About the Office: The Organized Crime and Racketeering Section is responsible for coordinating the Department's efforts against traditional and emerging organized crime groups, including major international organized criminal enterprises. It conducts the investigation and prosecution of federal organized crime cases, and supervises and assists cases by 21 Strike Force Units within U.S. Attorney's Offices around the country. This Section is also responsible for: exercising approval authority over all proposed federal prosecutions under the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations (RICO) and Violent Crimes in Aid of Racketeering (VCAR) statutes; advising and assisting on criminal cases involving labor-management disputes, the internal affairs of labor unions in the private sector, and the operation of employee pension and welfare benefit plans; working with U.S. intelligence agencies and U.S. and foreign law enforcement agencies to identify, target and investigate international organized crime groups; and contributing to the development of policy and legislation relating to numerous organized crime related issues including gambling, human trafficking, and international law enforcement strategies.

Opportunity Offered: The Litigation Unit of the Organized Crime & Racketeering Section is seeking an attorney to participate in difficult and complex cases and to deal with significant legal problems within the purview of the Office. The incumbent engages in trial, grand jury presentations, and appellate litigation in all the courts of the United States.

Required Qualifications: Applicants must possess a J.D. degree, be licensed, and authorized to practice as an attorney under the laws of a State territory, or the District of Columbia, and have at least five years of post J.D. legal experience in the field of criminal law.

<u>Preferred Qualifications</u>: Significant trial and grand jury experience; demonstrated experience in developing and litigating Federal cases; strong academic credentials; excellent research and writing skills and demonstrated ability to work collegially.

Travel: Substantial domestic travel and some international travel.

<u>Salary Information</u>: Grade and salary range is GS-13 to GS-15 (\$82,961 to \$149,000), depending on current salary and experience (Includes Locality Pay).

There is no formal rating system for applying veterans' preference to attorney appointments in the excepted service; however, the Department of Justice considers veterans' preference eligibility as a positive factor in attorney hiring. Applicants eligible for veterans' preference are encouraged to include that information in their cover letter or resume and attach supporting documentation (e.g., the DD 214 or other substantiating documents) to their submissions.
