The Oregon Department of Corrections encourages visits between inmates and their relatives and friends. This information is designed to assist in making the visiting process a more positive experience. Please read and become familiar with this guideline regarding the visiting program. ## **Visiting Hours:**

7:15 a.m. - 10:15 a.m. Sat, Sun, Holidays

1:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Sat, Sun, Holidays

6:30 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. Fridays only

Please do not arrive more than 30 minutes prior to the start of the visiting session.

Visitor processing stops 30 minutes before the end of each visiting session. Prior to that, visitors may begin a visit at any time during the session.

Visitors are limited to one visiting session each day. If you would like an exception, please contact Mr. Fritz 4-7 days in advance at (541) 325-5700.

## **Directions to Deer Ridge Correctional Facility (DRCI):**

**Driving North on Hwy 97 into Madras:** You will drive through until you get to the second street light and turn right onto B Street.

**Driving South on Hwy 97 into Madras:** Pass the Safeway store going down the hill. Turn left at the second light onto B Street.

**Once on B Street:** Pass Jefferson County Middle School on your right as you go up the hill. Pass Juniper Park on your left at the top of the hill. Turn left at the "Deer Ridge Correctional Institute" sign and drive to the top of the hill. The DRCI Administration building will be on your left. The minimum-security facility is at the far end.

## Visiting

### General Visiting Information

You will be allowed to visit once your application is approved and entered into the DOC computer system. Please know that the approval process takes time and plan accordingly.

It is the inmate's sole responsibility to request that you be added to or removed from his visiting list, including the application process. DOC runs criminal background checks on all applicants for visiting. It will be the inmate's responsibility to inform requested visitors if they have been approved or denied.

- Visiting time is allocated to inmates using a point system. For you to visit, you must be on the inmate's approved visiting list and the inmate must have sufficient points to cover your visit. Inmates have a minimum of 24 points on the first day of the month. Points do not carry over from month-to-month.
- At the minimum facility, one point is deducted for each visitor for each visit. Points are not deducted for children under the age of two.
- Currently, only the DRCI minimum facility is open. When the medium and minimum facilities are both open, they are considered one prison. Visitors may not be on more than one inmate's visiting list per prison unless they are immediate family.
- Visitors and inmates are not permitted to visit with a person who is not authorized for the current visit.
- Any special visiting arrangements must be made and approved prior to the visit. Inmates should work through their counselors or Mr. Fritz for special requests.
- Inmates assigned to special housing (DSU) in the minimum facility may not have visits.

The conduct of all visitors is expected to conform to the standards of common decency, consideration and concern that we would expect from others.

***Any visitor who exhibits indication of the use of alcohol, narcotics or other intoxicants shall not be permitted to visit.***

### Contraband

**Visitors shall not possess or carry onto the grounds of any Oregon Department of Corrections facility:**

- Explosive devices
- Firearms or ammunition
- Alcoholic beverages
- Narcotics
- Dangerous drugs
- Objects and materials of any kind that might be used to compromise the safety and security of the facility.
- Tobacco in any form is prohibited from coming into the facility.

## Visiting

**Identification:** Upon arrival at the visiting desk/reception area, visitors must sign a registration form and present proper identification (ID). Visitors must keep this ID with them throughout their visit.

- **Minor children:** To visit, minor children must be on the inmate's approved visiting list. Each child must have proper ID and be accompanied by an adult visitor. Minors must behave appropriately and never be left unattended while on the grounds of or inside the facility.

### Proper ID

**To protect the safety and security of the institution, all visitors *must* present proper identification upon arrival for visiting, or the visit will be denied.**

- Ages 16 and older: Current driver's license or state identification (state employee or Division of Motor Vehicles), passport, military identification, student identification card, or other official government identification.
- Under age 16: Birth certificate or registration, Social Security Card, Oregon Health Plan ID card, student body card, or state identification card (Division of Motor Vehicles).

**Screening and metal detectors:** All visitors must clear the metal detectors. Exceptions are made for visitors with written documentation from their doctors certifying medical conditions or disabilities that preclude them from passing through the detector.

DOC metal detectors are highly sensitive. Be prepared to remove your shoes for inspection, jewelry, belts, suspenders, and hair accessories. Note that some undergarments contain metal stays and you may need to remove the metal parts before you can clear the detector.

If an individual sets off the alarm of the metal detector, additional screening *may* include either a hand-wand inspection in conjunction with a frisk search of the visitor's body including the torso; or a frisk search alone.

Except for those with documented medical condition or disabilities, visitors needing frisk searches and hand wands will have to wait until all other visitors have been processed successfully through the walk-through metal detector. Please expect a delay if you can't clear the walk-through metal detector.

**Items allowed in visiting rooms:** To protect the safety and security of the institution and its visitors, items allowed to be carried into visiting are restricted:

- **You may not bring purses, carrying cases and other items into the visiting room. Small lockers may be rented for 25 cents for storing such items during your visit.**
- The following baby-care items are allowed per child: two diapers, one **clear** bottle (plastic), one single-layer blanket, one pacifier, and diaper wipes (in a clear plastic bag). ***All items shall be subject to search.***
- \$15 in coins is allowed for vending machines. Five non-Polaroid photographs or five 8x10 of sheets of photographs are allowed for each visitor, but cannot be left with the inmate.

### Visitor Clothing

The Oregon Department of Corrections has established a reasonable clothing standard to help maintain a positive environment for all inmates and visitors:

1. Visitors are not allowed to wear blue denim or other clothing similar to inmate attire (this includes blue and lime green T-shirts and blue chambray/denim shirts). Children less than three feet tall will be permitted to wear blue denim. Camouflage clothing is prohibited.
2. Clothing that is unduly suggestive or form fitting is prohibited.
3. Dresses, skirts, jumpers, culottes, and shorts shall not be worn more than two inches above the middle of the kneecap. Slit dresses/skirts shall be permitted only if the slit is not more than two inches above the middle of the kneecap. Clothing that exposes an undue amount of flesh (e.g., exposing chest, back, thighs, or midsection) is prohibited. Examples of clothing that will be prohibited include: halter tops/dresses, tube tops, see-through clothing, sheer fabrics, mini-skirts, shirts with low-cut neck lines, wrap-around skirts and crop tops.
4. Visitors are required to wear undergarments.
5. Umbrellas, hats, outer garments (raincoats, ski jackets and other garments that protect against rain and other inclement weather) may either be hung on the coat rack provided or secured in a locker.
6. Light-weight sweaters are permitted, but must be worn by the visitor during the entire visit. Jackets and coats must be kept in a locker or hung on the coat rack outside the visiting room.
7. Footwear must be worn.
8. Clothing, hairstyles, insignias or other paraphernalia associated with security threat groups or that create undue attention or conflict are prohibited (including camouflage clothing, slogans and suggestive or controversial statements).

### Safety Risks and Emergencies

- All people are warned that there are inherent safety and security risks in visiting a correctional facility and the possibilities of personal assault or of being taken hostage do exist.
- If an emergency occurs you will be expected to stop and listen for instructions from the staff in the area. One of the first things to expect would be the separation of inmates and visitors. You will be expected to comply with all instructions.
