



SUPPLEMENTAL SAFE FAMILY HOME REPORT May 12, 1998

THE DEPARTMENT BELIEVES THAT REASONABLE EFFORTS MUST BE MADE TO PRESERVE THE FAMILY UNIT, TO PREVENT UNNECESSARY PLACEMENT OF A CHILD, AND RETURN THE CHILD TO THE FAMILY BY PROVIDING APPROPRIATE, AVAILABLE SERVICES TO THE FAMILY MEMBERS IN A TIMELY MANNER.

The following information concerns the current situation relevant to each of the 14 guideline criteria set forth in HRS 587-25.

On or about April 21, 1998, a Child Protective Service Team Meeting was held. After some discussion among the members, recommendations were made by the CPS Team and include the following. That a foster home placement be made in the Hilo area to provide a safe place for and "easy visitation with the parents" with effort to maintain constancy in the school lives of Note is made that should not be returned to the parents if Peter Jr. is not found. Special services were suggested as homebased services, therapeutic aid, counseling for the parents, utilization of school counselor services while school is in session.

A second recommendation of the CPS team was regarding the role of the Hawaii Police Department to work closely with DHS. The Detective continues to be in contact with DHS social worker almost on a daily basis.

A third recommendation was that visitation be facilitated between and the parents. On Friday, April 24, 1998 the first visit was had for both parents, although Father was late due to returning from a Honolulu trip with HPD. The next visits were scheduled for April 27, 1998 and April 28, 1998. On April 27, 1998, the foster parent had been informed to bring on the following day. Therefore, Jaylin and Peter Kema talked for approximately forty-five minutes with the Child and Family Service homebased social worker who began working with them on April 24, 1998 focusing on parenting and family adjustment issues.

Recommendations regarding needs include: The provision of psychological treatment for regarding the disappearance of their brother, Peter, Jr. In this regard, the medical doctor, Dr. Natalie Delue, of Bay Clinic recommended that be provided with psychiatric counseling. Plan: Although three psychiatrists, Drs. Dennis Lee, Henry Yang and Lane D. Matsumura, were asked to provide psychiatric evaluation, they declined. Dr. Steven Choi, psychologist, agreed to complete evaluations on the entire family on June 1 and 2, 1998. Other recommendations made by the team are contained in the Conference Report submitted as Exhibit A.

On or about April 22, 1998, a telephone conference was held between the Honolulu Program Development Supervisor, the Hawaii Branch Administrator, the East Hawaii Intake/Assessment Unit Supervisor and assigned social worker. The decision was that the social worker would place into a foster home immediately. On or about April 22, 1998, at approximately 1052 hours, DHS social worker and SSA, accompanied by an HPD Sergeant and Officer, arrived at the Kaumana Elementary School and met briefly with the Principal, Ms. Julie Ignacio. Were transported by DHS to the DHS office. After having lunch, they were transported by the foster parent to the foster home. The foster parents are each day, to Kaumana Elementary School.

On April 4, 1997, DHS received a report from a relative, that Peter Jr. had a broken arm (from father). It was further reported that Peter Jr. had to sit on the floor at mealtime (unlike his siblings), wore long sleeve shirts all the time, and had been seen eating "puppy shit". No further information was provided by other relatives and this was not confirmed.

new home. An appointment was made and the family came to the DHS office (without Peter Jr.) in early July of 1997 following two canceled appointments. Family members stated that they had not seen Peter Jr. since December of 1996 and when asked about this, mother stated that Peter Jr. was with a paternal aunt and uncle until mid-August. An appointment was inadvertently set for August 15, 1997 for mother to bring Peter Jr. in but as this was Admissions Day the DHS office was closed. The DHS social worker made a home visit in August of 1997 but found the windows tightly shut and no answer at the door, although there were two cars in the garage and the clothes dryer was running.

In October of 1997 the social worker interviewed that at school but they both stated that Peter Jr. was in Kona with Aunt Nani (Lee Ann Kobayashi and husband Jay Kobayashi). said that seen Peter Jr. as recently as September, and said that said that seen him in June of 1997.

In December 1997, mother's in the worker left a message for the DHS social worker that mother had reported Peter Jr. as having moved out of the home on July 17, 1997, and moving to Oahu in October of 1997. In December 1997, the social worker that they file a missing person report. On December 29, 1997 the social worker contacted a private school, suggested by the extended family, to see if Peter Jr. was registered there. This school, Punana Leo School, as well as the DOE had no records of Peter Jr. having been registered there.

On January 8 1998, the social worker (with a police officer) went to the family home but there was no answer and all the windows were shut. On January 9, 1998 the social worker and a police officer went to the home again. This time mother was home and came out to talk to them. Mother appeared to have gained quite a bit of weight. Mother expressed anger and dislike the but it wasn't until the social worker and police officer questioned her apparent indifference to her son's whereabouts that mother began to cry. Mother finally agreed to make a missing person report on behalf of her son.

On January 21, 1998 at the Hilo Police Station mother told the DHS social worker and Detective Nojiri that she had only found out the day before that her husband had given their son to a woman, Auntie Rose, on Oahu. During a separation between mother and father, Peter Sr. had taken the child to Oahu with him and signed a paper giving the child to this Auntie Rose. Mother does not know Auntie Rose and states that father told her Peter Jr. was with relatives and would be placed into school in Kona in August of 1997. When Detective Nojiri approached Peter Sr. in the waiting area to speak with him, mother stated that father had chest pains and had to go to an emergency doctor's appointment.

On February 26, 1998 the social worker visited the family home. During the visit mother stated that they were waiting for a letter from Auntie Rose, whose name is Rose Makuakane. Ms. Makuakane is a Hawaiian woman known for her skills in Hawaiian crafts.

On March 9, 1998 father and mother came into the DHS office for an appointment for Peter Sr. to speak with the DHS worker following two appointments which mother had canceled for father. Father stated that before his mother died, a man named Moses Makuakane had lived with them for five years. When his mother died (when he was twelve), Moses had his "cousin" Rose Makuakane stay with them for two weeks. Father did not see Rose again until September 1997 when he was on Oahu with Peter Jr.. Father states that at that time he was sleeping on the grass in A'ala Park with other homeless people, and sharing a tent with eighteen other people. He says that this was not a place for Peterboy, and when he ran out of food stamps he gave Peter Jr. to Rose Makuakane with a letter stating his intentions to let her keep the child, as he could not take care of him and was giving up his parental rights. He said that Rose wanted to move to Florida where it would be cheaper to live and she could sell her hats on the beach to make a living. The police have not been able to find a person who exists with the name of Rose Makuakane.

QUESTIONS TO BE ADDRESSED

- 1. Is there anything about the parents that has been missed that might help to shed light on their actions?
- 2. What, if any, vested interest do the parents have in not disclosing the child's whereabouts?
- 3. Are there any family dynamics that may affect statement still in the home?
- 4. Is this home, and are these parents safe?

Mother and father have been together for approximately eight years, during which time they had stillborn twins at five months gestation, had a stillborn daughter, a son die at one day old and have had taken away. These parents have not been tested for drug use and mother denies any physical abuse in their relationship since the early part, and denies any abuse to the loss of their child, and why they are unwilling to disclose any information that would be useful in finding Peter Jr.

Peter Sr. was referred to Dr. Barthel for counseling and although he managed to be responsive and got some help from the therapy, Dr. Barthel maintains that when Peter Sr. got overwhelmed he would fall apart. These lapses would include increased depression, drug use and his grades dropping. Dr. Barthel suggests that this is most likely still Peter Sr.'s pattern. that Peter Sr. is highly sensitive, paranoid, and fears having this family torn apart. When concerns were raised as to why Peter Jr. appears to have been the child targeted for abuse when he was Peter Sr.'s birth son, it was suggested that Peter Sr. was never certain if Peter Jr. was in fact his son or Mr. Coulter's son. When were returned to their parents' custody in 1995, it was due to their work with Dr. Barthel and participation in Ho'oponopono, their having secured a well-kept house, and having had reports of abuse with her. When were returned. Peter Sr. and Jaylin went into isolation with and would not allow visitation with the second in spite of Dr. Barthel's vehement exhortations that this would be harmful to who were bonded to their still in the home appear to be healthy and well. TEAM ASSESSMENT

A multidisciplinary Team Conference was held to assist the DHS-CWS social worker in decision-making regarding the parents' lack of concerns for, or disclosure about, their missing child; six year old Peter Kema. Jr., who has been missing for over a year. Other decisions concerned the safety of the remaining in the home, and the possible course of action regarding the parents and during the investigation. Based on the available information presented during the team conference are average functioning who require average care in all areas of functioning. The caretakers are assessed to be dysfunctional and have limited ability to care for the latest and support system contributes to the caretakers' dysfunction.

were the victims of violence and emotional abuse, as evidenced by the bruising on at ages four and two, to Peter Jr.'s new and old fractures at age four months. Further, although the (spiral) fractures were caused by twisting of the limbs, both parents continually blame supposed to carry. As Peter Jr. was the child who appeared to have most of the injuries, it would be very reasonable for to conclude that being out of favor with father and mother could indeed make you "go away".

