Health Care Indicators

Employment and Price Indicators for the Health Care Industry through 4th Quarter 2005

This report presents highlights from statistics on health care utilization, prices, expenses, employment, and work hours, as well as national economic activity, with brief analysis of these economic indicators. These statistics provide an indication of changes occurring in the health care sector and within the general economy. All chart data are produced by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), unless otherwise noted. *Please note that all percent changes are calculated from the same quarter of the previous year, unless otherwise noted.*


Data Changes to the Health Care Indicators

BLS Data Changes

- 1. Adoption of the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) at BLS.
 - With the release of March 2006 data, BLS' Employment Cost Indexes (ECI) will publish industry categories based on the 2002 NAICS and classify jobs into occupational categories according to the 2000 Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) manual. Broad categories, such as civilian workers and private industry workers, are comparable for both the old and new classification systems; however, some detailed occupational and industry classification may not be comparable. Medicare Trust Fund Operations


Medicare Hospital Insurance (HI, or Part A) trust fund income rose 5.6 percent in the fourth quarter of 2005 when compared to the same period in 2004 (Table 1). Growth in HI outlays declined 2.2 percent in the fourth quarter of 2005. On a calendar year basis, HI trust fund income rose 8.8 percent, virtually doubling income growth in 2004, which stood at 4.6 percent. Outlay growth, on the other hand, decelerated 2 percentage points in 2005, slowing to 8.9 percent growth in 2005. At the end of 2005, HI Trust Fund assets were \$287,062,000.

According to the 2006 Annual Report of the Board of Trustees, expenditures of Medicare's Hospital Insurance (HI) Trust Fund are projected to exceed taxes and other dedicated revenues in 2006. The Trustees project that growing deficits will exhaust HI trust fund reserves in 2018, under current financing arrangements. In addition, the Trustees state that, over time, the Medicare Supplementary Medical Insurance (SMI) Trust Fund will require substantial increases in both general revenue financing and beneficiary premium charges.

Health Care Industries

Employment

Employment in Health Care and in the Total Private Economy, Percent Change from the Same Period of the Previous Year: 2000-2005




Health care services added 276,000 jobs to payrolls since the fourth quarter 2004, a growth of 2.3 percent. Health care employment growth outpaced the growth in total private employment, which was 1.7 percent for the same time period. The industries reporting the fastest employment growth over the year

within the health care sector were continuing care retirement centers (8.0%), outpatient care centers (5.0%), and home health care services (4.6%). However, within health care employment, private hospitals added 73,000 jobs – and hence contributed the largest number of total jobs.

While the number of jobs in the health services sector continues to rise, the growth rate has stabilized to a slower rate over the past three years. Despite this slower pace, increases in health services employment continue to exceed those in the rest of the total private economy. It is interesting to note the strong negative correlation between growth in total private employment and growth in health care employment; that is, as total private employment falls, health care employment tends to rise.

Hours and Earnings




Total compensation growth in private health service workers and in total private workers trend very similarly; however, compensation for health service workers slightly outpaced growth for the total private economy since mid-2003.

In the fourth quarter of 2005, health care workers earned \$18.00 per hour on average, \$1.90 more than all

private sector employees. Within the health care industry, the highest paid workers were in the private hospital industry (earning on average \$21.30 per hour) while the lowest paid workers were in the nursing and residential care facilities (earning on average \$12.37 per hour). In 2005, average weekly hours for the private health care workers (33.3 hours) were very similar to the average weekly hours for the total private sector (33.8 hours).

Medical Care Services Prices




Percent Change in Medical Care and Overall Prices from the Same


The CPI for medical care increased 4.3 percent in the fourth quarter of 2005, which is also the average price increase from 2001-2005. Medical care prices have historically grown faster than the prices for all items and that trend continues. Medical care *service* prices rose 4.6 percent in 2005:Q4 with prices for hospital and dental

services contributing most to the overall growth (Table 7). Medical care *commodity* prices rose 3.2 percent in 2005:Q4, with prices for prescription drugs rising 4.1 percent.

Health Care Industry 2005 and forward at a glance

In 2005, health care provided 12.3 million private sector jobs, approximately 11 percent of total private employment. Employment in hospitals accounted for 35.3 percent, nursing and residential care facilities 23.2 percent, physicians 17.1 percent, and home health 6.6 percent of total private health care employment.





According to the 2006-2007 Career Guide to Industries published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, 8 out of 20 occupations projected to grow the fastest are in the health care sector, with home health occupations expected to be the fastest growing industry from 2004-2014. Employment in the health care industry is projected to increase 27 percent through 2014, compared with 14 percent for all industries combined. The only health service industry expected to grow at a slower rate than all industries is public and private hospitals. The slower growth outlook for this industry is likely due in



Hospitals

Employment & Earnings

Employment in Hospitals and Employment in Health Care, Percent Change from Same Period of Previous Year: 2000-2005




In the fourth quarter of 2005, hospital employment grew 1.7 percent over the same period in 2004, bringing total growth in 2005 to 1.3 percent. Hospital employment growth tracks similarly but grew more slowly in comparison to the overall health care employment trend, which grew between 2.0 and 2.3 percent in

each quarter of 2005, resulting in an annual growth rate for 2005 of 2.1 percent.

Hourly earnings for hospital workers grew 4.8 percent in 2005:Q4, exceeding hourly earnings growth for the overall health care industry by 0.8 percentage points. For 2005, earnings growth accelerated slightly to 4.9 percent from 4.8 percent in 2004 and continues to outpace earnings growth in the overall health care sector, which has held steady at 3.8 percent growth in 2004 and 2005.

