Jeff Marotta opened the meeting and attendees introduced themselves. Two new people to the problem gambling services system were introduced; Josh White who will serve as the clinical supervisor over the OHSU program and Carol Chism who will be the problem gambling treatment counselor for Columbia County. Welcome to both Josh and Carol.

Announcements & In the News

- Tillamook County is recruiting for a gambling counselor or MA level counselor willing to be trained as a problem gambling treatment specialist. Please call Wendy Robinson at 503 842-8201 x324 if you or someone you know is interested.
- Peter Walsh, Cascadia, shared that August 17th will be the opening celebration of the new residential treatment facility. They are recruiting for a part-time counselor to work within this program. Peter shared the referral procedures for client entry into the residential treatment program (attached).
- Malheur County has a new woman's based GA meeting.
- ADAPT in Roseburg has partnered with a medical clinic to offer on-site behavioral health assistance. The Roseburg gambling counselor reported that he has already gotten a few new clients from this new avenue.

- The Central Oregon problem gambling program reported that satellite offices were opened in Crook and Jefferson counties; also facilitating the expansion of GA into Redmond.
- Federal legislation regarding additional funding for problem gambling awareness campaign, research and prevention, and treatment has been proposed to the US House of Representatives. HR 6009 represents the first time in the history of the United States that a bill to specifically provide federal funding for problem gambling treatment has been introduced.

The feature of "In the news" is the opening of the new inpatients treatment facility. Numerous media outlets throughout Oregon picked up this news release.

Oregon Lottery

Chuck Bauman from the Oregon Lottery announced the printing of the new stickers will be complete by the end of August, and will be placed on the machines by December. The new help line number is 877-MY-LIMIT and it will be displayed on the machines and also in the new ads. The current help line number 877-2STOP-NOW will remain in effect for the foreseeable future. The new number is designed to reach an audience looking to cutback on their gambling as opposed to "stopping now". The new number will be effective September 1st. Both numbers will continue to be used.

Quality Improvement Updates

Janese Olalde discussed site visits and what people should expect. The site visits are designed to check if providers are following the requirements of Service Element 81. A copy of the draft revaluation form used for site visits will be sent to providers. A full procedure guide for the reviews is still in development.

Workforce Development

The Fall Advanced Clinical Training will take place in Bend on Oct. 4-6. The October 4th training is supplemental to the main event and will focus on technical aspects of writing treatment plans, progress notes, and discharge summaries. The main training will be October 5 and 6. The trainers, Dr. Grant & Dr. Winters, presenting on October 5 & 6 are widely known experts in their fields and excellent speakers. Registration for this event is now open.

New gambling protocol will be out soon. There are some new changes. Semiannual report cards are also coming out soon. Corrections need to be sent into Tom by the end of this month. Claims are going up but enrollments are flat. This suggests that clients are remaining in treatment longer and/ore receiving more intensive services. Also points to the need to do more outreach to increase new enrollments.

Introductions

Service Elements Revisions

DHS County Financial Assistance Agreement Service Elements AD80, AD81, and AD83 are the guidelines for how our services are done. We are now looking for feedback as to what aspects of these service elements need to be revised to improve efficiency, effectiveness, and accountability. The Policy Committee reviewed AD81 &83 and the Prevention Committee reviewed AD 80.

AD 81 discussed changes:

- Change or remove episode cap
- Change treatment plan review to every 60 days to correspond with A&D rules
- Set time frame for intake assessment
- Allow therapeutic fee charges

AD 83

Discussion mainly focused on therapeutic fees and when or whether to include them. More support for use in residential programs than outpatient services. The question was deferred to larger group.