Further information brought to the Team confirms the history of father's propensity towards violence when he is under pressure. Rather than conforming when under scrutiny, father falls apart and becomes extremely, and very rapidly volatile. It was further stated that it is unlikely that father's methods of coping have changed over time. Raising children seemed to be enough of a stressor for father to (allegedly) abuse. With CPS interventions and investigations into Peter Jr.'s disappearance, the likelihood of father decompensating is very probable, and with father's history the probability of his abusing a family member is very high.

The Team members were not in a consensus regarding the removal of the action were quite vehement in their recommendations. The fact that these parents have a missing child, are not producing this child, and have not since August 1997, when a broken arm was reported, is of extreme concern. Given the history of serious physical abuse and reported abuse, the disappearance of Peter Jr. is very disturbing, indeed. There are also serious concerns in terms of the safety of based on the information provided to the Team with regard to this family's history and abuse. These parents had (gave birth to) Peter Jr., and by four months of age he had multiple spiral fractures and was removed from the home along with who were previously removed due to physical abuse. Were returned to the parents in June of 1995 and by April 1997 Peter Jr. reportedly had a broken arm from father, and by August 1997 he was missing. Based on this information it is strongly recommended by these members that the bear removed from the family home pending the investigation into Peter Jr.'s disappearance. At the very least, in view of their lack of concern and active response to their missing child, it is likely that there have been no improvements in their parenting abilities. At the very worst, if they are actively involved in their child's disappearance, the safety of the remaining children is of the gravest concern.







ORDER FOR RELEASE OF INFORMATION REGARDING PETER KEMA, JR.

On April 15, 1998, the Family Court of the Third Circuit received a request for information from Mike Gordon, a reporter with The Honolulu Advertiser. Mr. Gordon requested whatever information that the Court was able to provide about Peter Kema Jr., a six-year-old child who had been missing for an extended period of time. Mr. Gordon was asked to provide his request for information in written form. He did so, and a copy of his request is attached as Appendix "A."

After receiving the request for information, the Court scheduled a hearing on this matter on April 16, 1998. Present and participating at the hearing were representatives of the Department of Human Services, a deputy attorney general, the Guardian Ad Litem for Peter Kema, Jr., and the attorneys for his parents. A representative of the Hawaii County Police Department charged with investigating the disappearance of Peter Jr. also attended the hearing.

5

At the hearing, certain parties objected to the release of information regarding this child by the Court. These objections are overruled for the reasons described below.

Based on the representations of the parties who attended the hearing, the court finds as follows:

- 1. The whereabouts of Peter Kema, Jr., remain unknown.
- 2. The past history of this child causes the Department of Human Services, the Guardian Ad Litem and the Court to have grave concerns about the whereabouts and safety of the child.
- 3. The release of limited information about the past history of this child and the circumstances surrounding his disappearance will not substantially impede any current investigations by law enforcement authorities.
- 4. The release of limited information about the past history of this child and the circumstances surrounding his disappearance may encourage members of the public to come forward with helpful information about disappearance and present whereabouts of the child.
- 5. The release of limited information about the past history of this child and the circumstances surrounding his disappearance is in the best interests of the child. Concerns as to the present whereabouts and well-being of this child outweigh concerns as to confidentiality raised on behalf of other family members.
 - 6. The release of limited information about the past

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history of this child and the circumstances surrounding his disappearance serve a legitimate purpose in that such a release may materially assist authorities in locating this child.

7. The release of information concerning this child and family should be limited because court proceedings continue and the rights of other family members to confidentiality in these proceedings should be preserved.

Based on the foregoing, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that:

- 1. Pursuant to H.R.S. Section 587-81, limited information about Peter Kema, Jr., will be released to the public.
- 2. The Department of Human Services shall prepare a synopsis of the Allegations contained in the safe home guidelines submitted in this action.
- 3. The synopsis submitted shall include a description of the following allegations:
- A. The injuries suffered by the child when he first came to the attention of the Department of Human Services.
- B. The circumstances and allegations which caused the child to again some to the attention of the Department of Human Services.
- C. All known accounts that have been provided to the Department of Human Services and law enforcement authorities about the circumstances of the child when he disappeared. Descriptions of such accounts shall include the location of the child when last seen, the names of persons that the child was

alleged to be with, and the dates that the child was last seen.

- D. A photograph of the child.
- E. Any other information or allegations that might assist members of the public in locating the child.
- 4. The synopsis prepared by the Department of Human Services shall be submitted to the Court for review and editing by noon on Friday, April 17, 1998.
- 5. The Court will make any necessary revisions to the synopsis and will fax a draft of the synopsis to all counsel. All objections or suggested revisions to the synopsis are to be faxed to the Court by no later than 4:00 p.m., Friday, April 17, 1998. The Court will release the synopsis as well as this court order to Mr. Gordon thereafter.
- 6. All other Court records in this action, as well as copies of Court records released to counsel, family members and/or law entorcement authorities shall not be released to the public or to the media without Court approval.
- 7. Copies of the synopsis, as well as this Order, shall be made available to other media representatives or members of the public upon request through Marsha E. Kitagawa, Director of Public Affairs, Office of the Administrative Director of the Courts.

MISSING CHILD: PETER KEMA, JR.

COURT RELEASE

Peter Kema, Jr., is the seven-year-old son of Peter Kema, Sr., and Jaylin Kema. Peter Kema, Jr., is the subject of a missing-child investigation. He is also the subject of an open child protective matter originating on the Big Island. Peter Kema, Jr., was the subject of a prior child protective matter which was open from May 8, 1991, until October 31, 1995, when the matter was closed. The prior matter involved physical injuries to this young man when he was four months old. The injuries included a spiral fracture to the left leg. X-ray evidence confirmed other old healed fractures.

In April 1997, a report was made to the Department of Human Services, Child Protective Service, that Pater Kema, Jr., may have a broken arm. Subsequent investigation could not confirm this because the whereabouts of Peter Jr. were unknown.

Peter Kema, Jr., has not been seen by maternal relatives since December 1997. This child's father reports that his son was with him on Oahu in August of 1997, although it may have been as early as April or May of 1997. Further, Peter Kema, Sr., has also reported that he gave custody of his son to a Rose Makuakane, a woman he referred to as "Aunty Rose." Mr. Kema states that he and his son were staying at A'ala Park while on Oahu. Mr. Kema relates that he had known Rose Makuakane for a period of two weeks before he gave custody of his son to her.

Mrs. Kema does not know Rose Makuakane. Mrs. Kema believes that her husband had left Peter, Jr., with a relative but was not aware that the child had been left with someone she did not know. Mrs. Kema was not aware that Mr. Kema had given "custody" of their son to Rose Makuakane until January 20, 1998. Mrs. Kema did not give custody of her son to Rose Makuakane.

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There have been a number of different stories given regarding the whereabouts of this child who remains missing since approximately April or May 1997. He is reported to be with Rose Makuakane, who may either be living on Oahu, or, who may have relocated to a beach in Florida. It was stated that the child had been enrolled in a private school on Oahu. It was stated that the child was on vacation on Oahu. Relatives had heard that the child was staying with a maternal uncle on Oahu. It was reported that the child was living in Kona with a paternal aunt and attending school there. However, there is no known record of Peter Kema, Jr., being registered in any public school within the state of Hawaii.

