The cable of January 3, 1943, from Mr. Nomman Tavis to tr. Richard ". Allen discussod the American Red Cross position in reference to the Jorth Afriaan Jelief problem in the event that Governor Iehman's organization shouta assume direct rasponsibility for it. In the last peracraply fald cable reference $1 s$ also made to the services anich; otrode had contemplated and oy inference it sens clear Nus that rus. avis whes us to reirain from any such comatmenti until the situation is clarified.

The services referred to gbove were:

1. A study to ovaluate the present nutritional state of the population and to letermine the nature and grav.'y of such deficlencies as may be found.
2. A typhus fever study directod owards determining the extent to which the Army louse powder can be relied upon to disinfest a netive civil pomulntion and also to est olim. thother in the face of an epiciomic the powder alone or he powier nlus chamicel fumbetion 111 stop transmission of the disease.

It is our considered opinion that both these studies should be held in abeyance pendine our discussions in ashington and hew York. At the same time, li has seemed advissole, inila "o are still in Alzeria, to conduct prelininary telks with mppopriote Trench officials and membens of the Facul $\%$ of Vedecine of Alaer so that rorl could start prompty if the ay is opanas by "ashin *ton agreemeris.
e veg to report our conviction that the Aremicen 7 ord ross and the Rockereller Toundation would be prepared to ongrge upon both these studies rather promptly. he mulvilon stucy pocouse of its nature is intmately ralatod to the food rellef procram, but the tymus fever study is quite indeponden thereof and could in our esteam be enaged upon br direct negociation rith the asteur Institure of Aleeria. As matter of fact we hove alreacy eqrabllshed elear understanding wh To Jdmon e eroont, Mrector of the Inati ute, and a can ropor that the stwdy can atart in Varch if facilities are provited for the transportation of personnel and supmliss from the "nited "tatee.

Ye have discussed both these studies with Colonel corby, the ranking Arerican officer at Vedical Headquarters in 17 ger, and are in a position to quote his hearty approval of bah. te expressed particular interest in the typhus study ogcouse of the velue it may have to the health of the American Army.

This lecter has as its primary obfective to sacure in principle your support to the issuing of gfecial erders by sobintion so that two or three membere of the pockafeller Toundation staff may proceed to Alker by air transport, soon aftor our return to the Unfted States.
