</u>. Seattle Emergency Management and Public Health – Seattle & King County have joined together to provide a program designed to help child care providers develop a comprehensive disaster plan (as required by WAC) and effectively prepare for everything from earthquakes to pandemic flu. The training has 5 main components:

- Developing a plan
- Stocking appropriate supplies
- Educating staff, children, and parents about disasters and your disaster plan
- Planning, running, and evaluating effective drills
- Identifying and mitigating hazards

Take-away items include a modifiable plan, sample forms, and a response flip chart. This class is a condensed version of our 10 hour Disaster and Emergency Preparedness training. Participants will be encouraged to use their new knowledge and materials to prepare their child care site for a disaster and to apply for the "Child Care Excellence Award in Disaster Preparedness."

### FROM Interstate 5 Northbound