All reports regarding the disappearance and whereabouts of Peter Kema, Jr., have been followed up without success. Police have been unable to locate a Rose Makuakane. The parents do not know how to contact Rose Makuakane, and they are not able to locate their son. Child Protective representatives have asked this young man's parents to provide contact information for the child and also to bring the child to DHS offices on several

occasions. The parents have not brought the child to meetings, and the child has not been present on visits to the home. Peter Kema, Jr., remains missing.

SAFE FAMILY HOME REPORT (March 13, 1998)

THE DEPARTMENT BELIEVES THAT REASONABLE EFFORTS MUST BE MADE TO PRESERVE THE FAMILY UNIT, TO PREVENT UNNECESSARY PLACEMENT OF A CHILD, AND RETURN THE CHILD TO THE FAMILY BY PROVIDING APPROPRIATE, AVAILABLE SERVICES TO THE FAMILY MEMBERS IN A TIMELY MANNER.

The following information concerns the current situation relevant to each of the 14 guideline criteria set forth in HRS 587-25. (Numbers is () indicate numbers as set forth in statute.)

This is the initial report intended to be reviewed in conjunction with each of the prior reports submitted in this case.

I. CHILDREN: (1-3)

a. <u>Current_situation (1):</u>

has very good attendance at school; in the fair of 1997, was absent only one time in the first quarter. academic grades show that has a GPA of 2.6, according to teacher. high marks are in Writing (B-), Social Studies (B), Science (B-). has S+ in the area of Speaking, Art, Health, Personal and Social Attitudes. does homework.

absent two times during the fall of 1997. academic work was marked "S", satisfactory in all subjects. received an "S+" in "Speaking" capability, and in Music, in Health in Personal and Social Attitudes and in Work Habits. Also written is that does homework.

Peter Jr. is a six year old boy, whose whereabouts are not known by DHS. He was last seen by sin December, 1996. He was never brought to DHS by the parents, as were the other DHS has not been able to locate Peter's registration in school in any public school; neither parent has shown that he is registered in any private school.

is a four year old to who has not attended school; has remained at home with Mother.

stated attending the preschool in a Hilo Methodist Church.

a baby girl sibling, who was born on August 20, 1996; according to the parents, the baby girl, died on August 21, 1996. She was given a social security number; but according to Mother, there were no funeral provisions. Mother also stated there were twin girls who were born at five months gestation stillborn in early 1992; she denies there was domestic fighting just previous to the loss of the babies, but the loss of the twin girls did follow the removal of from her care the preceeding May, 1991.

b. <u>Harm (2):</u>

The report was confirmed for physical abuse of 🖷 by Peter Kema, then Mother's boyfriend. were placed in protective custody and placed case file was transferred from West Hawaii DHS office to East Hawaii DHS office for case management services.

On or about August 12, 1991, report was received by DHS from Hilo Medical Center alleging physical abuse to Peter Jr., Mother's The medical reporter stated that Peter Jr.'s requested a report be made to DHS regarding the nature of

Peter Kema, Jr's injuries. The caller stated that Peter Kema Jr. was brought to the emergency room on August 11, 1991 at about 1655 hours by Mother, Jaylin Acol. She reported to the Emergency Room physicians that she noticed the child's left knee was swollen and red. She felt that he may be in need of medical treatment. Mother stated that the previous night, August 10, 1991, Peter Jr. was very fussy. She did not offer any explanation to the physician how it was that Peter, Jr. received the injuries.

According to the caller, the child has old multiple fractures but the medical reporter does not know where the injuries are located. The reports and x-rays have not been received by the attending physician. The new injuries include a fracture to the left knee. The left knee is red and swollen. The medical reporter stated that consulted with Dr. Richard Lane who is confirming that the child, Peter Jr., has old fractures as well as a new injury to the left knee. The reporter stated that the location of the old fractures were not recorded on the form immediately available at the time the report was made.

The emergency physician noted on the report that the injuries appeared "suspicious", i.e. as to origin. At the point of DHS intake, the perpetrator are unknown; however, the only caretakers known to DHS are Mother, Jaylin Acol, and Father, Peter Kema, Sr.

This report of physical harm of four month old Peter Jr., where "extensive skeletal damage, primarily to the metaphyseal area caused by twisting of limbs, which was completely unexplained by either parent. The parents had been the only caretakers for the infant" according to the DHS social worker. Although the DHS social worker did not conclude the parents were the perpetrator of the harm and yet did not have another person who may have been the perpetrator. The child was placed out of the home,

and under the care of until sometime in June, 1995. At that time, were returned to Mother and Mr. Kema, Father of Peter and and Stepfather to

On or about April 4, 1997, a report was received by DHS alleging physical abuse to Peter Kema, Jr. age five years and eleven months. The reporter, a therapist, stated that a client and relative of the Mother, Father and stated an opinion that Peter Jr.'s arm is broken. At an earlier time, the client knew Mother and had a relationship described as "close" with the

relative-client. The relative stated an opinion that the harm was caused by Father "who may have abused the child and not Mother"; furthermore, the relative added that Peter Jr. is dressed in long-sleeved shirts "all the time." The relative who spoke with the reporting therapist suspects that the family will be moving from the Nanawale house. The relative added that Peter Jr. has been seen "to eat puppy shit and is made to sit on the floor", suggesting that this is not the case with the child. No further information was provided at that time from the reporting relative's family.

On June 18, 1997, the report was received by DHS Petitioner and a home visit was made to the Nanawale home on the corner of Niihau and Flower streets. The only house was a dull-gold colored prefabricated house, which was empty. There was no sign of inhabitants' belongings. The address was 724 Niihau Street.

On or about June 19, 1997, it was learned that Mother and Father and moved from Nanawale area to 133 Puhili Street, Hilo in the Kaumanu area. There was a phone connected at the time.

On or about June 25, 1997, Petitioner made a home visit; Father came out of the ranch-style home. He was soft-spoken but pleasant; he invited Petitioner inside the garage area door. He said they were just moving in. Table and chairs had broken seats and the inside appeared to be in need of cleaning. He said that Mother went to a WIC (appointment) and would not be returning for several hours; went with her. Petitioner did not stay to interview him, but requested that he, Mother and peter Jr. and peter

On or about July 7, 1997, the parents came to DHS office with after cancelling two previous appointments, on or about June 26 and June 27, 1997. Mother and Father would not interview separately. Their primary reason was that CPS had taken their children once before (Kona, 1991), and they contended they were very anxious about even being in the CPS office. The report of April, 1997 was in the interest of the absent child, Peter Jr., who was said to have a broken arm by an anonymous mandatory reporter who worked with the minor who knows the Kema children. The minor

thought that Peter Jr.'s arm was broken by Father; upon hearing this, the mandatory reporter contacted DHS.

Mother talked about Peter Jr. "Peter was sick and didn't go to school; he stayed home from school. When he got well, we got a letter from the school (asking) where he was. He was not allowed to return to school, the same day he fell from a tree. It happened between November 22, 1996 and November 28, 1996. Jr. was playing outside, they were chasing each other." (Reference was made to the previous residence in Nanawale area.) Peter had been on the back porch. He jumped from a trunk of a tree, about four feet high or less. that Peter Jr. was standing on the tree about seven or more feet high just before he jumped.) Mother continued saying that Peter (Jr.) stood on it pretending to be kicking. "He was standing on top of the (tree) stump. was outside. I saw him on the tree stump; then I saw him on the ground. Then, he came to me and said his arm 'was sore'. But he moved his forearm; then he said he had 'a sore hand'." Both parents tended to minimize the injury of Peter Jr. and the child's telling of his The parents said they took him to the doctor at Pahoa Health Center on the next day, after Peter Jr. had complained of pain. However, Mother contended that the doctor at Pahoa Family Health Center had stood in front office area, looked at the child's arm and determined that the arm was "not broken". She said that the doctor had not taken the child into the examining room, nor was the child's arm x-rayed. Mother said the doctor told them, "Wrap up his arm", suggesting that his arm would be "okay". Then Mother said that Peter (Jr.) was staying at a paternal aunt and uncle's home "until mid-August" (1997), calling his absence "a vacation"; however, she would not give the name or any information about Peter Jr.'s caretakers or his condition. Mother agreed to bring Peter Jr. to the DHS office on August 15, 1997, when she said he would have returned home. (At the time, it was not recognized by DHS Petitioner that this was the date of Admissions Day, a holiday; the clients also did not mention this at the time.)

