NEWS RELEASE SUMMARY - May 29, 2008

United States Attorney Karen P. Hewitt announced that Magdaleno Carreno, Jr., and Valentin Escobar-Chavez were arraigned today in federal court in San Diego before Magistrate Judge Cathy Ann Bencivengo on an eight-count indictment charging them with narcotics and firearms violations.

The indictment charges Carreno and Escobar-Chavez with Conspiracy to Distribute Methamphetamine, Distribution of Methamphetamine, and Possession of Methamphetamine with Intent to Distribute. The indictment further alleges that Carreno, who was previously convicted of alien smuggling, and Escobar-Chavez, an alien illegally in the United States, unlawfully possessed one Glock, model 27, .40 caliber pistol; one Glock model 30, .45 caliber pistol; and one Ruger, model SP-101, .38 caliber revolver.

According to Assistant U.S. Attorney Aaron B. Clark, who is prosecuting the case, the defendants were previously arraigned on a criminal complaint that charged them with distribution of a controlled substance. The complaint was superseded by today's indictment.

The defendants are next scheduled to be in court for a motions/trial setting hearing on July 14, 2008

at 2:00 p.m., before United States District Judge Marilyn L. Huff.
