### Suspensions (3 bills):

- 1) H.Res. 23** – Honoring the contributions of Catholic schools (*Rep. Kennedy (MN) – Education & the Workforce*)
- 2) H.R. 120** – To designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 30777 Rancho California Road in Temecula, California, as the "Dalip Singh Saund Post Office Building" (*Rep. Issa – Government Reform*)
- 3) H.R. 289** – To designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 8200 South Vermont Avenue in Los Angeles, California, as the "Staff Sergeant First Class John Marshall Post Office Building" (*Rep. Waters – Government Reform*)

## TOMORROW'S OUTLOOK

---

The GOP Leadership has announced the following schedule: on Wednesday, The House will meet at 10:00 a.m. for legislative business. The House is expected to consider two bills under Suspension of the Rules and will also consider **H.Con.Res.\_\_\_\_ – Expressing the continued support of Congress for equal access of military recruiters to institutions of higher education (*Rep. Hunter – Armed Services*)**. The House Floor will be cleared by 5:00 p.m. in order to prepare the House Chamber for the President's State of the Union Address. The House will reconvene at approximately 8:45 p.m. to begin the joint session with the Senate for the purpose of receiving a State of the Union Address from the President of the United States. No votes are expected on Thursday and Friday.

"The Social Security system will take in more money annually than it pays out in benefits until 2020, two years later than earlier estimated, the Congressional Budget Office reported Monday...Congress' budget analysts also estimated the program's trust funds will be depleted in 2052, meaning that beneficiaries will be able to count on receiving only 78 percent of their scheduled benefits beginning then...In both cases, the CBO estimates are more optimistic than the most recent projections made by the Social Security Board of Trustees."
