NSD Restructures Department: Exciting changes coming

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Over the coming weeks, the Neighborhood Services Department will be undergoing a restructuring process that will allow us to better serve our neighborhoods and target those areas with the most need.

Under the new structure, the Codes and Community Services Division of Neighborhood Services will see the most change. The city will be divided into three major regions. Each region will be served by a team consisting of a Chief Code Enforcement Inspector, three Code Enforcement Inspectors, a Neighborhood Relations Coordinator, and a support staff member. The change will be applied

gradually over the coming weeks, and the pilot region will launch this month, with the other two teams beginning to work within their



Code Enforcement Inspectors Alphonso McClendon, Jason Chauncey, and Marcia Greene, Neighborhood Relations Coordinator Debbie Johnson, and support staff member Dianna Blackmon.

Each team will be responsible for developing a scope of work for their assigned region. The teams will be impact-focused in their work and will seek to produce measurable outcomes.

The new department structure will allow Neighborhood Services to focus codes enforcement in the areas that need it most, as well as allowing Neighborhood Services staff to provide a better quality of service to Chattanooga's neighborhoods.

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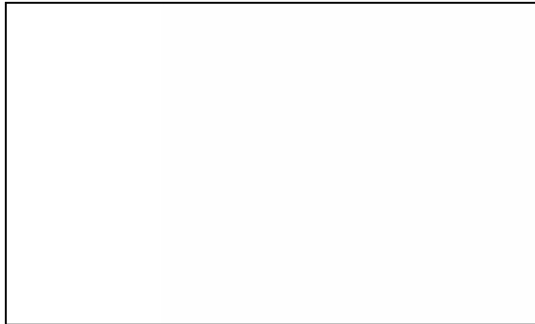
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
