

## WIRED UPDATE June 30, 2006

November 18 – Governor's Letters were sent out announcing the WIRED Initiative SGA. Each Governor was invited to submit up to 3 proposals.

January 5 – Due date for WIRED applications. ETA began two-tiered paneling process. ETA formed WIRED Policy and Project Teams. ETA put world class technical assistance on contract: Council on Competitiveness, New Economy Strategies, Council for Adult and Experiential Learning, Arizona State University with the logistics support of MH West.

January 31 – WIRED Collaborative workspace hosted by Arizona State University goes LIVE.

February 1 – The 13 winning WIRED regions were announced. ETA assigned senior executives to each region. WIRED materials were developed including a WIRED fact sheet, a one-pager on each of the regions, a one-pager on the technical assistance team. These materials, along with others, were the beginning of the WIRED folder, which is available in the Office of Outreach.

## WIRED Regions:

Coastal Maine – 11 counties including Augusta, Bangor, & Brunswick Northeast Pennsylvania – 9 counties including Scranton, Wilkes-Barre, Allentown, and Reading

Central & Eastern Montana – 32 counties covering mostly rural areas California Innovation Corridor– 13 counties including Oakland, Los Angeles, and San Diego

February 22 – The partners from each of the 13 WIRED regions were invited to Washington, DC for a Town Hall meeting. Highlights included: U.S. Secretary of Labor Elaine L. Chao; Deborah Wince-Smith, President, Council on Competitiveness; Allan Johnson, Deputy Under Secretary for Rural Development, U.S. Department of Agriculture; Santanu Baruah, Assistant Secretary for Economic Development, U.S. Department of Commerce; Thomas Luce, Assistant Secretary for Planning, Evaluation and Policy Development, U.S. Department of Education.

Early March – ETA federal agency liaisons named. Assistant Secretary Emily DeRocco sent letters to 9 colleague Assistant Secretaries asking them to partner on WIRED and name a liaison in their respective offices to help map their federal resources into WIRED regions. These federal resource maps will later be shared at the WIRED academy and made available on the collaborative workspace.

Mid-March – ETA Assistant Secretary sent a letter to the Governors of the next 13 highest scoring WIRED proposals inviting them to participate in the Virtual 14<sup>th</sup> Region. All accepted the invitation. The invitation offered a \$100,000 planning grant, coaching sessions with the Resource Group, a day-to-day ETA liaison, access to the shared documents, federal resource mapping and issue area tool kit material on the collaborative workspace, outreach regarding future ETA SGAs or other agency RFPs, the opportunity to leverage and partner with other federal agencies, participation in WIRED Academies and Workforce Innovations.

Northern California – 21 counties stretching from above Sacramento to Oregon border

Beginning March 16 and ending May 26, Assistant Secretary Emily DeRocco, ETA senior executives appointed as regional leads, ETA's new and emerging leaders appointed as 2nds to the regions, and the technical assistance team or Resource Team traveled to each of the 13 WIRED regions for a 1 ½ day "kick off" meeting. A template agenda was developed to maintain consistency across all regional kick off meetings. Most, if not all, had a media event with elected federal, state and/or local officials. The rest of the agenda was a "roll up the shirt sleeves" discussion about the regional demographics, their proposal, the partners at the table and those that were missing and the most important topic of regional transformation—the goal of WIRED.
