



Media access to missing kids' files may expand

By Chris Loos Tribune-Herald

A state House committee has passed a bill that would make it easier for newspapers to publish information about missing children.

Oahu Rep. Dennis Arakaki, who introduced the bill, said it was inspired by the "Peter Boy" case on the Big Island.

Peter Kema Jr. was reported missing in January 1998 by Child Protective Services, but police said at the time that the 6-year-old boy had not been seen by

anyone except his parents since April

When he disappeared, his father told police that he took his son with him to Oahu in September 1997 while job hunting, leaving him there with a woman he called Auntie Rose Makuakane.

In April 1998, Child Protective Services took Peter Boy's away from his parents, Peter Kema Sr. and Jaylin Kema. That same month, the father denied to reporters that he killed his son and said he believed the child was still alive.

Around that time the Honolulu

Advertiser wrote to Family Court Judge Ben Gaddis seeking information about Peter Boy's disappearance. Gaddis ordered the Department of Human Services to prepare a synopsis for the news media that

included Peter Boy's injuries when he first came to the department's attention, the circumstances that led to CPS's involvement a second time, any information about his disappearance and "any

other information or allegations that might help the public locate Peter Boy."

The following month, the Advertiser asked the court for access to all confidential CPS records about Peter Boy and his siblings, arguing that the information might help the community understand what happened to the boy. Gaddis ordered CPS to release information in Peter Boy's closed case but denied the request for files from the newer case and for the siblings' records. He also ordered CPS to black out any information in the Peter Boy case

about the siblings. Before the information was released, however, Peter Kema Sr. appealed to the Hawaii Supreme Court, citing privacy issues of Peter Boy's siblings.

The Supreme Court overturned Gaddis' ruling and said the judge couldn't release Peter Boy's file. "The overriding concern of the Child Protective Act in determining whether to release such information remains the best interest of the

children involved," the court said in its opinion. The release of the documents wouldn't be in the best interest of the siblings, the high court said, because their cases were "inextricably intertwined" with Peter Boy's...

"That's not right," Rep. Arakaki said in explaining why he wants to amend the Child Protective Act. "We want the right of the missing child to be paramount and to take precedence over the rights of the siblings." Arakaki's

amendment would allow a judge to determine whether access to files that might help the public find a missing child outweighs the confidentiality interests of other family members.

In 2000, police reclassified Peter Boy's disappearance from a missing person cases to murder and referred it to prosecutors, who sent it back to police for follow-up work. In May 2001, police sent the case to prosecutors again.

"We're working with the police, and it's still under active," said Prosecuting Attorney Jay Kimura on Wednesday. "It's a lot of material we have to go through."

Kimura wouldn't say how close his office is to making a decision or what prosecutors plan to do with the case.

"Hypothetically," he said, "when we review a case, the process we would use is to present it to a grand jury."







Traders see 1987 in tech shakeout

It could get worse before it gets better.

That was the sentiment among shaken Wall Street professionals yesterday after another technology-sector blood bath yanked the Nasdaq composite index down a jarring 7.1 percent, and put it squarely in bear-market territory.

"This is the first great Internet (and) technology stock shakeout," declared Scott Bleier, chief investment strategist at Prime Charter Ltd. in New York. "Hour-by-hour, the fear is increasing that this is the big one, that this is 1987 for technology stocks."

At yesterday's close of 3,769.63, Nasdaq is nearing the intraday bottom reached on April 4, the day the index plunged almost 14 percent to as low as 3,649.11 in the morning before staging a furious afternoon recovery that erased most of the day's losses.

Though that afternoon rally was impressive, many experts predicted at the time that another drop would follow soon. Simply put, the slide was too short-lived to mark a permanent bottom in the market, many analysts argued.

What was needed, they said, was a longer and more painful sell-off that would truly rattle investors' nerves. In other words, short-term traders and other "weak" hands had to be shaken out of the stocks, thus leaving shares in the hands of only the longest-term and most committed investors.

U.S. soldiers reported in several brawls in Macedonia

SKOPJE, Macedonia Drunken U.S. soldiers clashed with locals and police yesterday, leading Macedonian authorities and NATO military police to detain 30 of them, the Macedonian **Interior** Ministry said.

