

- Prior program announcementsRead PA thoroughly
 - DUNS number/CCR registration requirements
 Eligibility requirements
- Target application to program objective
- Don't design programs around grants look for grants that fit your program.

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What is Capacity Building?

- Capacity-building activities are those that:
- 1. Increase an organization's sustainability and effectiveness
- 2. Enhance an organization's ability to provide social services
- 3. Diversify an organization's funding sources
- 4. Create collaborations to help organizations better serve those most in need

Compassion Capital Fund (CCF)

 The goal of the Compassion Capital Fund (CCF) is to help grassroots faith-based and community organizations maximize their impact as they provide social services.

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CCF Programs


1) CCF Demonstration Program

- Funds intermediary organizations that provide faithbased and community organizations training, technical assistance, and capacity-building subawards.
- 2) CCF Targeted Capacity-Building Program (mini-grants)
 - Funds faith-based and community organizations directly with one time \$50,000 awards for one year to build their capacity to serve targeted populations.

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<u>CCF:</u> <u>Five Critical Areas of Capacity-Building</u>

- 1. Leadership Development
- 2. Organizational Development
- 3. Programs/ Services
- 4. Funding
- 5. Community Engagement




Organizational Development


- Including:
 - Board Governance
 - Systems: Management, Human Resources, Financial, Information Technology, Planning
 - Policies and Procedures
 - Fiscal Controls
 - Comprehensive Communications Strategy
 - Non-profit Incorporation

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Programs/Services

- Including:
 - Program Design that expands or enhances program or service delivery
 - Program Monitoring
 - Evaluating Program Outcomes







CCF Demonstration Program


- Intermediary organizations will provide two services within their communities:
 - 1) Capacity-building training and technical assistance to faith-based and community organizations; and
 - Financial support through sub-awards to a subset of the organizations receiving training and technical assistance.


Sub-awards

- The central focus of an intermediary subaward must be capacity-building activities.
 - Example: Funds may be provided to new organizations to improve their basic functions, such as attaining 501(c)(3) status.
- Sub-awards will not be used to provide direct services, but rather to improve the sub-awardee's efficiency and capacity.









Successful Mini-Grant Applicants

- The House of Acts received \$49,916 in FY04 to:
 Hire contractors to conduct an organizational needs assessment.
 - □ Train staff on grant writing.
 - Provide staff with six-month training on alcohol and drug counseling.
 - Purchase a drug-treatment curriculum.
 - Purchase a current database of foundations and their profiles (available on CD-ROM) in order to research prospective funding sources.

At-Risk Youth: Gang Involvement Prevention• This year, President Bush has specifically identified the need to focus on helping at-risk youth overcome the risk of gang influence and involvement. • Those interested in proposing at-risk youth activities are encouraged to propose projects to

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address this issue.

Gang Involvement Prevention Initiative (GIPI)

- Proposed three-year, \$150 million initiative targeting youth ages 8-17.
- Faith-based and community groups will equip street outreach workers to build relationships with kids who congregate on the street in order to direct them to existing services and activities that provide alternatives to gang involvement.
- Programs will give older youth access to educational and job services.
- Programs will coordinate outreach with State and local youth agencies and bridge relationships to local law enforcement and other groups.

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HHS Involvement in GIPI

- The Gang Involvement Prevention Initiative will be administered through the HHS Compassion Capital Fund.
- Other Federal agencies will advise HHS in developing the framework for the initiative, including the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention at Justice, the Office of Safe and Drug Free Schools at Education, and the Employment and Training Administration at Labor.
