College Writing I (ENG 180) [EN024B]

(College credit-by-examination may apply. The CLEP General English examination with essay may apply with a score above the 50th percentile, >450. Prepares students to write at the level expected of those in the academic community. Emphasis is on both the mechanics of writing and on the content of the essays. The course provides practice in developing an awareness of oneself as a writer, creating a comfortable writing process, using invention techniques, revising, editing, combining sentences, and using conventions of edited American English. Students complete six assignments designed to provide practice using specific writing skills and steps in the writing process.) {DANTES Code = 11.07.00}

College Writing II (ENG 280) [EN025B]

(College credit-by-examination may apply. A second course in college writing, to be taken during sophomore year. Emphasis on the interaction between writer and reader. Prerequisites: Eng 180 and at least 24 s.h. earned. Designated sections taught with word processors.) {DANTES Code = 11.07.00}

General Requirements:

 The maximum amount of college credit-by-examination or other forms of non-traditional credit that may apply to this degree (including military credit) is 90 semester hours.

• A minimum grade point average of 2.0.

• A minimum of 40 hours must be taken from a four year institution, of which 40 semester hours must be UL. Military credit or college credit by examination originally awarded by WIU (not transfered from a Community College) is considered as credit from a four year institution, however, this does not reduce the amount required for the academic residency of 30 semester hours.

• A total of at least 30 hours of coursework for a baccalaureate degree must be taken from WIU, of which of 16 hours of upper division course work from WIU must be included.
