Care Companion Nurse Stations will be utilized to gather and interpret data while also permitting live video interactions with clients.

Central Vermont Home Health and Hospice, Inc. will use RUS grant funds to provide 25 telemedicine home monitoring units and 55 laptops and software for point of cure patient records. The software will integrate all agency departments resulting in reduced paperwork and filing, and will provide caregiver up-to-date information at the patients home. The service will benefit 8,420 patients in the 23 town service area.

Dorset Nursing Association will utilize RUS grant funding to install home telemonitors and point of care/electronic patient charts to respond more quickly to patient needs, ensure better flow of patient information to physicians, and prevent unnecessary hospitalizations. Using home telemonitors patients will be able to monitor their own vital signs. Efficient use of an electronic charting system will improve patient medical and social outcomes for all 150 patients and their families which will reduce hospitalizations through closer daily monitoring of patient indicators. The system will also increase access for primary physicians who will also be able to access current patient information.

The Visiting Nurse Alliance of Vermont and New Hampshire, Inc. will use RUS grant funds for a telemedicine project that will improve the quality of life for rural Vermont and New Hampshire patients. The project will provide point-of-care laptop or pen-based computers for all VNA and Hospice clinicians in the field and would computerize the clinical record, linking charting, scheduling, billing, payroll and reimbursement through a new software system. This "connectivity" will ensure the means for a daily record of vital signs rather than a once or twice a week assessment of a patient. This activity coupled with a telephone interview and personal visit will provide a more comprehensive picture of the patient's day-to-day condition, alerting the provider of changes that could be



missed by a once or twice weekly assessment. The project benefits include: (1) an increase of individual patient coverage; (2) nurses being enabled to monitor more patients, more effectively; (2) reduction in the amount of time currently spent on paperwork; (3) reduction in the time clinicians spend traveling; and, (4) an increase the accuracy of the reimbursement process. The number of rural residents that will benefit is approximately 165,000 people. There ninety-five (95) end-user locations throughout the six (6) Vermont Counties and three (3) New Hampshire Counties.

The goal of this program is to improve the quality of educational services provided to deaf and hard of hearing students in Vermont with the use of interactive television (ITV). The Vermont Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, Inc. (Vermont Center), located in Brattleboro, Vermont, is the applicant agency and will develop and implement the program. The Vermont Center operates the Austine School for the Deaf which provides day and residential education programs for 56 deaf and hard of hearing students ages 3 to 22. Austine will serve as the hub of the program. The partnering programs (end user sites) include the Regional Day Program for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students at the Williston Central School and the Regional Day Program for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students at North Country Union High School. The services provided to students will include American Sign Language (ASL) instruction twice a week to each end user site, joint ITV lessons and activities with students at the other participating sites, and career exploration via ITV taught by the Career Center at Austine. Additionally, professional development for 130 staff members at the three sites will include participation in biweekly training sessions provided at Austine, workshops for staff at all sites provided by the School for International Training and Northwestern Connecticut Community Technical College, and mentoring meetings for the sign language interpreters at all sites.

This project is a partnership between a rural school district and the local cable company both located on an island in Lake Champlain, Northwestern Vermont. The two-way interactive analog system will be a hybrid of optic fiber-based transport and coaxial cable distribution. Teachers, courses, and computer-based educational materials will be shared



by five K-12 schools. Interest from other local organizations indicate that a wider use of the system will be developed. The system is designed to interconnect with other statewide educational video-based system and commercial CATV-based educational programming.