Mother blamed for making the reports to DHS, and expressed her anger towards her Father agreed with what Mother said. Specifically, Mother said that her told her that she could not name her after her brother. She added that her mother would not let her breastfeed her baby, nor take care of the Mother would not give reasons why to go visit them, complaining about one

Mother also was asked about her told of losing babies during pregnancy and blamed the miscarriages on her own medical condition of diabetes, although this has not been confirmed by DHS. She said that she "lost a baby boy, August, 1990, before Peter, Jr." Mother mentioned "losing twins; they came out in pieces," but the dates and specifics are not known, here.) Mother told of death of her last baby, born August 20, 1996 but who died on August 21, 1996; for this child, the parents did not have a funeral, and the parents did not find that ommission unusual. (According to on October 1, 1997, the deceased babies are buried in a cemetary in Kona.)

Mother was the primary spokesperson; Father presented himself as though he was a victim and encouraged Mother to answer questions, not disagreeing with her statements. The relationship between the parents was presented as one of agreement; however, there was disproportionate sadness and remorse, which was apparent, especially with Mother. Father was quiet and did not demonstrate emotional caring or take an initiative in expressing compassion towards Mother. This absence in the presence of Mother's need was apparent. Mother repeated with Father's quiet agreement, that they mistrust CPS (Child Protective Service/DHS) "because of what they did to us. They took (from us in 1991) and also placed with in 1995."

On or about June 30, 1997, Mother agreed to return to the DHS with Peter, Jr., since the parents had not brought him to the DHS interview. Mother agreed to August 15, 1997 at 1:00 P.M.; however, the appointment day was later identified as Admissions Day and the DHS office was closed. Mother did not contact DHS and while the parents had an answering machine, the phone was then disconnected.

On or about June 30, 1997, Petitioner telephoned the Pahoa Family Health Center and requested information about the history of medical care, having sent a consent form signed by Mother.

On or about July 17, 1997, a representative of Pahoa Family Health Center telephoned DHS leaving a message that Peter Jr. "is currenty on Oahu, paternal aunt (no name) is taking care of him; HMSA Quest and primary care physician is the Pahoa Family Health Center. The date of Peter Jr. 's last physical exam was December 15, 1995,

eighteen months earlier (unlike Mother's report). The preschool physical examination showed there were "no injuries" (observed). Although the previous medical doctor providing medical care was Dr. Wesly Sugai, in Kailua-Kona, Mother did not request for the medical records to be sent to the Pahoa Family Medical Center, to the current medical doctor of Peter Jr. In addition, there was no information received by the Pahoa Family Health Center from any other doctor who may have treated Peter Jr. in the past, e.g. Kapiolani Medical Center.

On or about July 24, 1997, Petitioner spoke with the mandatory reporter, whose client had voiced a concern for Peter Jr.'s health. The reporter stated that the relative used to go to Peter Jr.'s Mother for support. The relative told the therapist that Peter Jr. had to wear his underwear on his head at age three or four, which was humiliating to the child; the relative also said that the child had to sit on the ground and eat, rather than in a chair, which was also humiliating to the child. The other family members thought that Peter Jr. continued to be abused. Peter Jr. was last seen in December, 1995.

On or about August 21, 1997, Petitioner spoke with inquiring about where she may think inquiring about where she may think.

Peter Jr., would be. She said that told her that Peter Jr. is with her brother, Maternal Uncle, Reed Acol, who lives in Honolulu. But this was found to be untrue.

Petitioner, "We don't know who Peter Jr. is staying with."

On or about August 19, 1997, Petitioner made another visit to the Kaumana home but found the windows shut tightly. There were two cars parked in the garage, the sound of clothes dryer running. Upon knocking at the door and calling their names, there was no sound of voices nor did anyone come to the door. On the same day, Petitioner telephoned the family home, but there was no answer, except the answering machine with Mother's voice. A message was left for Mother to pick up the telephone or to return the call the next day.

On or about September 17, 1997, Maternal Uncle, Reed Acol, stated that in the second week of September, 1997, he coincidentally talked with Mother when she appeared next door to his workplace. He stated that he thought his sister and were on Oahu when were taken from her. "Our lives were torn apart. I told Jaylin (Mother) that I could not be apart of their problems. I told would

not fight with them about Jaylin (Mother). When my wife met me three years ago, she saw Peter boy, how he is. All I know is that he had a broken leg. They were fighting then (1994). My sister (Mother) told me that Peter Boy was living with Peter's (Sr.) aunt in Honolulu, learning Hawaiian stuff. I don't know the name of his aunt.

On or about October 1, 1997, stated, "Nobody in our family has seen Peter, Jr. in a while. We saw December 14, 1996. We saw Peter Jr. at Aunt Dorothy's (Father's half-sister) funeral. Mother was close to her. Mother had moved to Ka'u and then to Kaumana area."

On or about October 2, 1997, Petitioner made a visit to the Kaumana Elementary School to interview the

an eight, is in the third grade. said, "Peter lives with Auntie Nani in Kona. We go mostly every week to see Peter Jr. I don't know where they live or their last name." said the last time they saw Peter Jr. "was when I went to school" in September, 1997. She added, Auntie does not work. She lives in Kona. Her children are in school, one in high school and the other two children are in elementary school. Their name is Kobayashi." said that Peter Jr. is staying there. "He's in grade one. I don't know when he's coming back." said that the last time they talked with Peter Jr. on the telephone was in January, 1997. "Peter had a cast on his arm, the left. I was in the second grade when it happened. That's when he went to the doctor; I forget the name of the doctor, at Pahoa Health Center." gave an explanation of the injury to Peter Jr. "Peter Jr. fell out of a tree in Pahoa, in our back yard in Nanawale Estates. You drive down Flower street, turn left, onto Niihau Street, the first house on the right. The tree was in the back yard, left rear. I think Dad cut it down. No, I didn't see Peter Jr. fall. At that time, I was in my room in the house. Peter Jr. was playing with We had a small ladder. A single bed was under the tree so we would not get hurt. When Peter Jr. jumped from the tree, he did not land on the bed. told Mom and Mom told me to get Peter Boy in the house. Mom carried Peter Jr. into the house. I gave Mom what she needed. He hurt his leg. It was his left leg on the knee. Peter Jr. did not want to walk. He was crying 'Mom, Mom'. It was his left arm that was broken. Then Peter Jr. was crying out loud. We put him in the car and Mom took Peter Jr. to the doctor. The same

(thing) as we did when had warts; we went to Dr. Mc Callister's office. The cast was on his left arm. I saw it when he came home. Then Mom sent Peter Jr. to Dad's own Auntie."

said the family visited Honolulu on January 1, 1997 for two weeks and saw Auntie Nani Kobayashi (also known as Lee Ann Kobayashi and spouse, Jay Kobayashi). Peter Jr. knew that he was going to Kona. Peter Jr. doesn't live with us. He wanted to visit his aunti; he wants to go to school there, in Kona. Our stepdad (Father of Peter Jr.) treats us the same as Peter Jr.; Mom treats us the same as Peter Jr. It's not that they (Mother and Father) don't want him. I tell Peter Jr. that I miss him, too. Dad says he worries about him. When were asked "Why don't the parents bring Peter Jr. back to Hilo to live with the family?" can not give a reason except, "Peter wants to go to school in Kona."

On or about October 2, 1997, age ten was interviewed by Petitioner; is attending grade five at Kaumana Elementary School. said that last saw Peter Jr. in June, 1997. "We lived in Nanawale Estates. He broke his arm. We, were trying to make a tree house. He was at the edge of the platform and he fell. I was in the house talking with Dad (Stepfather). Said that Peterboy fell out of the tree. I don't know if he broke something. Mom was in the house. I ran and helped him. I asked 'Are you hurt?' He could not move his left arm. Dad covered his arm with a towel. He stayed home overnight; the next day, our parents (Mother and Stepfather) took Peter Jr. to the doctor. His leg was not broken. Then we moved from there to Kaumana. I don't know why Peter Jr. does not live with us. It's been over two weeks since we talked on the telephone. Dad (says) that he calls Peter Jr.; I don't know where he is, now. They tell us they want Peter Jr. "to learn something", but says that he does not know what that is.