Prices

Consumer Price Index and Producer Price Index for Hospital Services, Percent Change from Same Period of Previous Year: 2000-2005



Hospital prices, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI), grew 5.4 percent in quarter four 2005 relative to the same period in 2004. Prices have generally decelerated since a peak in 2002, but this deceleration appears to have moderated, as growth has fluctuated between 5.0 and 5.6 percent since the third


quarter of 2004. The Producer Price Index (PPI) for hospitals shows a similar generally decelerating growth trend overall, with growth reaching 4.3 percent in 2005:Q4.. Growth in prices typically accelerate in the fourth calendar year quarter (first federal fiscal year quarter) as they did in 2005, due to the fact that Medicare payment updates take effect in that quarter.

Physicians

Employment & Earnings

Employment in Office of Physicians grew 3.1 percent in the 2005:Q4, adding 1,753,000 jobs to payrolls since the 2004:Q4. Since the beginning of 2005 the rate of growth in physician employment has accelerated relative to the growth in all health care industries. The average hourly earnings for employees working in office of


Employment in Health Care and in Office of Physicians, Percent Change from Same Period of Previous Year: 2000-2005



physicians were \$19.35 in 2005:Q4, a 3.9 percent increase from the prior year. The recent acceleration of employment and wages in this industry is likely a result of increased demand for

services as the population ages, as well as changing the mix of health services as more move from the inpatient to the outpatient setting.

Prices




Over the past five years, the consumer price increases for physician services have been lower than the inflation for all medical services. Prices rose 3.0 percent in 2005:Q4 for physician services while the price of all medical care services increased 4.6 percent. The price increase for physician services was the lowest of all

medical care services in the 4th quarter. The decelerating price trends in 2005 are likely attributable to lower Medicare reimbursements and some private insurance reimbursement reductions.

Home Health Care

Employment




Employment in the home health care industry has grown rapidly since 2001. In 2005:Q4, there were 825,000 employees in the industry, an increase of 3.3 percent in one year. Since 2000, the number of new jobs has grown by 30 percent. The immediate growth after 2000 could be a result of the change from the Medicare home health interim payment

system (IPS) to the prospective payment system (PPS). Beginning in 2003, Medicare reduced annual payment updates to home health agencies by 0.8 percent of the estimated market basket increase. The deceleration in employment growth seems to coincide with these cutbacks. Since early 2002, new job growth in the home health industry has substantially outpaced the growth in health care service employment, although the trends have been gradually moving toward convergence since home health employment growth peaked in 2003:Q3.

Earnings

In 2005:Q4, the average hourly earnings for a home health care service worker were \$14.40. Average hourly earnings peaked at \$14.63 in the fourth quarter of 2004, and declined throughout 2005. The annual growth in average hourly earnings has been decelerating since mid-2004. This leveling off of earnings may be a result of a skill shift in employment within the




industry over time. In particular, occupational employment data shows that personal and home care service occupations have grown from 22.16 percent to 24.97 percent of total home health care industry employment from 2003 to 2005. The majority of workers included in this occupation are personal and home care aides – workers who require little or no formal training. By definition these workers, assist elderly or disabled adults with daily living activities at the person's home or in a daytime non-residential facility. Duties performed at a place of residence may include keeping house (making beds, doing laundry, washing dishes) and preparing meals.

Prices

Home health care prices, as measured by the PPI, increased 1.1 percent in 2005:Q4, remaining relatively stable over 2005. The increase in the aggregate home health care PPI has remained relatively stable since the beginning of 2005.

During 2001-05, growth rates of home health care prices averaged 1.7 percent,

Producer Price Index for Home Health Care Services, Percent Change from Same Period of Previous Year: 2000-2005




well below market basket rates, which averaged about 3.5 percent over the period. There is some speculation that these differences in rates are the result of the adoption of cost efficient practices among home health agencies. (Medicare Payment Advisory Commission, *Report to the Congress: Medicare Payment Policy*, March 2006).

Nursing Home Care & Continuing Care Retirement Facilities

Employment & Earnings

Employment in Nursing care facilities and Continuing Care Retirement Facilities, Percent Change from Same Period of Previous Year: 2000-



Employment in continuing care retirement communities grew 6.2 percent in 2005:Q4, as it has been the fastest growing employer in the health care sector since 2003:Q1 (Table 3). Nursing care facilities employment, on the other hand, continued to stagnate, growing 0.2 percent in 2005:Q4. Despite the


deceleration in employment growth present since its peak in late 2003, employment growth in continuing care retirement communities continues to outpace the employment growth experienced by the remainder of the health care sector.

Growth in earnings for Nursing Care Facility Workers rallied in 2005:Q4, growing 3.3 percent over the same period in the previous year. Earnings growth has been accelerating moderately since its most recent trough in 2003:Q4. While earnings growth for nursing care facility workers remains below the 4.0 percent growth experienced by the overall health sector, earnings growth for workers in Continuing Care Retirement Communities continues to accelerate more rapidly to 5.1 percent in 2005:Q4. These divergent trends in employment and earnings among long-term care facilities are likely due to differences in demand for those services.

Prices

Nursing home prices, as measured by the CPI, increased 3.0 percent in 2005:Q4 (Table 7). After reaching a peak of 5.8 percent in 2003:Q2, the increases in nursing home prices have fallen steadily.

percent in 2005:Q4 (Table 7). Price increases have slowly decelerated since reaching a peak in 2003:Q2. The large decline in price increases from early 2001 through 2003 came from a slowdown in public payer increases. Since the first few months of 2004, public and private payer SNF price increases have been similar.
