Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

Fiscal Year 2008 Funding for the Survey of Business Owners and Self-Employed Persons Letter to House Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman Mollohan and Ranking Member Frelinghuysen

On August 16, 2007, Advocacy sent a letter to the House Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations Chairman and Ranking Member describing the unintended consequences of a proposed funding cut to the Census budget in the FY 2008 Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations bill (H.R. 3093). If enacted, the cut would jeopardize the Survey of Business Owners and Self-Employed Persons (SBO), on which Advocacy and researchers depend to understand the contributions and challenges of small business.

- The Office of Advocacy is congressionally mandated to report on small business ownership by women, minorities, veterans, and service-disabled veterans and substantially relies on the data collected in the SBO to carry out that mission.
- The SBO is a vital resource because it is the only comprehensive, regularly
 collected survey that provides information on the economic and demographic
 characteristics of the nation's businesses and business owners. The loss of this
 data will hamper policymakers and researchers' understanding of the many
 contributions and challenges of U.S. small businesses.
- The SBO is one of the few data sources that discuss the number of franchise, family-owned, and home-based businesses in the United States. With the information from the SBO survey, the Office of Advocacy can better conduct research that recognizes the financing needs of small business and other issues of importance.