On or about December 23, 1997, the reported that Peter Kema Jr. moved out of the home on June 17, 1997, and that he left the Big Island in October, 1997 for Oahu and did not come back to the Big Island. She had no other information about this child.

On or about December 23, 1997, Petitioner telephoned to inquire about Peter Jr. and news from other family members.

"All the family is asking 'Where is he?'" Maternal Aunt, age twenty-two was home and spoke with Petitioner. She said that Peter Jr. is never with Mother and the other own sister lives in Hilo but she does not have news from her of the child's whereabouts. Mother's sister exclaimed, "My nephew is missing. I don't want to think about it. Let deal with it!"

On or about December 26, 1997, contacted Petitioner. He told of his concern for his Peter Jr. He said that he last saw the child after his baby sister, died (August 21, 1996) at the funeral of Paternal Aunt, Dorothy Kema in early 1997. At that time, said that Peter Jr. "had a black eye and one arm was spained. Mother said that she had taken Peter Jr. to the doctor; medical care was given at Pahoa Health Center. Mother told that she was told by doctor that his arm wasn't broken, but 'to wrap it up'. At this time, was receptive to taking the initiative and filing a missing person report on Peter Jr.

On or about December 29, 1997, Petitioner contacted a private school which was suggested by extended family to possibly have Peter Jr. registered with them. The school, Punana Leo School administration in Keaau stated there was no record of Peter Jr. being registered in their schools at Keaau or Keaukaha, although they transfer their students to public schools, since this is a preschool program. (DOE adminstration had been contacted by Petitioner earlier, and stated that Peter Kema Jr. was not registered in any public schools.)

On or about January 8, 1998, Petitioner made a home visit in the morning, but there was no car in the garage area; no one answered the door. The jealousie windows were shut. An officer was asked to accompany Petitioner, but there was no response to the knock.

On or about January 9, Petitioner again requested to have an officer accompany to the Kema home. This time, Mother came to the door, stepped into the garage area and was willing to talk with Petitioner. She was unable to answer questions about where her son, Peter Jr. is. She was unwilling to talk about her own fear of her husband, or about their separation, in which he stayed in Honolulu. She wept when pushed to give answers about what appeared to be her own complacency about the welfare Peter Jr. She seemed to let Father take the child, and then to forget about the

child's needs. She would not express anger towards Father, but she did refer to her dislike of her own mother, While her apparent **.** willingness to let her son be lost to her own caring, was not acceptable to Petitioner nor was it acceptable to the officer, she was willing to file a missing person report on behalf of her child only after she was questioned and she wept. It was noticed that Mother has gained a great deal of body weight, appearing to neglect her own appearance, perhaps preoccupied with various emotional conflicts. Upon being questioned about Peter Jr.'s whereabouts and what had happened to him in the last eighteen months, Mother finally agreed to make a missing person report with the officer who was present on behalf of her son.

On or about January 21, 1998, Mother was interviewed by Detective Nogiri at the Hawaii Police Department; Petitioner sat in on the interview. Mother stated that it was the day prior, January 20, 1998, that she "found out" from Peter Sr., her husband, that he had given Peter Jr. "to a lady in Aala Park," (Honolulu, HI.). The date is not known. Mother said that she knew that Peter Jr. went with Father, Peter Sr., to Oahu but that she had not known that Father "gave up all rights (of Peter Jr.) to Auntie Rose." Mother wept as she spoke. Then she added, "No, I don't know Auntie Rose." She also said that she thought that Father left Peter Jr. "with a family member," and that Father had told her in August, 1997, he would place Peter Jr. in a Kona (Big Island) School.

Mother blamed here to be for "taking away" their experiences as parents, referring to the time period between Fall, 1991 and June, 1995, when the were placed in foster care and the described their role when she said, "We found out that turned us into CPS (Child Protective Service." She spoke of resentment towards here they when shes then had to "ask permission to visit" at the home. She added, "I want to raise my way."

Mother stated that Peter Jr. was only three months old when one day Mother and Father took to the beach. "I went in a store in Keaukaha. Peter (Father) came inside the store. Was jumping on him, (Peter) Jr. We thought everything was okay. He (Peter Jr. seemed) was alright. Next morning, his (Peter Jr.'s) leg was swollen. I took him to the hospital the next day. Then, they took into custody. I hadn't found out until later that his leg was fractured,

something wrong. Later, in court, I found out he had a fracture inhis arm and left leg. The night (before taking Peter Jr. as a baby to the emergency room), we played with the baby in the water. He was crying. I thought the water was cold. He was laying down."

Mother again gave her explanation of the DHS report of April, 1997. She said that in November, 1996, Peter Jr. was playing in the back yard (of their former residence in Nanawale). He used to jump off (a stump) and play like "ranger", television character. The first time Jr. jumped, he slipped his leg and fell on his left side. He got on the stomp but kept going. He came to me and said, "My arm is sore." He said it started to hurt. I waited a little while. Next morning, I took him to the doctor to Pahoa Health Center. Dr. McCallister said it was sprained. He said, 'Keep a wrap on it.' He was walking and running; he was back to normal. In June, 1997, I went to CPS office to talk to (Petitioner)." The last time I saw him (Peter Jr.) was August, 1997; he was in good health. (Mother wept.) Mother said that Father came back (to the Big Island) for one day, August 15, 1997 because she had an appointment with Petitioner; Mother stated that Father took the child on August 16, 1997, back to Oahu "and didn't bring the child back." I have no idea what has been happening (to the child) between August, 1997 and today (January 21, 1998). Mother and Father had separated in December, 1997, "split up". Father just said that they were going. He said that he couldn't take care of Peter Jr. Mother did not have a ready answer when asked whether Father's explanations were "hard to believe" for her. Mother then stated, "I feel that Peter (Jr.) is a lost child. I feel like he's alone. No, I don't know who Rose is."

Immediately after the interview with Mother on January 21, 1998, Detective Nogiri and Petitioner met Peter Kema Sr. in the HPD waiting room, he declined to be interviewed on this date. His reason for not participating in the interview, was that he had an emergency doctor's appointment. Mother spoke for him, saying that he had "chest pains and can not keep his appointment" with Detective and Petitioner; Father sat with his head downward.

On or about January 21, 1998, called to say that Mother's phone was not in service. Petitioner and spoke briefly about the last time she had seen Peter Jr., soon after New Year, 1997; the Peter Jr., and were at the funeral of Dorothy Kema, a half sister of Father, in December, 1996. Petitioner inquired whether the

had filed a missing person report on the child but they had not. commented that she are safe with did not think the other **.**.7 recalled seeing Peter Jr. at the home of the Paternal Aunt, Lee Ann Kobayashi and her husband, around January 3, 1997, one year previous and that he was crying because left him there. reminded Petitioner that Peter Jr., were with a licensed foster parent from September, 1991 for three months. After that time, t lived with until they returned to Mother and Father sometime in June, 1995; during the first two years, said that Mother and Father did not ask to visit the children. also said that she is concerned that 🗪 rare programed to say things", i.e., she believes that one or both parents are telling what they must say to Petitioner.

Petitioner informed that missing person report was filed on January 9, 1998 by Mother. Petitioner was at the home while she made the report to the Assisting Officer.

On or about February 19, 1998, contacted DHS, stated they had made posters for Peter Jr., the day after they saw the published picure of him as a missing child. Stated that she had tried to talk with the stated that she but Mother of Peter Jr. and the but Mother was found to be "very defensive, rude and unwilling to talk."

Added that she is "scared that Mother and Father might snap and hurt the other they would say. When Peter (Father) yells, "jump."

On or about February 26, 1998, Petitioner visited the family home. Mother came outside to the garage area and was willing to talk; she said that Father was not home but "job hunting." Upon asking whether she knows anything more about her son, Peter Jr., she said they are "waiting for a letter" from the woman whom Father said he gave the child to. The name that Father had given was Rose Kaumakua, a Hawaiian woman who was known for her skill in Hawaiian crafts. She repeated that it was at Aala Park in Honolulu "at a lei stand", that Father gave away her son to a woman, allegedly named Rose Kaumakua. Mother said that she does not know her way around Oahu, that she has not lived there, except in 1989 when she lived with

On or about March 9, 1998, Father and Mother appeared at the DHS office, after Mother had canceled two previous recent appointments set for Father to speak with Petitioner. Mother tried to follow Father but was told he would be interviewed, alone. Father said that he is now working, fishing with "Jimmy" whose name he doesn't know; his first payday will be March 13, 1998. Father was asked to take off his wife hat and designer oval sunglasses, which gave him an appearance contrary to his personality. Father did not offer information but was led through a period of time, initially starting in November, 1996, when his half-sister, Dorthy, was deceased; this had been one of the last times family members saw Peter Jr.

