Health Care Indicators

Employment and Price Indicators for the Health Care Industry through 1st Quarter 2005

This report presents highlights from statistics on health care utilization, prices, expenses, employment, and work hours, as well as on national economic activity, with brief analysis of these economic indicators. These statistics provide an early indication of changes occurring in the health care sector and within the general economy. *Please note that all percent changes are calculated from the same quarter of the previous year.*

Key Trends

- Hospital Insurance (HI) Trust Fund income rose 10.2 percent in the first quarter of 2005 when compared to the same period in 2004, while outlays increased 9.6 percent (Table 1).
- Employment in the total private economy rose 1.4 percentage points to 1.9 percent in 2005:Q1, marking a fifth consecutive quarter of positive growth (Table 3). At the same time, growth in health care employment remained relatively constant, increasing only 0.2 percentage points over 2004:Q1 to 2.1 percent.
- Growth in the Employment Cost Indexes (ECIs) for benefits continued to increase more than that of the ECIs for wages and salaries (Table 4). This was true for all three types of workers: civilian, private industry, and state and local government.
- Medical services prices, as measured by the CPI for Medical Services (Table 7), continued to grow at least twice the rate of overall prices as measured by the GDP implicit price deflator (Table 5).
- Hospital prices, as measured by the CPI, increased 5.5 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 5.2 percent in 2004:Q4 (Table 7). This marks a moderation in the steady fall in hospital price growth since a peak of 9.9 percent in 2002:Q4.
- Nursing home prices, as measured by the CPI, increased 3.3 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 3.5 percent in 2004:Q4 (Table 7). Nursing home prices, as measured by the PPI, increased 3.4 percent, after five quarters of growth in the 4 percent range.
- Home health care prices, as measured by the PPI, increased 0.9 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 1.2 percent 2004:Q4 (Table 7). This was the sixth straight quarter of increase in this series, after four quarters of negligible or negative growth.

Data Changes to the Health Care Indicators

BLS Data Changes

1. Adoption of the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) at BLS.

In a previous release, we highlighted the Current Employment Statistics Survey's adoption of the NAICS and the implications that it had on the data that we publish in the *Health Care Indicators*. ¹

- With the release of January 2004 data, BLS' Producer Price Indexes (PPI) for Industry groupings also adopted the NAICS, while with April 2004 data BLS' Employer Costs for Employee Compensation Survey (ECEC) switched to the NAICS.
- Other BLS survey programs are planning to or have already switched to reporting their data on a NAICS basis (from their original SIC basis). A schedule of BLS' implementation of the NAICS is available at www.bls.gov/bls/naics_implementation.htm.


Office of the Actuary Data Changes

- 1. The Office of the Actuary has recently put its market basket data and information (which in the past have appeared in the *Health Care Indicators* as Tables 10, 11, 12, and 13) into a separate content area on the CMS website. Therefore, we will no longer publish these tables as part of the Health Care Indicators. These tables can now be found at: www.cms.hhs.gov/statistics/marketbasket.
- 2. Due to changes in the structure of the survey used to gather community hospital statistics (which in the past have appeared in the *Health Care Indicators* as Tables 1 and 2), these tables will no longer be published with the *Health Care Indicators*. Therefore, the former Table 3 will now be Table 1 and the remaining tables will be numbered consecutively and arranged in the same order as in previous releases.

¹ In June 2003, the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) adopted the North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) for its Current Employment Statistics survey. In the NAICS, Health Services is combined in a broader category of Health Care and Social Assistance. CMS calculated data for Health Care by combining data from ambulatory health services, private hospitals, nursing care facilities, residential mental health facilities, and continuing care retirement communities for the elderly. Homes for the elderly and other residential care facilities are excluded from the health care calculations. Data for subsets of these health services industries can be obtained from BLS.

Medicare Trust Fund Operations


Medicare hospital insurance (HI, or Part A) trust fund income rose 10.2 percent in the first quarter of 2005 when compared to the same period in 2004 (Table 1). This was the largest percentage increase since the 2001:Q4 increase of 25.1 percent and a marked change from the 2.1 percent growth seen in 2004:Q1. This quarter marks the first instance where income growth outpaces outlay growth since 2001:Q4. HI assets have shown a consistent deceleration in growth for the past eleven quarters, mostly due to faster growth in outlays versus growth in income.

In the Medicare supplementary medical insurance (SMI, or Part B) program, outlays rose by 12.7 percent when compared to the 3.5 percent growth in 2004:Q1, an acceleration of 9.2 percentage points. SMI trust fund assets have now declined for sixteen consecutive quarters, although this decline appears to be slowing.

Estimates published in the 2005 Annual Report of the Boards of Trustees, Federal Hospital Insurance and Federal Supplementary Medical Insurance Trust Funds indicate that, given current law and trends, the HI Trust Fund will be exhausted in 2020, one year later than projected last year, and ten years sooner than estimated in 2002.

