## **Follow Along with Louisville**

As an early signatory of the U.S. Mayors Climate Protection Agreement, Mayor Jerry E. Abramson and the City of Louisville, KY, have committed to the fight against global warming. In 2007, Mayor Abramson signed on as an <u>ENERGY STAR partner</u> and took the <u>ENERGY STAR Challenge</u> to reduce energy use in Louisville by 10 percent or more by the year 2010. The city encouraged local businesses and organizations to participate, and by mid-2008, almost 150 local



businesses, utilities, and organizations had signed on as ENERGY STAR partners.

The city has also incorporated the Challenge as part of its Go Green Louisville campaign, an initiative to "go green and save green" by adopting sustainable practices. ...