Father said he was the youngest of eight children; his mother died when he was age five. His mother had a man who lived with them, Moses Makuakane. Moses lived with them for five years before her death. Upon her death, Moses had his "cousin", Rose Makuakane of Halawa, Oahu, come to live with them for approximately two weeks. He states that Moses had worked in a security job at a Keahou golf course in Kona in the early 1980's. Moses left the home to live with his own sister and is now deceased.

Father said that he did not see Rose Makuakane again, after she left the home to move to Oahu. He states until September, 1997 and did not find it inconsistent that he turned over a child to a woman whom he had known for two weeks, fifteen years ago. Father complained when this discrepancy was pointed out; he complained that Petitioner didn't understand, he had lost his mother (death) and this "cousin" of Moses being in the house for two weeks, made her a close family person. He said that after meeting her a week earlier, that he told himself that he could not take care of Peter Jr. Father said that he lived "on the grass" at A'ala Park in Honolulu, where homeless people congregate. He said he stayed in a tent meant for eighteen people, but that it was not a place for Peterboy. "I ran out of food stamps; I ran out of money." When asked what he got from Rose Makuakane in return for giving his son, he did not speak, wrenched his face and appeared to bite his tongue. He said that she made Hawaiian hats, taking a full day to make one. said that she wanted to move to the mainland, to Florida because it would be cheaper there. He said that he thinks she is living on the beach in Florida, "where she can make her hats, and everything costs less there."

When asked about the cost of travel and living there, he said, "This is the reason she is selling her hats, to get her plane ticket to the mainland." Father appeared to believe what he said. He appeared to think that his answers were logical. He claims to have decided to give his son away, saying he wrote a letter to Rose, made a copy of it at the 7-11 store near Aala Park in Honolulu. He said that he thought, "I can't feed him good. I can't take care of him." Father reports that he then gave the boy with the paper statement, to Rose Makuakane. He states that he believes that he "gave up rights of parenting" to Rose Makukane; he felt that he could make this decision, without any reference to legal process. Father's capabilites to reason, make decision of sound judgement and make responsible parental decisions appears to be minimal and he may have fabricated the whole story. The police have not established that a person named Rose Makuakane exists.

c. Placement (3):

remain with Mother and Father when he has been in the family home.

II. FAMILY: (4-10, 13)

Mother:

a. Background (4):

Mother is Jaylin M. Acol Kema, a twenty-eight year old woman, who has born e and live with her, one child's whereabouts are unknown to DHS and one child is deceased the day following birth (August 21, 1996). Mother also stated that she gave birth to twin girls who were stillborn, at five month gestation on or about February 27, 1992. was born when she was sixteen years old; the father according to Mother. They lived together in Makaha, Oahu in 1989 when Mother was nineteen years old. At that time, Mother stated that in May, 1991, were first taken away from her and placed in a foster home. The second time they were placed away from Mother, she said, was in August, 1991; at that time the

That is, Mother and her spouse, Peter Kema, Sr., Father of

Mother is the third of five siblings, "the oldest girl"; she has two twin brothers who are older than herself. Her ethnicity is mixed; she is Filipino, Spanish, Chinese and Japanese. During her growing up years, she was closest to her younger brother, Reed Acol, "but not after I started having children." The youngest of the five is her sister, Neievea, age 23, who lives with Now, Mother is not on talking terms with her own family members. Mother states that Father graduated from Waikea High School; she claims to have graduated from Kona Waena High School. She and Father were married January 11, 1992.

Mother states that the family lived in Nanawale Estates for four years, i.e. from 1993 to June, 1997.

b. Current situation (5-10, 13):

- 1. Mental health (5): Mother denies that Father has been physically abusive to her, except that she did identify a date of 1990, on an ATV intake assessment form. In July, 1997 interview, Mother stated that she and Father had family counseling from "Kit" Bartel, also known as Christopher Bartel, Ph.D., although she said they stopped family therapy because he left the state (of Hawaii). They could not say what they had gained from their family counseling.
- 2. Domestic violence (6): On January 9, 1998, Mother denied that Father had physically harmed her, except in the early part of their relationship. She denied that he had threatened to harm her or
- Substance abuse history (7): It is not known whether Mother and/or Father have used street drugs in the last few years. They have not been tested for drug use.

- Perpetrator of harm (8): 4. jumping out of the tree play area and not landing on a single bed, placed under the tree to catch the jump. In the July, 1997 interview, Mother said that he jumped off a tree stump about for feet high; Father quietly agreed with her. The parents contended they took Peter Jr. to the doctor at Pahoa Family Health Center on the day following the hurt left arm; the staff at the center state that Peter had not been seen by the doctor since 1995 for a school physical. Mother has a history, along with Father, been the of having probable perpetrator of harm to Peterboy, when he was only four months old. There were fractures identified at that time; neither parent either admitted to the harm nor told on the other parent.
- 5. Protective non-perpetrator (9): Mother appears to protect Father in ways, e.g., telephoning to make excuses for him not keeping DHS appointments, and for not interviewing with Det. Nogiri on the same day she was interviewed at HPD in February, 1998 although he was waiting in the waiting area.
- 6. Parenting ability (13): Mother's parenting abilities may be better for older child then for a younger child. However, she seemed to not be interested in the welfare of this child; this has not been explained satisfactorily. A psychological assessment of Mother's parenting ability may provide more specific information. Mother repeated that she is "waiting for a letter" from Rose Makuakane", the woman whom Father says he gave their son.
- 7. Support system (10): Mother has her own family, which includes her biological parents, her younger sister, and her older brother; however, neither sibling will reach out to Mother because they seem to ask questions about Mother's apparent lack of mothering care for this one child. The immediate maternal family is unable to explain why Mother can be willing to forget a child. The extended family members have not forgotten Peter Jr. and worry that serious harm has come to him. The familial support would be for Mother, but for her apparent lack of caring for this child, Peter Jr.

Father:

a. Background (4):

Father is Peter J. K. Kema, Sr., a twenty-seven year old male, appearing of stocky or overweight build for his height. He is Hawaiian. He claims to have graduated from Kona Waena High School. Father had been employed as a security person at Hilo Lagoon Center in 1992. He has not been employed for some time. He stated that he has been in a relationship with Mother since 1989.

He is the youngest of eight children; Joseph was the oldest, a severely mentally retarded brother, who became epileptic after "falling off a balcony at school. Detective Nogiri provided information that Joseph was kept in a room away from the house, secluded. Joseph was said to have died in his forties and Father would not talk about his care, behavioral problems and contacts within the family. Father would not talk about his disabled brother, he only said that "everybody took care of him, " Joseph, who was about twenty-five years older than he. His next half-siblings is Rachel with whom he lived, and who currently works in a local school cafeteria on the Big Island. His half-sister, Dorothy, died in November, 1996, one of the last few times other family members saw Peter Jr. He has a brother, Henry, who is deceased due to a medical cause; he has a brother Benji, in his forties, who lives on the island of Hawaii. The brother immediately above him is Thomas, age twentynine. He did not offer current information about his siblings.

