3202,250 Contract Awarded to Study health Services Administration Programs

The Division of Associated Health Professions has awarded a \$202,250 contract to the Association of University Programs in Health Administration, washington, D.C., to determine the appropriate health and behavioral science components of graduate programs in health services administration. The Do-month project will try to identify the functions of health services administrators that require knowledge of the health and behavioral sciences. It also will identify such courses offered currently and specify the curriculum components most relevant to the training of health services administrators. (Frank Sis 496-6011)

#### Murse Practitioners, Terms Topics of Articles

A training program supported by the Division of Mursing to develop a model for preparing community nurse practitioners was described in a recent issue of the American Journal of Public Health under the title, "Community Murse Practitioner, An Emerging Role." Students participating in this graduate program, which was begun at the University of Terms School of Public Health in 1972, have helped community members identify such problems as low immunization rates, teenage drug abuse and poor nutrition and sanitation, the article reported.

boris Bloch of the Division's Mursing Research Branch contributed the featured article in Mursing Outlook for Movember 1974. Her paper, "Some Crucial Terms in Mursing: What Bo They Really Media?" calls on the nursing profession to avoid imprecise usage of such terms as assessment, diagnosis, and problem. ### Arkansas, Montana Rospitals Visited

Division of Facilities Utilization staff visited hospitals in Arkansas and Montana during Movember to give consultation on patient and inservice education, housekeeping practices, and infection control. The Montana visit concerned the first and only Public Health Service patient education sharing demonstration project in the United States. Three hospitals, two in Billings and the other in Stillwater, are engaged in showing that patient education can be shared among hospitals. Ruth Richards, DFU Acting Deputy Director, is project director.

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Staff also served as speakers or program coordinators at five seminars, two of which the Division cosponsored with State and local health organizations. Subjects discussed by the staff included central service management, drug administration and distribution systems, environmental safety and patient care, patient education, infection control, and controlling airborne bacteria in operating rooms. The programs were held in Casper, Wyoming; Columbus, Ohio; Key Biscayne, Florida; Washington, L.C.; and San Antonio, Texas. (Ms. Dearman 496-6011)
