Additional Information about the Workshop

MMS was given the responsibility for regulating alternative energy development in the Federal offshore environment (beyond 3 miles) by the Energy Policy Act of 2005. The Atlantic Coast from Maine to North Carolina is anticipated to be of particular interest for offshore wind development.

A major environmental concern associated with wind power development is its potential impacts on birds. This workshop is designed to review existing knowledge, examine mitigation and monitoring approaches, identify research priorities, and explore partnership opportunities.
