Advance estimates of U.S. retail sales for August adjusted for seasonal, holiday, and trading-day differences but not f price changes, were \$120.2 billion, 3.4 percent above August 1985. Total sales in the June through August period increas 1.5 percent from the prior three months and were 4.1 percent above the same months a year ago.

Durable goods were 5.7 percent above August 1985. For the June through August period, durable goods increased 3.3 percent from the prior three months and 6.8 percent above the same months in 1985. Automotive dealers were 2.2 percent above a year ago while both furniture stores and building material dealers were up about 14 percent.

Nondurable goods were 2.0 percent above August a year ago. Compared to August 1985 sales, the general merchandise grows up 3.3 percent and food stores were up 4.1 percent. Gasoline service stations were 19.5 percent below August 198

The Advance Monthly Retail Sales report for September is scheduled to be released October 15, 1986, at 8:30 a.m.

## Sample Design and Reliability of Data

The advance sales estimates are based on early reporting of sales by a small subsample of the Bureau's retail survey panel. Because of the early reporting, the advance estimates can differ from the subsequent estimates which are based on monthly reports obtained from the full sample of retail stores. In addition, sampling variability between the subsample used for the advance estimates and the full sample can cause a difference.

Percentage differences between advance and full sample preliminary estimates of month-to-month percentage change in seasonally adjusted total retail store sales have ranged from approximately -0.9 percent to +0.8 percent with the average of the absolute differences about 0.4 percent for the past 12 months. For individual stind-of-business groups, these differences tend to be higher. Sampling variability of and revisions to advance-to-preliminary estimates are shown in table 4 below.

Preliminary estimates for July 1986 and final estimates for June 1986 based on the full sample will be published later this month in the Monthly Retail Trade Report for July (BR-86-07). The complete report will provide sales estimates in greater detail and will present a description of revisions, and the techniques used in developing the estimates. The complete report will include additional measures of sampling variability.