Father said that when his father, Thomas N. Kema, died, he was age five, 1975; he stated that his own father was "smashed by a bull" while working as a rancher; after being parallysized, "he died at home." His own mother died he was age twelve. His sister, Lee Ann Kobayashi, was fourteen years old and thirteen year old brother, Thomas, went to live with friends or neighbors because they didn't have food to eat. He went to live with his cousin, Moses Makuakane. Father states that at the age of twelve, he had trouble in school. "I flew a chair at a boy after he flicked a staple in my eye. Then I accidently hit the teacher with my arm", when he said he thought he was swinging his arm backwards to hit the other boy. After that he was expelled; his next school was Mt. View Elementary.

b. Current situation (5-10, 13):

- 1. Mental health (5): According to Mother in an ATV application in April, 1992, they had not had domestic violence between themselves in two years.
- 2. Domestic violence (6): Father would not give information about their relationship except they "separated" sometime in mid-1997. Mother denies that Father has hurt her recently, physically or emotionally;
- 3. Substance abuse history (7): His drug history is unknown.
- 4. Perpetrator of harm (8): Father had one conviction of Burglary in 1992. Mother does not talk about Father hurting herself or However, a family member had made a report in April, 1997, alleging that Father was thought to be the one who injured Peterboy. Father has a history, along with mother, of being the only caretaker of Peterboy when he was an infant, and had documented fractures at the age of four months.
- 5. Protective non-perpetrator (9): Father does not present as a protective non-perpetrator.
- 6. Parenting ability (13): Father does not respond as though he is caring individual, although when the were interviewed in October, 1997, they denied being hurt by Father.
- 7. Support system (10)

III. SERVICES (11,12)

a. Compliance to Service Plan (11)

The parents resent that DHS has been involved in their lives again and Mother blames this on She has made only courtesy contacts with Alternative to Violence. Neither Mother nor Father are known to have participated in counseling or chemical dependency assessment. Neither are known to have participated in counseling except that Mother claims to have been in counseling with a psychologist who is not believed to be in this area, unavailable to confirm serious counseling pattern.

b. Risk/safety issues (12)

Mother and/or Father may be willing to seriously get into services. However, this is not assured, since they did not take their role of parenting serious. They have "lost" a child and not only fail to express convincing regret, but appear to be self-satisfied with keeping their one child from and DHS, all of whom present negative responses from both parents.

IV. ASSESSMENT (14)

a. Dynamics

This family has been isolated from other family members, a pattern which Mother has fostered. Father, has a history of neglect and absence of belonging to a caring unit, either a substitute unit or family of origin. references which are made by Father are associated with dates of death, manner of death, meetings at the time of another's death, loss of family due to death, etc. Mother is unwilling to be receptive to her assistance. During the several years were caretakers of young Mother and Father who were dealing with their own emotional problems, may not have been included in the Mother and Father do not family life of have network of friends and Mother is estranged from members of her own family, but now has the company of Father. He does not appear to have friendly relations with his older siblings.

The parents' emotional depressiveness, lack of willingness to accept assistance from others, their negative attitude, does not appear to be bolstered by a high intelligence capabilities. They may have fabricated stores to make it appear that what they say happened to Peter Jr., happened. 

THE DEPARTMENT BELIEVES THAT REASONABLE EFFORTS MUST BE MADE TO PRESERVE THE FAMILY UNIT, TO PREVENT UNNECESSARY PLACEMENT OF A CHILD, AND RETURN THE CHILD TO THE FAMILY BY PROVIDING APPROPRIATE, AVAILABLE SERVICES TO THE FAMILY MEMBERS IN A TIMELY MANNER.

The following information concerns the current situation relevant to each of the 14 guideline criteria set forth in HRS 587-25. (Numbers is () indicate numbers as set forth in statute.)

This is the initial report intended to be reviewed in conjunction with each of the prior reports submitted in this case.

I. CHILDREN: (1-3)

a. <u>Current situation (1):</u>

at Kaumana Elementary School. Continues to attend the same school since being placed in a licensed foster home.

Peter Jr. is a six year old boy, whose whereabouts are not known by DHS. He was last seen by in December, 1996. He was never brought to DHS by the parents, as were the other. It was learned that Peter attended a preschool in the Nanawali residential area for a matter of days. According to the parents kept him home alot because he was "sick". Reportedly, the preschool released the child due to his absences.

b. <u>Harm (2)</u>:

On or about April 21, 1998, a meeting was held between Hawaii Police Department Detective, Lieutenant and Major; Department of Human Services social workers, unit supervisor, and psychologist who had provided therapy for Jaylin and Peter until 1995. HPD was firm in their position there was no cause to place the into foster care. The psychologist expressed concern that if Peter Jr. is found that criminal charges were made that Peter Sr. would tend to express anger and be dangerous in relation to Jaylin and/or the the CPS supervisor tended to agree with the psychologist.

On or about April 21, 1998 a Child Protective Service Team meeting was held and included the social worker, unit supervisor, Branch Administrator; the social worker assigned in the period of 1991 to 1995 was absent. HPD detective was unable to be present due to a Grand Jury meeting held at the same time; another HPD personnel was invited. DAG was unable to be present due to a court appearance at the same time. Of the treatment providers were Drs. Wesley Sugai, Robert McAlister and psychologist, Christipher "Kit" Barthel, only the psychologist was able to be present. Dr. Brian Wilson, was present as was psychologist, Dr. Walter Jaeckle.

After some discussion among the members, recommendations were made by the CPS Team and include the following. That a foster home placement be made in the Hilo area to provide a safe place for and "easy visitation with the parents" with effort to maintain constancy in the school lives of Note is

made that should not be returned to the parents if Peter Jr. is not found (alive). alternative recommendation was given where would be kept in the parents' home, but that services would be in place to monitor the family's daily living, provide daily accountability of the family after the school year ends and to keep safe from explosive acting out on the father's part. Special services were suggested homebased services, as therapeutic aid, counseling for the parents, utilization of school counselor services while school is in session.

On or about April 22, 1998, a teleconference was held between the Honolulu Program Development Supervisor, the Hawaii Branch Administrator, the East Hawaii Assessment and Intake Unit and assigned social worker. The decision was that the social worker would place into a foster home, immediately. On or about April 22, 1998, at approximately 1052 hours, DHS social worker and SSA were accompanied by an HPD Sargent and Officer, arrived at the Kaumana Elementary School and met briefly with the Principal, Ms. Julie Ignacio. were brought to the office and transported by DHS to the DHS office. After having a lunch, they were transported by the foster parent to the foster home. The foster parents are transporting each day, to Kaumana Elementary School.

A second recommendation of the CPS team was regarding the role of the Hawaii Police Department. The Detective continues to be in contact with DHS social worker almost on a daily basis.

A third recommendation was that visitation be facilitated between the and the parents. On Friday, April 24, 1998 the first visit was had for both parents, although Father was late due to returning from a Honolulu trip with HPD. The second visit was scheduled for April 27, 1998 and also on April 28, 1998. On April 27, 1998, the foster parent had been informed to bring on the following day. Therefore, Jaylin and Peter Kema talked for approximately forty-five minutes with the Child and Family Service social worker who will be working with them in their home and elsewhere, with them, focusing on parenting and family adjustment issues.

Recommendations regarding to needs include:

1. to provide psychological treatment for regarding the disappearance of their brother, Peter, Jr. In this regard, the medical doctor, Dr. Natalie Delue, of Bay Clinic recommended that be provided with psychiatric counseling. Plan: Although three psychiatrists, Drs. Dennis Lee, Henry Yang and Lane D. Matsumura, were asked to provide psychiatric

evaluation for members of this family, on April 28, 1998, they declined.

- 2. To review the medical and hospital records of Dr. Sugai in Kona, so as to determine health, details of Peter Jr.'s injuries and other unexplained injuries. It is noted that Pahoa Family Health Care has provided medical care for although the last notation for Peter Jr. was in June, 1995. Dr. Sugai may be willing to send the medical records via currier with the Court Order for Family Supervision and Mother's
- 3. To continue to work with HPD Detectives regarding investigations into various aspects of this case. They will continue to be requested by DHS to participate in team and civil criminal conferences as scheduled at CAC.
- 4. To speck with Dr. McCallister regarding the visit to the Pahoa Clinic to examine Peter Jr.'s arm, in order to determine the extent and evaluation of the injury. On April 27, 1998, DHS social worker was told by Pahoa Family Health Center staff, that Dr. McCallister will not be talking with DHS because the staff was told "not to talk with anybody" (regarding Kema or children). DHS was told to talk with Executive Director of Bay Clinic, Ms. Stephanie Launiu, (969-1427).
- 5. To contact all the orthopedic doctors in Hilo to learn if Peter Jr. had a cast put on his arm between November, 1996 and April, 1997, so as to learn the extent of the child's injury. Of five orthopedic physicians or orthopedic groups, three stated that Peter Kema, Jr. had not been treated; however, one orthopedic physician was not available on the telephone but another, Dr. John Bellotti's office, stated that Peter Kema, Jr. was treated by Dr. Bellotti of Kealakekua, HI., but would not give any information until a consent form is received.
- 6. To obtain copies of miscarriage and death records of the children still born and/or miscarried by Jaylin, to determine the causes and whether domestic violence was involved. Hilo Medical Center and Kapiolani medical center are being requested with consents from Mother, for medical records of the above.

