A series of three classes for child care cooks and others involved in menu planning and food preparation!

Saturday, August 20 Back to Basics and Menu Planning

This class will include basics such as menu requirements and figuring how much food to prepare. Preparation of breakfast foods will also be covered.

Saturday, Sept. 10

Food Safety and Sanitation: Cleaning Products in the Kitchen

This class will include food safety, cleaning and sanitizing. The second half of the class will focus on strategies to incorporate special needs requirements into the menu. Preparation of snacks will also be covered.

Ask the Child Care Health Team...

Dear Child Care Team,

We have a 3 year old, new to our program, who doesn't listen and can't (or won't) follow the class routines. We've heard from another parent that he was asked to leave 2 other programs but when we talk to his mom she says he has no problems. What can we do?

- Concerned Child Care Provider

Dear Concerned,

This brief questions raises concerns that child care providers have voiced for many years: Parents who don't tell providers about their children's problems and who "deny" the child has any problems. The parent is probably desperate for a stable child care situation for her child and is hoping that this new placement will work out. It is likely that they have left other centers feeling unsupported and even disliked or disrespected. Establishing a trusting and working partnership with this parent will be a challenge. At this point she probably does not feel "safe" enough to share the child's child care history. The parent may also not be willing to hear what she perceives as "negative" comments about her child. The task for you is to begin to build a good relationship with the parent.

Start by asking yourself what your commitment is to keeping the child in your program. If your program rarely dis-enrolls children, let the parent know that you are committed to keeping the child in your program. If you cannot commit to working with the child, try to help the parent locate a placement that will work. Either way, let the parent know she must commit to working as a team with teachers and other community supports if necessary.

If you commit to working with the child, work on building a relationship with the parent through positive comments and descriptive feedback about the child. This will be more effective than reports of the child's daily difficulties. Establish conference times to sit and discuss the child's progress. Describe the problems you see using descriptions of behavior instead of making judgement or coming to conclusions. These parent/teacher conferences can be brief, but should allow for the exchange of ideas and problem solving. Develop a plan to address the child's difficulties, including the use of outside community resources as needed. Remember that taking the time to establish a relationship with the parent is the most valuable thing you can do.

Ask the Child Care Health Team...

Reportable Diseases

What is a "Reportable Disease" and why do I need to report it to Public Health?

Child care providers are required to contact Public Health when a child in their care develops a "Reportable Disease." Most of these "Reportable Diseases" are communicable diseases, some of which are easily spread in child care programs. Public Health wants to know about these conditions so we can help keep other people from getting sick. A list of "Reportable Diseases" that might be found in child care is on the next page.

A child in my program was just diagnosed with an infection with *E. coli* O157:H7, which is one of the "Reportable Diseases" (see previous). What will happen when I call Public Health to report it?

Public Health Communicable Disease staff will help you identify if other children or staff at your program are at risk for getting infected with *E.coli* O157:H7 . They will go over:

- ✓ the symptoms of infection with E.coli O157:H7 (severe cramps, diarrhea, which is sometimes bloody)
- ✓ how it is passed from one person to another (contact with the stool from someone who is infected)
- ✓ how long the person was contagious (children are usually contagious for 2 to 3 weeks. In rare cases, they can be contagious for as long as 2 to 3 months).

In addition Communicable Disease staff can also help you determine:

- ✓ How to prevent cases of *E.coli* O157:H7 infection among other children and staff (handwashing, good diaper changing technique, disinfection of surfaces and toys)
- ✓ How long the child must be excluded from child care (until two stool tests show that the E.coli O157:H7 bacteria is gone)
- ✓ If there are other children in the program who also have symptoms and should be checked by their doctor

Public Health will usually provide you with a customized letter for you to distribute to other parents at your program. This letter would include symptoms of *E.coli* O157:H7 infection, and information about when parents should take a child to the doctor. **The child who was ill would not be identified.** These resources (education, letters, factsheets, etc.) are available to you when you report any of the "Reportable Diseases" to Public Health.

How do I report a "Reportable Disease" to Public Health?

REPORTABLE DISEASES FOR CHILD CARE PROVIDERS

Because communicable diseases can spread quickly in child care settings, and because some of these diseases can be very serious in children, licensed child care providers in Washington are required to notify Public Health when they learn that a child has been diagnosed with one of the communicable diseases listed below (WAC 246-101-415¹). In addition, providers should also notify Public Health when an unusual number of children and/or staff are ill (for example, >10% of children in a center, most of the children in the toddler room), even if the disease is not on this list or has not yet been identified.

¹ WAC 246-101-415 Responsibilities of child day care facilities. Child day care facilities shall: (1) Notify the local health department of cases or suspected cases, or outbreaks and suspected outbreaks of notifiable conditions that may be associated with the child day care facility. (2) Consult with a health care provider or the local health department for information about the control and prevention of infectious or communicable disease, as necessary. (3) Cooperate with public health authorities in the investigation of cases and suspected cases, or outbreaks and suspected outbreaks of disease that may be associated with the child day care facility. (4) Child day care facilities shall establish and implement policies and procedures to maintain confidentiality related to medical information in their possession.
