

OHP Standard Reservation List Application Progress Report

Updated July 22, 2008





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Executive Summary

During five weeks in January and February 2008, the Department of Human Services (DHS) invited uninsured, low-income Oregonians to put their names on a reservation list. Ultimately, over 90,000 individuals, from all corners of the state, placed their names on the list, hoping to have their names randomly drawn and a chance to apply for OHP Standard benefits. OHP Standard provides health care coverage to low-income, non-pregnant adults 19 years of age and older. Of the 90,000 people whose names were on the list, 4,400 were already receiving medical assistance from DHS or had pending cases.

From March through May the department mailed applications to 10,922 people who expressed a need for health care coverage. This included the initial random drawing of 9,000 reservations as well as an additional 1,922 household members who were included on the reservation. Of the 10,922 people sent an application, 2,941 have successfully applied for and are receiving medical assistance benefits.

OHP Standard history

- On July 1, 2004, DHS closed OHP enrollment to non-pregnant adults between the ages of 19 and 65, a client group who typically received the OHP Standard benefit package.
- At its peak in July 1995, OHP Standard served 132,000 people; however, due to General Fund budget cuts, the program was closed to new enrollment after June 30, 2004.
- The program now is supported by taxes on hospitals and managed care plans. Attrition dropped the number of people served to 19,000, opening the way to enroll more individuals until it reaches a monthly average of 24,000 people for the two-year budget period that ends June 30, 2009.

Selection and application process

This report outlines:

- The process the department is using to draw names from the reservation list in a fair and equitable manner.
- The steps the department is taking to ensure people receive an application in a timely manner.
- Monthly and cumulative statistics of names drawn; applications mailed, returned and processed; and eligibility determinations.

These processes are shown below.

■ Random selection

- ♦ Three thousand names have been drawn each month from March through July.
- ♦ Because the number of new clients who have been enrolled in OHP Standard has consistently been lower than projected, the department will increase the number of names drawn beginning in August.

■ Advance notification

- ♦ The department mails an advance notice to those people whose names have been drawn, informing them that they will be receiving an OHP Standard application and reminding them to notify the department if their address changes.
- We added this step to the process because, knowing that some people would have moved since putting their names on the reservation list, we wanted to increase the number of applications reaching intended recipients in the initial mailing.

Applications mailed

- ♦ Approximately four weeks after the advance notice is sent, the department mails the OHP Standard application.
- ♦ Applications are stamped with the date they are mailed. Instructions direct the applicant to return the completed application to DHS 45 days from the date shown on the application.

■ **Follow-up contact** (before the application deadline)

- ♦ The department sends a reminder to everyone whose name was drawn. The reminder tells people they can send in their application even if they don't have all of the required paperwork and gives resources for those who need help filling out the application.
- ♦ Staff call people who have not returned their applications, offering assistance with the process and reminding them of the application deadline. This step was added to the process based on the slow rate of returned applications from the March selection.


■ Application processing

- ♦ DHS staff determine eligibility for each person listed on completed applications.
- ♦ Applications that are not complete are pended. Staff send a letter to the applicant letting them know what information is still needed (i.e., proof of income).
- ♦ While processing the application, DHS staff check to see if the applicant qualifies for any other medical programs.

This report will be revised monthly to add statistics from previous months and to update cumulative data. Reservation list

The department's statewide, multi-media, publicity campaign paid off. When the list closed at the end of February, over 90,000 names had been submitted for placement on the reservation list. The map below illustrates the approximate number of people on the reservation list from each of the state's 36 counties.







Selection and application process

Reservation list philosophy and approach

Because there was not enough funding to cover everyone eligible DHS created a reservation list of people who were interested in applying for OHP Standard. The list was open from Jan. 28 through Feb. 29, 2008.

The department chose a reservation list and random selection process because it gave everyone an equal opportunity to have their name drawn from the list. The department looked at several options when creating the reservation process, including:

- Adding people to OHP Standard based on health status. Federal law prevents states from determining eligibility for federal programs based on health care conditions; therefore, it is unlikely that they would approve this approach for a reservation list.
- Selecting names on a 'first-come, first-served' basis. This option was rejected because it would put at a disadvantage people who, for example, did not learn about the reservation list early or could not phone or get Internet access early in the process.

In developing the reservation list, the department actively sought input from community stakeholders and the public about the process. A group of stakeholders was assembled to review the reservation list plan, discuss concerns, evaluate options and make recommendations. The group included representatives from the Oregon Association of Hospitals and Health Systems, the Oregon Law Center, county health agencies, client disability advocates and client health advocates.

Ultimately, the department and workgroup determined that using a random selection process was the fairest way to give people the opportunity to apply for OHP Standard.

People were able to place themselves, or someone else, on the reservation list by using one of the following options:

- Calling a toll-free phone number and speaking with DHS staff.
- Completing and sending a one-page Reservation List Request form (OHP 3203) to DHS. The OHP 3203 could be mailed, faxed, or dropped off at any DHS branch office.
- Completing and submitting an online electronic version of the form.
- E-mailing the information to DHS.

Random selections

The random selection process is performed on the department's mainframe computer governed by an IBM operating system. IBM DB2 software is used for the random selection process. The software application is universally recognized and proven to select records from a database totally at random.

Each month, information systems staff initiate the IBM DB2 random selection computer program. The program:

- Identifies all active individuals in the database. Individuals selected previously are still in the database but are coded as inactive.
- Randomly assigns a number to all active individuals.
- Sorts the individuals based on numerical order of the randomly assigned number.
- Selects the first 3,000 names. The department initially made the decision to select 3,000 names each month based on the availability of staff members to process the anticipated number of returned applications. Because the number of new clients who have been enrolled in OHP Standard has consistently been lower than projected, the department will increase the number of names drawn beginning in August.

Advance notice

The department sends an advance notice to people whose names are drawn, informing them they will receive an application and reminding them to notify the department if their address changes. The notice allows DHS time to research and update addresses from returned mail before sending the actual date-stamped applications. This step helps ensure that applications aren't returned as 'undeliverable' to DHS with the deadline clock ticking.

Updating bad addresses

DHS goes to great lengths to research address changes. Each piece of returned mail is researched and every effort is made to update contact information. When mail is returned, staff search several databases in an effort to find the most current address available. Staff members call people if a phone number is available, although many numbers are unavailable because they were not required to provide a phone number.

DHS mails applications

The department then mails applications to the people whose names were drawn. Before the application is due back to DHS, the applicants receive a reminder-to-submit letter.

Follow-up calls

Finally, as the deadline for returning completed applications approaches, DHS staff call people who haven't returned an application. Despite these efforts, many people choose not to turn in their applications. For example, someone may not turn in their application because their situation has changed and they no longer need OHP coverage,


Once the completed applications arrive at DHS, staff begin the eligibility determination process.




Monthly selections






Submitted applications – March 2008 Reasons for pend
























