The Conservation Reserve Program has 20 years of impressive achievements. It prevents 450 million tons of soil from eroding each year. It has already restored 1.8 million acres of wetlands. Two million more ducks survive each year because of the natural shelter it provides. CRP is a testament to the value America's

farmers and ranchers place on land stewardship. By preserving our nation's resources, CRP encompasses even more.

The rewards of farmland conservation extend well beyond farms and into our daily lives. We all depend on fresh air, clean water and an abundant, safe food supply.