Health Care Industries: Employment and Hours


Figure 2: Employment in Health Care and in the Total Private Economy, Percent Change from the Same Period of the Previous Year: 2000-2005

Growth in health services employment remained relatively constant for the sixth consecutive quarter, growing a negligible 0.2 percentage points to 2.1 percent over 2004:Q1. Job growth in the health services sector has slowed over the past three years, and that slowdown appears to have moderated in the past three quarters, as shown in Table 3 and Figure 2. Despite this slower pace of growth, increases in health services employment continued to exceed those in the rest of the total private economy. However, overall job growth has posted positive gains for five consecutive quarters. As of 2005:Q1, jobs in three industries (home health, private hospitals, and nursing care facilities) constituted 55 percent of jobs in health care.


Figure 3: Employment in Nursing Care Facilities, Continuing Care Retirement Facilities, and Home Health Care: 2000-2005

As for continuing care retirement communities, or CCRCs, employment has slowed dramatically from its 12.1 percent peak in 2004:Q1 (Table 3). As mentioned in that quarter's version of the *Health Care Indicators*, the strength of employment growth in CCRCs compelled the authors to suspect that these facilities were "siphoning off" prospective nursing home patients. Given the continued stagnation in nursing home employment growth, we continue to believe that alternative care settings, such as CCRC's, are more attractive to patients and their families; however, steady deceleration in CCRC employment growth through 2004 to 2.9 percent in 2005:Q1 indicates competition from other long-term care options. Home health care, an option favored by public payers as well as patients, appears to be the likely competitor; employment decelerated far less sharply since 2004:Q1, from 6.5 percent to 5.1 percent, and boasts the highest level of growth across the entire health sector.

Figure 4: Employment Cost Indexes, Private Workers Wages and Salaries and Benefits, Percent Change from Same Period of Previous Year: 1999-2005



Growth in employee benefits (and the benefits share of total compensation), as measured by the Employment Cost Index, has exceeded the rise in wages and salaries for private industry since 1999:Q4 (Table 4). In 2005:Q1, 60 percent of the increase in compensation costs can be attributed to the increase in benefit costs, which represented just 29.6 percent of total compensation according to the June 2005 BLS Employer Costs for Employee Compensation news release. As a result, wages and salaries comprise 70.4 percent of total compensation costs, versus 71.5 percent in March 2004 and 73.0 percent in March 1999. This was mainly due to increases in the cost of benefits, most notably, health benefits. Health benefits comprised 5.4 percent of total compensation in 1999 and in the following year it began to trend upward, reaching 7.5 percent in March 2005.

Medical Care Services Prices

Figure 5: Percent Change in Medical Care and Overall Prices from the Same Period of the Previous Year: 1995-2005



Medical care services prices, as measured by the CPI for medical care services, continued to grow at about twice the rate of overall prices (as measured by the GDP implicit price deflator). The CPI for medical care services increased 5.0 percent in 2005:Q1, compared with an increase of 4.8 percent in 2004:Q1 (Table 7). The 2005:Q1 acceleration is largely due to accelerating physician services prices (insurance companies and Medicare typically raise their physician payment schedules each January).

Hospital Prices

Hospital prices, as measured by the CPI, increased 5.5 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 5.2 percent in 2004:Q4 (Table 7). After reaching a peak of 9.9 percent in 2002:Q4, the increases in hospital prices have fallen steadily.

The CPI for inpatient services increased 6.0 percent in 2005:Q1, while the CPI for outpatient services increased 4.5 percent (Table 7). The increase in outpatient services prices represents a significant slowdown from 2002 and 2003, when outpatient services prices climbed by as much as 10.2 percent.




Figure 6b: Percent Change in Hospital Prices from the Same Period of the Previous Year: 2000-2005



Hospital prices, as measured by the PPI, increased 3.8 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 4.3 percent in 2004:Q4 (Table 7). After reaching a peak of 6.3 percent in 2003:Q2, the increases in hospital prices have fallen steadily.

Hospital prices, as measured by the CMS hospital input price index, increased 4.3 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 4.1 percent in 2004:Q4. This index increased steadily since 2000:Q1. (For this data, see the market basket tables (www.cms.hhs.gov/statistics/market-basket).)

Nursing Home Prices

Figure 7: Percent Change in Nursing Home Prices from the Same Period of the Previous Year: 2000-2005





Nursing home prices, as measured by the CPI, increased 3.3 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 3.5 percent in 2004:Q4 (Table 7). After reaching a peak of 5.8 percent in 2003:Q2, the increases in nursing home prices have fallen steadily.

Nursing home prices, as measured by the PPI for Skilled and Intermediate Care Facilities, increased just 3.4 percent, after increasing 4.0 percent in 2004:Q4 and five quarters of growth in the 4 percent range (Table 7). This deceleration is due to a slowdown in growth in the PPIs for public and private payers.

Home Health Care Prices

Home health care prices, as measured by the PPI, increased 0.9 percent in 2005:Q1, after increasing 1.2 percent 2004:Q4 (Table 7). This was the sixth straight quarter of increase in this series, after four quarters of negligible or negative growth. The increase in the aggregate home health care PPI has decelerated since 2004:Q2, mainly due to a decrease in the growth in the PPI for Medicare payers.
