

### Nuisance Properties: The Role of Code Enforcement

Topic includes presentation and discussion of the role of the Code Official in obtaining compliance with both residential and commercial properties that are a perpetual nuisance. Areas of discussion will include current ICC property maintenance codes, the role and enforcement of zoning ordinances, the impact of vacant structures and discussion of both legal and illegal non-conforming land use as they pertain to quality of life within a community.





### Plumbing and Electrical Code Concepts

Course provides an overview of plumbing installation concepts as well as an overview of the National Electrical Code (NEC). Basic concepts for construction techniques and procedures, as well as installation and inspection requirements covered.



### Cost Estimating

Course will provide a basic understanding of residential cost planning techniques including labor and material costs, overhead, hidden costs, scheduling to maintain effective spending, bid proposals and profit margins.







#### Life Safety Code Principles

Course will provide an overview of the Life Safety Code, cover construction, installation and inspection requirements, and technical

knowledge needed to ensure minimum requirements are met. Topics include terminology, plans review, building construction, egress requirements, occupancy classification and building protection systems.



### Arson Investigation

Course is designed to inform and educate participants in fire origin and cause basics. Topics include defining arson, understanding the impact of arson, defining fire, fire ignition and fire patterns and burn indicators and causes.



A general overview of current residential building codes as recognized by the International Code Council (ICC). Course will include presentation and discussion of topics including building planning, fire protection, occupancy needs, structural systems, structural materials, building envelope, non-structural materials, and building services and
