

District Forester, Bob Gustavson, 2007 Comments

2007 Repeated itself with a significant number of personnel changes in the District as the Baby Boomers keep on retiring, and the chain reaction of vacancies occur across the State; not the least of which was our own, Dave Johnson, who manned the helm as the Forest Grove District Forester for over 16 years. Dave retired in November and Bob Gustavson once again stepped in to manage the district operations. In December, Bob was selected to fill the position permanently and brings a wealth of experience in forestry and leadership. Bob started the District Forester role on Jan. 1, 2008.

Four other Forest Grove District personnel retired in 2007 as well. They are featured in the "Retirements" page of this report – yes, we had enough retirements to create an entire page for them.

As luck would have it, the weather was on our side for the most part this season with very timely moisture in July and August which helped moderate conditions considerably and reduce the length of fire season. Very effective initial attack by the district and RFD cooperators kept the acres burned to a minimum. In 2007, our acres burned were only 38% of the 5-year average and total number of fires reached 70% of average. Another significant accomplishment was the completion of the Community Wildfire Protection Plans for both Columbia and Washington Counties.

The Private Forests program had a very successful year working with landowners and operators across the district. With Jay Worley's retirement, Erik Perkins is covering Jay's area and Tom Kennedy was hired to fill the vacancy with Mark Reed promoting to Columbia City.

It was another remarkable year for the State Forests staff; generating nearly 71.3 million board feet of timber, fertilizing 3466 acres of timberland, building 3.9 miles of trails and improving 14 miles of forest roads. This list just scratches the surface of what occurred in 2007, so please see the State Forest accomplishments page for a complete list of stats.

Early December brought high winds and heavy rainfall to the North Coast area. The State Forest lands in the Forest Grove District received only minor wind-throw damage but the road and trail infrastructure sustained significant damage due to the intense rainfall. Estimated costs for the repairs are \$1.8 million to date and some areas that need to be assessed are still buried by snowpack. Discussions are underway with FEMA for cost share opportunities. FIRE PROTECTION

The Forest Grove District protects approximately 815,000 acres of private, county, state and federal land as a part of the Northwest Oregon Forest Protective District. This larger administrative district protects some 1.74 million acres of forestland. The primary goal of the Protection from Fire Program is to minimize the total cost and loss resulting from fire in terms of suppression cost and damage to timber and other forest values.



The District's fire prevention program continues to maintain a number of approaches to raise fire prevention awareness. Cooperative programs with city and rural fire districts at schools and parks, programs at summer camps and other public events, and participation in parades all help to promote public fire safety. The Smokey Bear Team Teaching Program is a valuable tool for raising fire-safety awareness, and reaches some 1600+ first-grade children throughout the District.

The 2007 Fire Season began July 5th and ended October 1st. The fire season began with fire danger indices building rapidly after the July 4th Holiday. However, precipitation in July and again in August moderated the fire season build-up indices

significantly. The total length of the fire season was 88 days; well below the 102 day average length for a typical fire season. The fire activity level within the District was well below normal for both the number of fires and the acres burned. Fire activity at a statewide level was higher with the district supporting a number of dispatches to Northeast and Central Oregon Districts. Public Regulated Use restrictions were in effect from July 9th to October 1st.

A significant accomplishment in 2007 was the completion of two Community Wildfire Protection Plans for Columbia and Washington Counties. These plans were developed using a collaborative process with state and federal partners, local jurisdictions and community members. The process involved assessment, establishing local priorities and the development of action plans that minimize risks to property and life resulting from wildfire events. Implementation of these action plans over time will foster meaningful understanding and participation within our communities regarding wildfire threats and what can be done to minimize these threats. A primary goal of these action plans is to implement fire safe landscaping and reduce the structural ignitability of homes within the "Home Ignition Zone", an area that includes the structure itself and its immediate surroundings within 100 to 200 feet. Another program implemented within the District was the "Home Makeover Contest" This contest had excellent media coverage that helped demonstrate the concepts of fire safe landscaping and clean up around ones home. It also focused on improving the homes ignition resistive capacity by replacing flammable roofing with noncombustible roofing products and enclosing wooden decks. A number of private sponsors provided materials and services to the contest winner. In the end, this is a great example of what can be done to reduce a home's ignition risk.




WILDFIRE HOME MAKEOVER



REFORESTATION—Mitch Taylor

Most notable for the Reforestation Unit in 2007 were significant accomplishments above annual averages for planting, pre-commercial thinning and fertilization. In addition, the Department is taking a more aggressive approach to the management of noxious weeds, a task that falls to the reforestation unit within the district. In FY07 we surveyed and treated 15 lineal miles of riparian area along the Wilson River with a primary target of knotweed and 11 miles of the headwaters of Gales Creek, where we found and treated reed canary grass, Himalayan blackberry, poison hem-lock, clematis, herb Robert and scotch broom.

RECREATION—Randy Peterson

Over 10,000 visitors enjoyed camping at the five campgrounds on the district. Remodel work was started at Stagecoach Horse Camp and significant improvements are planned for the site. Contract crews upgraded 4.5 miles of Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) trail and ODF crews and volunteers completed maintenance work on more than 70 miles of non-motorized and OHV trail; and constructed 2.7 miles of new trail on the district. Design work was completed for a new 3.5 mile segment of the Wilson River Trail and a 4 mile OHV trail upgrade. Grants totaling \$117K were awarded for trail construction and upgrade. Over 450 volunteers contributed close to 6000 hours of time helping in the district's recreation efforts and forest cleanup in 2007.

ENGINEERING—Terry Orton

In the spring of 2007, we provided assistance to the Elliot Creek Stream Enhancement Project. Forest Grove equipment operators produced logs with root-wads attached to be used for fish habitat structures. A helicopter delivered the logs to the stream and put them in place. December brought storms delivering high rainfall with record stream flows in places. All district staff participated in storm damage patrols, locating roads in danger of washing out and clearing debris by hand or with our heavy equipment. Despite the approximately \$1.8 million in damage we did suffer, we were successful in preventing much more from occurring through their efforts.

MARKETING-Erik Marcy

The year 2007 saw some key personnel changes to the Market Unit. Karen Tilley retired after 30 years of service. Nate Agalzoff transferred from Astoria, Tara Carlson and Jay Sandmann transferred from limited duration to permanent status. With a fully staffed unit we were able to achieve some outstanding accomplishments. During calendar year 2007, the Forest Grove District sold 91 MMBF with a net value of \$34 million. In addition, we harvested 67.7 MMBF with a net value of \$30.4 million (for FY07, the numbers were 71.3 MMBF and \$33.3 million respectively). What makes this all the more remarkable is the Marketing Unit spent a combined 110 shifts on out-of-district assignments.












ORGANIZATIONAL CHART 12-07