Recommendations for services directed towards the caretakers, Jaylin Acol Kema and Peter Kema, Sr. include the following: 1. To have a psychological evaluation to determine each parent's level of functioning and ability to provide a safe home. In addition, DHS seeks to know the substance of Peter Kema Sr.'s statements, his motivations and alternative factors which may have led to his behavior, i.e. that he "gave away" Peter Boy to a woman named Rose. In addition, heretofore unknown

information may surface which may be useful in locating Peter Jr. DHS has requested local psychiatrists to provide an evaluation of each of the parents. However, none have agreed; therefore, East Hawaii CPS Team nurse agreed to request the same from Kapiolani CPS Team psychiatrist.

- 2. To provide psychological counseling for each parent in relation to what is known and what is unknown about Peter Jr.'s whereabouts and wellbeing.
- 3. To review medical records of the parents. Treatment given at the Hilo Medical Center and Kapiolani Hospital for Women and Children will be requested for incidents of acute injury, birth or miscarriages and any other significant medical information.
- 4. To check with local airlines regarding the tickets and trips of Peter or Jaylin Kema during 1997. Hawaii Police Department has made checks into the interisland trips of the caretakers. Nothing new is known to DHS.
- 5. Finally, a re-teaming is suggested in May, 1997.

COMES NOW the Petitioner, a duly appointed social worker of the Department of Human Services ("DHS"), and hereby declares, under penalty of perjury, that the statements made herein are true and correct to the best of Petitioner's knowledge, information and belief.

- 1. The above-named children come within the provisions of Sections 571-11(9), 587-11, and 587-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS").

The children were found within the State of Hawaii at the time the following facts and circumstances (which have caused the children's physical or psychological health or welfare to be harmed or subject to threatened harm by the acts or omissions of the children's family) occurred, were discovered, or were reported to the DHS:







COMES NOW the Petitioner, a duly appointed social worker of the Department of Human Services ("DHS"), and hereby declares, under penalty of perjury, that the statements made herein are true and correct to the best of Petitioner's knowledge, information and belief.

- 1. The come within the provisions of Sections 571-11(9), 587-11, and 587-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS").
- the time the following facts and circumstances (which have caused physical or psychological health or welfare to be harmed or subject to threatened harm by the acts or omissions of family) occurred, were discovered, or were reported to the DHS:

a. THREATENED HARM

There is a reasonable foreseeable substantial risk that harm may occur to the based upon an assessment of the criteria set forth in HRS 587-25, including but not limited to the following facts:

CHILDREN'S VULNERABILITY

- 1. live with JAYLIN M. KEMA (27) ("Mother"), PETER KEMA, SR. (27)
- 2. Whereabouts of PETER KEMA, JR. (almost 7), another half brother, are unknown, and his absence is of great concern, as shown in the following chronology:
- a. stated they have not seen the arm.
- b. At DHS request, Mother brought to the DHS office in June 1997 and stated that PETER JR., was "vacationing" with an un-named paternal aunt and uncle until mid-August 1997. Mother promised to bring PETER JR. to DHS offices on August 15, 1997.
 - c. August 15, 1997 was Kuhio Day and DHS offices were

closed. When Petitioner later called, Mother's phone was disconnected.

- d. On August 21, 1997, stated that Mother told her she had contacted a maternal uncle of the child, who lives on Oahu. He denied knowledge of the child's whereabouts.
- e. In October 1997, Petitioner confirmed that the child is not enrolled in any public school in the state.
- f. On December 23, 1997, the family's worker stated that Mother told her offices that PETER JR. moved out of the home in June 1997 and to Oahu in October 1997.
- g. On January 21, 1998, Mother participated in an interview by police Detective Nojiri. She stated she learned from Stepfather only the day before that Stepfather "gave" PETER JR. to a "lady in Aala Park," on Oahu, where he stated he stayed for a month. Mother stated that Stepfather identified her as ROSE KAUMAKUA.
- h. Stepfather accompanied Mother to the police station on January 21, 1998, anaording to Mother, he declined to be interviewed because he had chest pains.
- i. stated on February 19, 1998, that she recently tried to talk to Mother about PETER JR. but that mother was "very defensive, rude and unwilling to talk."
- 3. Mother had another child who died one day after birth, in August 1996.
- were in DHS foster custody, mostly with due to unexplained fractures to PETER, JR. Mother and Stepfather each expressed resentment at that DHS involvement.

 stated that when they had the first two years their parents rarely visited them.
- 5. Efforts to interview ("Father"), are continuing.

PARENTAL PROBLEMS

DHS is continuing to locate records of its 1991-1995

involvement with the family, to ascertain the extent of parental participation in services.

This service plan is between <u>JAYLIN M. A. KEMA</u> ("Mother") ("Presumed Father") and <u>PETER KEMA, SR.</u> ("Stepfather") and the Department of Human Services.

THIS PLAN WILL REMAIN IN EFFECT UNTIL FURTHER ORDER OF THE COURT.

I. FOCUS:

Mother will participate in a support group for adult victims of family violence, e.g. ATV woman's support group participation;

Mother will participate in psychological evaluation and recommendations for treatment, e.g. individual mental health therapy to address issues such as former traumatic experiences e.g. sex assault, to address and work through emotional relationships of her nuclear family, towards development of a healthy sense of self-confidence and other issues which are defined in therapy;

Mother will participate in group parenting class to gain a broader sense the parenting protective role towards the stepsiblings, Peter Jr. when he is found and recognizing emotional and special needs of each child;

Mother will work with the DHS social worker to assure receive the individual or family counseling to address their emotional needs of loss and isolation;

Mother will provide a safe home with or without Father and Stepfather living in the family home;

Father will participate in services if he chooses to be active with the participate, which he has not.

Stepfather will participate in a psychological evaluation to determine the extent of his depression and/or other emotional factors; if anger management is recommmended, then the

Alternatives to Violence Program may provide the anger management group component;

Mother and Stepfather may be referred to YWCA Family Support Team, since the child's age for acceptance into the Family Support Services program is seventeen. Dr. Horace Black may be available to provide therapy for Stepfather.

Both Mother and Stepfather may participate in a parenting class for young children which may be provided at YWCA or Family Support Services.

II. GOAL:

To make the family home safe and with a nurturing environment for and their stepsiblings, and Peter Kema Jr., when he is found, being a missing child.

III. OBJECTIVE:

Learn, practice and demonstrate communication skills with other adults and children in home without becoming violent and dangerous to the adults or children or that foster depression in the parent or child;

Learn, practice and demonstrate nurturing parenting skills enabling the parent to provide a safe family home for each child.

Learn, practice and demonstrate healthier self-concepts through life style of interest in others and healthier understanding of the parents' earlier role as victim's within their own families of origin;

IV. THINGS TO BE DONE;

Mother:

- 1. Attend the Women's Support Group for victims of domestic violence at the Alternatives to Violence Program;
- 2. Attend and successfully complete parenting class for intermediate school age children at Family Support Services;
- 3. Attend and participate in personal psychological evaluation at Ohana Counseling Center with a written consent for a copy of the report to be sent to DHS at East Hawaii:

Stepfather:

- 1. Attend the anger management classes at Alternatives to Violence at ATV;
- 2. Participate in a psychological evaluation at the Ohana Counseling Center with a written consent for a copy of the report to be sent to DHS at East Hawaii;
- 3. Attend and participate in personal psychotherapy until clinically discharged, e.g. with Dr. Horace Black;

C. DHS Social Worker:

- 1. Provide direction towards learning information necessary to participate in classes and services;
- 2. Motivate Mother and Stepfather to enroll in appropriate classes and counseling services.
- 3. Visit the family at the family home and provide basic crisis and motivating counseling services at the time of the visit.

V. OUTCOMES:

By the next court hearing, based on the progress and evaluation of services in this plan, DHS will reassess the goal and may recommend additional services.
