
U.S. Exports to the EU-25 up in the First Quarter Fueled by Western Red Alder Trade



U.S. wood exports to the EU-25 were up two percent in the first quarter of 2005 compared to the same period in 2004. Shipments of western red alder led the way with a 53-percent increase, followed by southern yellow pine at 19 percent and white oak at eight percent. U.S. exports of cherry, poplar, white oak and western red alder logs, lumber and veneer made up over 45 percent of the export mix in the first quarter of 2005. For the January-March period, Spain remained the largest export destination for U.S. wood products, followed by Italy and the United Kingdom. The United Kingdom, Germany and Italy experienced the most growth, with year-to-date shipments up 19 percent, five percent and three percent, respectively. By way of background, from 2003 to 2004, U.S. forest product exports to the EU-25 grew by more than 10 percent, the first year-to-year increase since 1997.