NATO and U.S. military officials confirmed disturbances in three separate instances involving American troops in Skopje, the Macedonian capital, but said only five were temporarily detained by Macedonian police, who later turned them over to U.S. military authorities. The Americans were from Kosovo and were on leave in Skopje, they said.

Later, in a statement released by the public affairs office at Camp Bondsteel, the headquarters of U.S. forces in Kosovo. officials said two soldiers had been held by Macedonian authorities.

The Macedonian Interior Ministry statement said the soldiers, members of NATO-led peacekeeping troops stationed in Macedonia, were detained in connection with "indecent behavior, violation of public order, harassment of citizens and a fight involving a policeman." Some were drunk, the statement said.

Macedonia serves as a staging ground and a supply route for international peacekeepers in Kosovo. Speaking in Skopje for KFOR, the NATO-led peacekeeping force, Capt. Andreas Reinecke said KFOR "deeply regrets these incidents."

Dear Judge Gaddis:

This is to request a protective order, authorizing police assistance and escort to DHS into the home of Jaylin and Peter Kema Sr. The family has a lengthy history with the Department of Human Services, which resulted in the removal of the Kema children from the couple's care. In particular, there is continued concern for the couple's missing child, Peter Kema Jr.

On January 10, 2000 the Department received a Child Protective Services ("CPS") referral from the police, alleging threat of abuse and neglect to a male infant who was alleged to have been born sometime in late 1999. The biological parents of the child are identified as Jaylin ("Mother") and Peter ("Father") Kema Sr. On January 10, 2000 a reliable reporter informed the Department and police that Mother has been seen at a local church on a monthly basis for food staples. This reporter observed that Mother appeared pregnant until late December 1999, at which point she appeared to have lost a significant amount of weight. This reporter asked Mother whether she gave birth, and Mother responded that the child was a male and that it "didn't make it."

On January 11, 2000 Dr. Kelvin DeGinder, Hilo physician, confirmed that Mother was his patient. His last contact with Mother occurred in August 1999 for a routine check-up for her diabetic condition. Dr. DeGinder received a request for a referral from OBGYN, Dr. Paul Johnston, of Waimea, in October or November 1999 to allow him to follow-up with Mother's pregnancy. Dr. DeGinder also stated that Mother informed him that she was pregnant. It was also Dr. DeGinder's understanding that Mother went to live with family in the Waimea area, and believes that she may have given birth before the Christmas holiday.

On January 11, 2000 an attempt was made to contact Dr. Paul Johnston; however, he was unavailable. A telephone return call from Dr. Johnston is pending. Upon request, Dr. Johnston's office manager looked through the patient records and could not locate Jaylin Kema's file.

On January 11, 1999 a DHS social worker received an anonymous telephone call who reported that Mother was observed to be pregnant on December 28, 1999; however, the next day, she no longer appeared pregnant. On December 29, 1999, the reporter observed Mother with bruises on her arms and around her eyes. Reportedly, Mother divulged to the reporter that she was seven months pregnant when she lost the child.


Based on the information provided above, DHS and the police went to the Kema's residence and related the information to Mother and Father. Mother vehemently denied that she was pregnant and stated that she underwent a tubal ligation procedure in 1996 by Dr. Ian Ebesugawa. Mother further denied staying with family in the Waimea area or that she was seen by an OBGYN in Waimea. She also stated that she never related to anyone that she was pregnant and recently lost a child.


Mother and Father were asked whether DHS and the police could enter the family home, but they declined without the existence of a search warrant.







Privacy, Peter Boy: What accountability?

A series of Advertiser articles about a missing child, Peter Kema Jr., has already helped stimulate the Legislature to make important changes in the way the Department of Human Services handles child-abuse cases. Clearly the particulars of this case—many of which have mover been revealed—are of great public interest.

Seven-year-old "Peter Boy" disappeared in 1997, but was only reported missing last year. His father told authorities he had given the boy to a wforman who has never been lebated; neither has the boy.

