## Office of Mental Health and Addiction Services Children's System Change Initiative UPDATE May 5, 2005

### **MHO Contract and Rate Setting Being Finalized**

OMHAS will implement financial and contractual changes for the CSCI on October 1, 2005. Additional time has been needed to gain approval for managed care rate methodology and contract changes with the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). This was due to complications in rate setting and longer timelines for federal approval of planned contract changes. Barring any unexpected and unlikely delays from CMS, OMHAS will achieve the new date for the integration of PRTS and PDTS funding into the MHO agreement.

### **Implementation of CSCI Referral Coordination**

Effective July 1<sup>st</sup> there will be important contract amendments. First, there are amendments to the CMHP (Community Mental Health Program) agreement that require a community-based decision-making process be developed for non-Medicaid eligible and non-enrolled children who may need facility-based intensive mental health treatment services. This will include assessment, administration of the CASII, service coordination, referral to the appropriate type of care, as well as community transition and aftercare services. Second, contracts with PRTS (Psychiatric Residential Treatment Services) and PDTS (Psychiatric Day Treatment Services) providers will be amended to require the development of a process to accept referrals from CMHPs and MHOs. Similarly, the MHOs have been collaborating with CMHPs and community partners in developing a process and protocol for the Level of Need Determination in their respective communities for enrolled children.

Based on stakeholder feedback, the hearing draft has been completed and distributed; the hearing will be held on June 1<sup>st</sup> @ 9am in HSB-137. It is not necessary to attend the hearing to offer testimony. Written testimony will be accepted via letter, fax, or e-mail until 5pm on the date of the hearing. We thank those who have taken the time to participate and offer comments. The permanent ICTS rule will be filed on July 1, 2005. OMHAS staff have developed certification criteria for potential ICTS providers that will be distributed soon. ## **Memorandums of Understanding**

OMHAS is working closely with state agency partners in the Oregon Department of Education (ODE), the DHS Children, Adults, and Families (CAF), and the Oregon Youth Authority (OYA) to develop memorandums of understanding (MOUs).
