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**AMENDMENT TO H.R. 5658, AS REPORTED  
OFFERED BY MR. TIERNEY OF MASSACHUSETTS**

At the end of subtitle C of title II, add the following  
new section:

1 **SEC. 2 \_\_\_\_. MISSILE DEFENSE FUNDING REDUCTIONS TO**  
2 **PROVIDE ADDITIONAL FUNDS FOR ACTIVI-**  
3 **TIES TO COUNTER WEAPONS OF MASS DE-**  
4 **STRUCTION AND TERRORISM.**

5 (a) **MISSILE DEFENSE FUNDING REDUCTIONS.**—The  
6 amount in section 201(4) for research, development, test,  
7 and evaluation, Defense-wide, is hereby reduced by  
8 \$996,200,000, to be derived from amounts for the Missile  
9 Defense agency as follows:

10 (1) \$100,000,000 reduction from the Airborne  
11 Laser program.

12 (2) \$100,000,000 reduction from the Kinetic  
13 Energy Interceptor (KEI) program.

14 (3) \$100,000,000 reduction from the Multiple  
15 Kill Vehicle (MKV) program.

16 (4) \$341,200,000 from the termination of any  
17 funding for the proposed long-range missile defense  
18 sites in Europe.

1           (5) \$355,000,000 from the termination of any  
2 further deployment in the Ground-Based Midcourse  
3 Defense program, with this reduction not interfering  
4 with development or testing activities under the pro-  
5 gram.

6           (b) ADDITIONAL FUNDS TO COUNTER WEAPONS OF  
7 MASS DESTRUCTION AND TERRORISM.—

8           (1) COOPERATIVE THREAT REDUCTION PRO-  
9 GRAM.—The amount provided in section 1302(a) for  
10 the Cooperative Threat Reduction is hereby in-  
11 creased by \$75,000,000.

12           (2) NONPROLIFERATION AND WEAPONS OF  
13 MASS DESTRUCTION PROGRAMS.—The amount pro-  
14 vided in section 3101(a)(2) for nonproliferation and  
15 weapons of mass destruction programs of the De-  
16 partment of Energy is hereby increased by  
17 \$529,000,000, which shall be available as follows:

18                   (A) \$50,000,000 for Global Threat Reduc-  
19 tion Initiative.

20                   (B) \$30,000,000 for International Nuclear  
21 Materials Protection and Cooperation program.

22                   (C) \$60,000,000 for Second Line of De-  
23 fense program to cooperate with other countries  
24 to deter, detect, and interdict illicit transfers of

1 nuclear and radioactive materials at border  
2 crossings and ports.

3 (D) \$15,000,000 for NNSA's export con-  
4 trol assistance program for the purpose of de-  
5 veloping a plan for making sure all countries  
6 fulfill their UNSC 1540 obligation to put effec-  
7 tive controls in place.

8 (E) \$50,000,000 increase of conditional  
9 appropriation to encourage Russia to blend  
10 down additional HEU, to finance such incen-  
11 tives if an agreement is reached that requires  
12 such funding.

13 (F) \$50,000,000 for safeguards work at  
14 the Department of Energy National Labora-  
15 tories.

16 (G) \$100,000,000 increase for non-pro-  
17 liferation research and development, such as  
18 treaty monitoring and verification.

19 (H) \$10,000,000 for completing the exper-  
20 imental study on analyzing the impacts of sabo-  
21 tage of spent-fuel transportation in the United  
22 States.

23 (I) \$50,000,000 for accelerated or further  
24 dismantlement of nuclear weapons (and removal  
25 of pits from nuclear weapons).

1 (J) \$41,000,000 for chemical weapons de-  
2 struction at the Bluegrass facility in Kentucky.

3 (K) \$73,000,000 for chemical weapons de-  
4 struction at the Pueblo facility in Colorado.

5 (c) ADDITIONAL SUPPORT FOR WOUNDED WARRIORS  
6 AND THEIR FAMILIES.—

7 (1) IMPACT AID.—The amount provided in sec-  
8 tion 571 is hereby increased by \$30,000,000 to in-  
9 crease funding for impact aid to help local edu-  
10 cational agencies provide support to students who  
11 are dependents of members of the Armed Forces.

12 (2) FAMILY SUPPORT FOR WOUNDED WAR-  
13 RIORS.—Amounts provided for family support of  
14 wounded members of the Armed Forces is hereby in-  
15 creased by \$30,000,000.

16 (3) SUICIDE PREVENTION.—Amounts available  
17 for programs to prevent suicides by members of the  
18 Armed Forces is hereby increased by \$30,000,000.

19 (4) WOUNDED WARRIORS AS HEALTHCARE PRO-  
20 VIDERS.—An amount equal to \$10,000,000 is au-  
21 thorized to be appropriated for a pilot program to  
22 identify and retrain wounded members as military  
23 health professionals who would then treat and care  
24 for other wounded members.

1 (d) NATIONAL GUARD AND RESERVE SHORT-  
2 FALLS.—The balance of amounts reduced under sub-  
3 section (a), after application of subsections (b) and (c)  
4 shall be available to increase amounts available for the Na-  
5 tional Guard and Reserve to fund identified shortfalls, es-  
6 pecially in connection with homeland security activities.