An important issue, The Advertiser has felt all along, is whether Hawaii County police and state Child Protective Services responded property in this case. The object was not only to open possible new averages in the search for Peter Boy, but to inspire better performance in the many cases this are sure to follow.

In an attempt to review official actions, The Advertiser last year asked the Family Court judge who handled the case, Judge Ben Gaddis, for a look at some of the pertinent court records. He agreed.

It was clear from the beginning, however, that a serious complication involved the privacy of Peter Boy's siblings, who also had come under the purview of CPS. Judge Gaddis felt he could protect those interests with a felt-tip pen: He simply crossed out all references in the records that would jeopardize the privacy of the siblings and prepared to turn the records over to this newspaper.

Last November, however, the Hawaii Supreme Court disagreed with Gaddis and refused to allow release of those records. At the time, it promised a written explanation. That explanation was released this week.

The high court ruled that Peter Boy's records are so intertwined with information about his siblings that even Judge Gaddis' efforts to redact the records couldn't protect their legitimate privacy interests.

legitimate privacy interests.

It's unclear if high court justices examined the records, line by line, as Gaddis did. If they didn't, their second guessing of a respected judge very much in command of his field may have reached too far.

Ironically, Peter Boy's siblings, with their step-parents, had appeared in an Advertiser interview, voluntarily discussing — in gritty detail just the issues the Supreme Court sought to protect.

But while the particular case remains murky, a larger, more positive precedent has been set:

The Supreme Court has agreed — the first time in Hawaii history — with the argument advanced here by The Advertiser that some Family Court records may be released if the possible benefit to a child outweighs the child's privacy rights.

It is an important balancing test that, properly, puts the emphasis where it should be: on the welfare of the child.

This to us seems overwhelmingly to be the case with Peter Boy. How can we fret about his privacy when we don't even know if he's alive?

In short, the Supreme Court has not answered all questions but at least has more sharply framed the issue:

How can we best balance the public interest in establishing accountability for public servants charged with protecting children against legitimate interest in protecting the privacy of those same children?

It shouldn't take another long series of test cases to answer this question. If everyone involved looked first and foremost at the well-being of the child, the right course of action would become apparent.

Our hunch is that in almost all cases, those best interests will be served by sharing rather than withholding — information.

Recently Steven Strauss, attorney for Peter Kema, requested that I write a brief report for the Family Court in my role as psychotherapist for Peter and Jaylin Kema. I was asked to focus on the nature and status of the work we have been doing, to offer any conclusions or recommendations regarding visitation and custody, and to provide any comments on recent evaluations done by Stephen Choy, Ph. D.

Brevity is not one of my strong points and, given the complexity of the Kema situation, the history of issues and interventions over considerable years, it will be difficult to be brief. But I will try to do my best.

Therapeutic Issues. The Kemas have been in therapy with me since the summer of 1991 with a gap between spring of 1995 and April of this year. Prior to those contacts, in 1985, I had seen Peter when he was a teenager going to Waiakea High School and living with his sister Rachel's family. Over the time span, we have pursued individual counseling, joint/couple work, and a brief attempt at family counseling involving Jaylin and Peter and

Despite this lengthy history of intervention and all of the data produced, I will primarily focus on counseling since April of this year, after the missing status of Peter Boy brought numerous agencies into the picture.

Essentially, in treatment, we have primarily focused on the effects of the onslaught of interventions from a variety of sources (CPS/CW, the police, the Family Court, the media, etc., e. g.) on these parents. My purpose has been to serve as a listener and sounding board to Jaylin and Peter's anxieties, pressures, and reactions to what has been a rather overwhelming set of events. I have attempted to assist the couple in assessing their reactions to both external and internal pressures, in finding support from within themselves individually and as a couple, and to psychologically bolster themselves as the pressures continue. Given the magnitude of the stressors, both Peter and Jaylin are managing to hold up relatively well.

The stresses of the last four months have seemed to strngthen the relationship between Jaylin and Peter; adversity or crises often brings folks together. But their vulnerabilities manifest themselves understandably and follow the general patterns that both

young people have exhibited as part of their personalities.

