Enterprise Architecture Assessment Framework (EAAF) Version 2.2 Released

In March 2008, OMB will assess Federal agency enterprise architectures using the OMB EA [Assessment Framework Version 2.2](#) (EAAF v2.2), which was released to agencies in October, 2007. OMB will use the assessment to evaluate agency EAs as part of the annual EA assessment process and results will be reflected in the E-GOV section of the FY2008 2nd quarter President's Management Agenda (PMA) Scorecard.

Version 2.2 of the Framework is largely an incremental revision of the previous version (v2.1). This is by design and reflects the evolving maturity of both the OMB Federal Enterprise Architecture program and individual agency EA initiatives. Many elements of the Framework remain the same, including the organization of assessment criteria into three capability areas: Completion, Use and Results, and the use of a maturity scoring scale for each assessment criterion. The timing of the assessment process remains the same, and the assessment criteria in the previous Framework still remain in the current version.

The changes incorporated into the current version of the Framework are intended to streamline the assessment process and continue agencies' focus on meeting the needs of their business communities. Major changes included in the current Framework can be summarized as follows:

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- A [new criterion](#) has been added to the Results capability area to measure EA program value. This reflects recent updates to the FEA Practice Guidance, available soon at www.egov.gov.
- The assessment scoring algorithm is updated. In order to achieve a Green (Acceptable) rating, agencies must score at least an average of "4" in all three capability areas: Completion, Use and Results.
- The process of submitting evidence of maturity has been simplified. Agencies need only submit artifacts demonstrating the highest level of maturity achieved for a given criteria. If these artifacts do not sufficiently demonstrate maturity, OMB may request additional artifacts from lower levels of maturity. There is also an increased emphasis on the EA Transition Strategy as the locus of all enterprise transition information.

Consolidated Reference Model (CRM) 2.3

Version 2.3 of the Consolidated Reference Model (CRM) has been released and is available at the [FEA Reference Models](#) link of the www.egov.gov web page. The CRM is a tool used by the agencies for developing their architectures.

Revisions to the reference models were made based on proposed changes and suggestions received as part of the Reference Model Maintenance Process

New Leadership at the FEA PMO

Richard “Dick” Burk retired at the end of September after a 35 year distinguished career of public service. The last 2-1/2 years Dick served as the OMB Chief Architect within the Office of E-Government and Information Technology and was responsible for the Federal Enterprise Architecture Program Management Office (FEA PMO). Prior to OMB, Dick’s 30-year career at HUD Headquarters spanned the research, demonstration and management of most Federal activities in the fields of community development and housing rehabilitation. He worked in the City of Columbus Finance Department before coming to HUD in Washington, DC. Prior to graduate school, he served for two years as a Peace Corps Health Volunteer in Uganda, East Africa. Dick’s notable contributions will resonate in the Federal government for many years to come.

As of October 1, 2007, leading the FEA PMO is Acting Chief Enterprise Architect, Kshemendra Paul. Kshemendra served as Chief Enterprise Architect for the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) and was also DOJ’s Program Manager for the National Information Exchange Model (NIEM). In this role he led efforts around data standards and inter-operability across Federal, State and Local stakeholders, resulting in adoption of NIEM as the basis for terrorism information sharing. Kshemendra also served as the co-Chair of the Services Subcommittee of the Architecture and Infrastructure Committee, where he was part of the team leading the development of the Practical Guide to Federal Service Oriented Architecture

Kshemendra was honored in 2006 with the Federal Computer Week IT Award celebrating the top executives from government, industry and academia having the greatest impact on the

government information systems community.

Mr. Paul has over 23 years of experience in strategic planning, enterprise architecture, organizational management and systems development. Before joining the civil service in 2005, Mr. Paul was an active entrepreneur, co-founding LocalEyes (sold to AOL) and founding Andelina (sold to FoundryOne). He has participated as a member of senior management for a variety of other technology product and service companies. He holds both Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Electrical Engineering, and an additional Bachelor's degree in Mathematics, from the University of Maryland, College Park.
