Program/School: An innovative or creative project or program in a school that educates and teaches students about the value of the environment; or a school that is dedicated to building an environmental legacy for future generations.

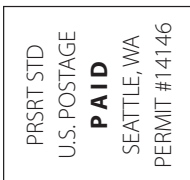
NOTE: 2005 winners are not eligible for the 2006 award. However, they may be nominated again in 2007.

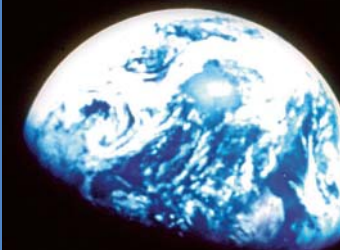


Earth Day (ûrth-day) *noun*

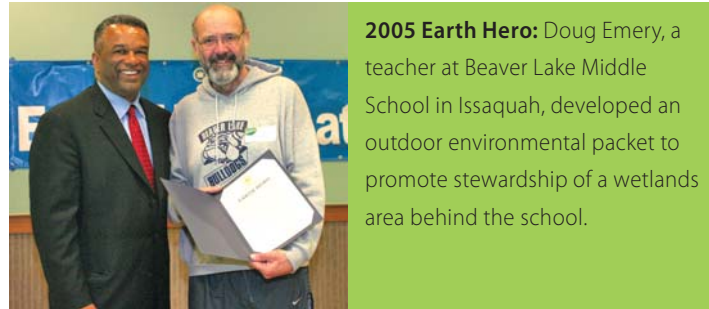