Under significant stress, Peter can become anxious, tense, fidgity, and "wired." He can have trouble sleeping well, can brood, and may become depressed. In the past, he has developed reactions to stress that have involved anger, substance use, and somatization. ly I am unaware of any significant use of alcohol, marijuana, or any other mind-altering substance. As far as anger is concerned, Peter acknowledges considerable frustration and anger, particularly towards intervening systems, but his expression of these feelings over the past four months has appeared controlled and appropriate. Occasionally he may giggle or laugh when stressed which may appear inappropriate to some but which serves as a release valve for Peter. In April, before starting to see him, I had expressed concerns about Peter's possible volatility and/or explosiveness, particularly in the face of interventions that would include the Fortunately and to Peter's credit, my concerns have proven to be unfounded.

Jaylin, when confronted with lots of stress, appears to avoid, shut down, or become passive. In the past, she would fail to comply or follow through on aggreements, particularly involving planned contacts between her and her family. She, like Peter, can become depressed but in her case she would tend to oversleep, to divert her attention through other activities (e.g., shopping, eating) and to "tighten up" on stressors (e.g., keep records, make phone calls, seek advice). Currently Jaylin seems to be displaying appropriate action: she maintains appointments, seems several steps ahead of things, has been successful in entering community college, etc.

Both Peter and Jaylin are alike in their strong feelins about the removal of they feel the absence of keenly. They have a number of appropriate concerns over the welfare of and over the parent-child isolation that has existed over the past few months. To be sure, Jaylin and Peter also have strong ego or self concerns over the way they see themselves being treated but most of these concerns have relevance to their role as parents.

Both Jaylin and Peter have particular sensitivities that we have discussed in therapy and that we plan to work on more intensely once the current, high level of pressures subsides. With Jaylin, the heaviest issue is her childhood sexual abuse by her uncle and by These abuse situations have been significantly addressed within her family nor psychotherapeutically. Jaylin's reactions have been to be traumatized and her trauma has not abated over the years. The alienation, resentment, and avoidance that has existed between Jaylin over a number of years primarily rests on the unresolved sexual abuse issues. Jaylin has been hurt and angered, has felt this way for years, and

holds further feelings that she has been disregarded if not betrayed by The current anxieties of Beter Boy's disappearance and the barrage of interventions tend to "piggy-back" on Jaylin's earlier sexual trauma. Thus she is having nightmares, occasional flashbacks, and increased sensitivity toward her abuse and towards a sense of victimization.

Peter's greatest sensitivity is his orientation toward family. sensitivity arises from his early loss of both parents, the fragmentation and conflict that occurred within the remaining family, and his early hurts regarding loss and belonging. These issues have been reinforced by continuing pilikia within the extended family, by the loss of a number of siblings through health-related early deaths, and by Jaylin's unsuccessful pregnancies on two occasions. Thus it is understandable that Peter would be sensitized to problems occurring within his own family: the removal of , the perceived "threat" of intervening forces into his family "kuleana," perceivedlack of respect for him as a person and father, etc. Understandably, Peter has been very affected by the He has tried to remove conflicts between Jaylin himself but has been drawn in, wishing for a more ideal "familyness" among all concerned. When he senses Jaylin's resentment, the relationship between Jaylin and Peter is tested, often to the point of hurt and strain.

Fortunately both Peter and Jaylin seem to understand their pressure points and are very willing to explore ways of dealing with them.

Parenting. In the "old days" (1991-1995), I was able to observe Peter and Jaylin interacting with particularly with During those occasions, I seldom saw any parenting glitches and never any evidence of inappropriate discipline. Jaylin had the most parenting "knowledge" but both were nurturing.

As noted earlier, the removal of _______ over the past four months and the curtailment of even supervised visits has been a source of considerable pain to both Peter and Jaylin. Of course, the views and emotional responses of both Peter and Jaylin towards their sense of family and their role as parents will be strongly affected by the personality dimensions and reactions dis-

cussed in previous pages. As with many parents, there may be times, usually during strong stress, when emotionally-based needs of either parent could outweigh the needs of the other parent, of extended family, or of the children. I have no definitive evidence, however, that such situations have resulted frequently or have involved physically abusive behavior.

