Did You Know?

HTML is the acronym that stands for HyperText Markup Language. This is the major language of the Internet's World Wide Web. Web sites and web pages are written in HTML. With HTML and the world wide web, you have the ability to bring together text, pictures, sounds, and links... all in one place! HTML files are plain text files, so they can be composed and edited on any type of computer... Windows, Mac, UNIX, whatever you have available. When looking at a web page through your browser, you don't notice all the codes that are used in creating the page, but if you select "View" on the browser's tool bar then select "Source" you can see these HTML codes. Although, there are some programs that hide the source codes and using the "View", "Source" buttons on the browser will not give you the code used to create the page.

New Facility:

A 30,000 sq ft facility is under construction which will be called the *Southern Horticulture Laboratory* located at Poplarville, Mississippi. Construction is projected to be complete by the end of CY 2004. USDA, ARS, MAFES, and Mississippi State Extension personnel will be housed in this facility.

National Administrative Professionals Week:

National Administrative Professionals Week was observed April 19-23, 2004, with National Administrative Professionals Day, being held on Wednesday, April 21, 2004.

Event History and Objectives: This annual event was originally organized in 1952 as "National Secretaries Week" by the National Secretaries Association (now known as the International Association of Administrative Professionals) in conjunction with public relations executive Harry Klemfuss and a consortium of office product manufacturers. It was established as an effort to recognize secretaries for their contributions in the workplace, and to attract people to secretarial/administrative careers. In the year 2000, IAAP announced a name change for Professional Secretaries Week and Professional Secretaries Day. The names were changed to Administrative Professionals Week and Administrative Professionals Day to keep pace with changing job titles and expanding responsibilities of today's administrative workforce.

Over the years, Administrative Professionals Week has become one of the largest workplace observances. The event is celebrated worldwide, bringing together millions of people for community events, educational seminars, and individual corporate activities recognizing support staff with gifts of appreciation. Although the purpose of the celebration is sometimes altered, and even maligned, by other groups and individuals, a tremendous amount of publicity is obtained for the profession during this time.

IAAP suggests that employers observe

Administrative Professionals Week by providing training for their administrative staff through seminars, continuing education or self-study materials. Another suggestion is to make a commitment toward delegating responsibilities that better utilize the skills of administrative professionals.

Good Advice:

The next time you order checks, have only your initials (instead of first name) and last name put on them. If someone takes your check book they will not know if you sign your checks with just your initial or your first name, but your bank will know how you sign your checks.

Put your work telephone number on your checks instead of your home telephone. If

you have a PO Box use that instead of your home address, if you do not have a PO Box use your work address.

Never have your SS# printed on your checks, you can add it if it is necessary, but if it is printed on your checks anyone has access.

Photocopy contents of your wallet (both sides of license, credit card, etc.) So you will know the contents of your wallet in case it is stolen. The account numbers and numbers to call will be available. Keep the photocopy in a safe place. Having this information available quickly is of utmost importance.

File a police report immediately if your wallet is stolen. This proves to credit providers you were diligent, and it is the first step toward an investigation.

However, the most important thing to do is call the three national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and Social Security number. If these organizations know your credit cards have been stolen, they must contact you by phone to authorize new credit.
