Government Grants Website

<u>www.grants.gov</u>. This new site was initiated in October 2003. It allows organizations to electronically find and apply for competitive grant opportunities from all Federal grant-making agencies. You can search within the site for grant opportunities from CDC, IHS, BIA, DOJ, NHTSA, HRSA, and other federal agencies.