Comments Concerning Current Psychological Evaluations. As requested, I was able to review the evaluations provided by Dr. Stephen Choy on Peter and Jaylin. I have not received the completed, "full" report on Essentially, Dr. Choy's reports are excellent in their presentation of a number of hypotheses derived from interview and/or test data. Those professional hunches then need to be explored, either through further investigation of "real world" data or through behavior exhibited in various service plan/treatment endeavors.

My viewpoint regarding the results of psychological testing is that they also provide hypotheses or guesses about an individual that then need to be validated (or invalidated) through a variety of other Such hypotheses should never, in my mind, be taken as definimeans. tive evidence of anything. Therefore my primary concern over Dr. Choy's reports is when his test interpretations are worded in very strong, almost definitive language, as opposed to the more tentative, hypothesis-based approach that I advocate. Thus, for example, Peter's hypothesized difficulties in anger management would best be "tested" by those that have seen his behavior or who can set up ways to "test" his reactions in the future. Again, for example, Dr. Choy's report may say that Peter shows "a tendency to be impulsive," "little thought on his part regarding the consequences of his actions" and "poor anger management and a low tolerance for frustration." Yet I am unaware of any other clear data that significantly show any of these hypothetical psychological states on Peter's part over the past four months of highly frustrating. interpersonally intrusive, and psychologically challenging/stressful events.

Despite my somewhat different outlook regarding evaluations, the relative severity of Dr. Choy's hypotheses concerning Jaylin and Peter's abilities to provide a safe, protected home for warrants equally strong initial respect, followed by thorough assessment of appropriate, focused, and complex intervention strategies to insure the safety of Jaylin and Peter appear willing to undergo any such intervention services. Their ability to use those interventions seem promising from where I stand in my work with them. However, I would be the first to say that "the proof is in the puding" and that, in this case, the pudding's receipe needs to be well thought out and monitored during initial implementation.

Recommendations. Decisions related to the visitation and custody of need to be based on a multitude of views and findings, of course. Important to me as a psychologist

The data currently available to me does not preclude visitations between the Kema parents and In fact, I believe such visitations are very important for the welfare of all concerned, unless other definitive evidence shows otherwise. If risk is a factor, then supervised visits are indeed in order, both to provide safety and to generate further data for future decisions.

Regarding custody, I again have no strong data that would indicate that custody should not remain with Jaylin and Peter. Of course, I think input from the children's therapist is essential as is psychosocial data regarding or any other contender for custody.

Whatever the outcome of the immediate Family Court process, I strongly recommend that

- --Peter explore, through counseling, his sensitivities/ vulnerabilities regarding his past, his views of family, and his ways of handling his frustrations and anger.
- --Jaylin begin in-depth therapeutic work individually on her sexual abuse as a child.
- --Jaylin and commit themselves to active, long-term counseling relating to the sexual abuse and to its effects on their relationship. Peter should be involved in this pursuit later in its development. Jaylin's uncle and brother should ideally receive some treatment as perpetrators and, then, participate in the family work, if deemed therpeutically appropriate.
- --ho'oponopono be re-explored as a means of addressing the layers of problems manifest in the Kema/ family situation.
- --both Jaylin and Peter continue to seek marital counseling to explore and, hopefully, strengthen their relationship.
- --both parents and have some form of family work to help them understand the powerful impact that 1998 has had on their lives.
- --both parents seek specialized parenting counseling in order to better understand and provide positive input to regarding the disruption and fragmentation of the immed-

iate family system, the strained, distanced relationships with the and the "craziness" of the media intrusions in their lives, and the ways to proactively deal with all of these issues as pass through future stages of development.

Over the past several months, both Jaylin and Peter have asserted that they would do "anything" asked of them in order to prove their sincerity and worth as parents and in their wanting reunited with them. What will make a difference are (1) their being able to see individualized, specific relevance of the services to the needs of their family system, (2) the motivation and involvement of other parties involved in the services (e.g., the parties in each of their lives that I have previously articulated (pp. 2 & 3) and which so strongly appear to have affected their approach to family issues over the years.

Please let me know if significant questions arise from this report or if further opinion or recommendations are needed.


